Serving will be from 5:30-7 p.m. at the Muleshoe High School cafeteria.

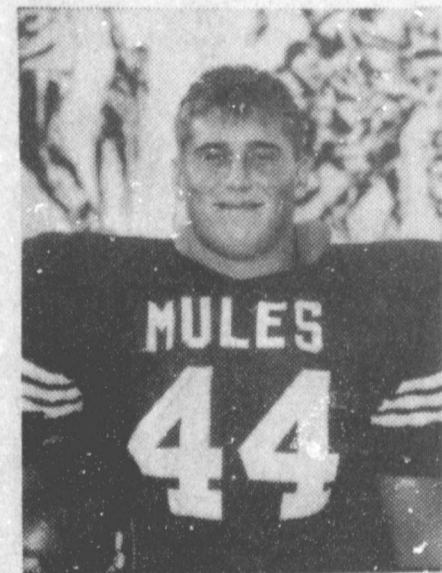
Tickets are available from any senior and at the door, for \$4 for adults and \$2.50 for children ages 12 and under.

This will be the last home football game for the season, so the seniors invite you to come out and visit your friends, enjoy good homemade chili and support the Mules.

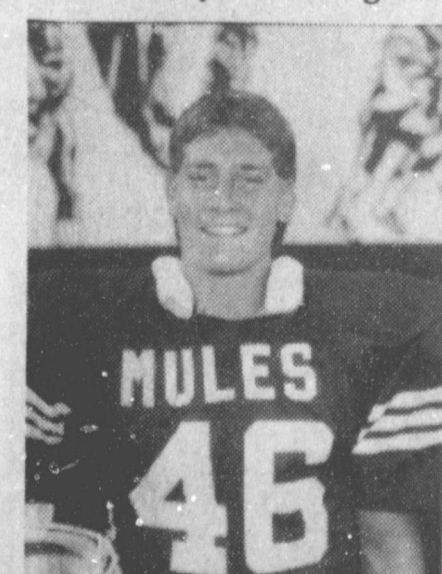

ASCS Gives 1988 Disaster Assistance Program Guidelines

This month, Danny Noble, county executive director of the ASCS office in Bailey County, is focusing on the 1988 Disaster Assistance Program, with the following report:

1988 DISASTER ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

Sign-up for the Disaster

Assistance Program for crop losses occurring in the 1988 calendar year as a result of drought, hail, excessive moisture (including insect infestation or plant disease resulting from these conditions) began October 3, 1988 and goes through March 31, 1989.

Crops eligible for the program include participating program crops, non-participating program crops, peanuts, sugar beets, soybeans and other non-program crops. Double cropped acreage behind a destroyed crop (ghost acres), are not eligible.

Disaster payments will be available to eligible producers on losses greater than 35 percent of expected normal production (ASCS established yield X total acres of the crop planted).

Any producer whose gross income exceeds \$2,000,000 for the most recent annual income tax return shall be ineligible to receive any disaster payment or any forgiveness of advance deficiency payment. The total amount of payments a person may receive may not exceed \$100,000.

Lazbuddie 'Horns Plan Homecoming On Friday Night

"All I See Is Orange" is the theme for the 1988 Homecoming at Lazbuddie -- scheduled for Friday, October 21.

At halftime, the 1988 Queen and King will be crowned.

Payments will be calculated by determining the amount of loss below 65 percent of normal production and multiplying the eligible loss by the applicable disaster payment rate. There are two payment levels; 90 percent of the payment rate for losses in excess of 75 percent of normal production and 65 percent of the payment rate for losses between 35 percent and 75 percent of normal production.

The payment rate for participating program crops is the target price. The payment rate for non-participating program crops is the county loan rate for the crop.

Three Way Eagles Defeat Cotton Center By 52-26

Fans of the Three Way Eagles enjoyed their annual homecoming Friday night when they watched the Eagles slam past the Cotton Center Elks by a score of 52-26.

It was all Three Way in the first half, and they led 32-0 at halftime.

First touchdown for the Eagles in the first quarter was when Roy Suarez powered over from the end. He also kicked the extra point.

Then Roy came back in the first with a two yard TD, but the EP attempt failed.

At the end of the first, the Eagles were ahead 14-0.

In the second, Mario Guillen put his first points on the scoreboard for the night with a 74 yard TD run. The PAT failed.

Then came what has to be one of the most unusual plays in football. As Cotton Center's quarterback was attempting to hand off, the football was intercepted by Chad Welch, a Three Way Eagle. He ran the handoff interception 60 yards to the end zone. The EP failed.

Mario then ended scoring for the first half on a 12 yard touchdown run, with the PAT failing.

Before Cotton Center settled down with a comeback attempt, Mario Guillen scored again in the third with a 10 yard run to paydirt, with the PAT again failing.

Cotton Center then answered

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday that a surge in sales tax rebates to several large

metropolitan areas in Texas reflects increasing statewide economic growth and stability.

"The state's metropolitan areas are doing even better than originally forecast. I'm glad to see Texas is sitting on solid economic ground again," Bullock said.

Muleshoe follows along with the state trend toward recovery from the economic depression. They show a 15.63 percent increase for the year in tax rebate payments. Last year at this time, payments were \$154,221.10 and have increased to \$178,325.61 at latest payment. This period, the payment was \$16,881.94, up 9.28 percent from the \$15,448.40 of a year ago.

Morton, in Cochran County, shows a big 29.02 percent increase for the year, with payments of \$50,723.42 in October of this year, compared to the \$39,314.09 of a year ago. Their current payment was \$4,152.78, down 2.10 percent from the \$4,241.92 of a year ago.

In Lamb County, Littlefield is reflecting a 3.28 percent increase for the pay period. Their current payment was \$17,644.35, up slightly from the \$17,084.51 of a year ago. To date for this year, Littlefield has received a total of \$207,453.02, up 4.71 from the \$198,127.63 of a year ago.

Friona, in Parmer County shows a decrease in total payments for the year, as well as a decrease in the current monthly payment. Friona received a payment of \$7,110.81 in October and \$7,408.46 at the same time last year, a decrease of 4.02 percent. To date for the year, Friona has received \$81,519.29, down 5.24 percent from the \$86,026.65 of a year ago.

According to Bullock, Fort Worth's October rebate showed a 27.4 percent increase over 1987's October rebate, while Houston's check grew 22.4 percent for the same period.

Other cities, such as Austin and San Antonio, also showed large increases in sales tax allocations, Bullock said.

Checks totaling \$64.8 million were mailed to 914 Texas cities that collect an optional local sales tax at either one percent or one-and-one-half percent, showing a growth of 17 percent in sales tax rebates this month over October 1987, he added.

The state's seven metropolitan transit authorities also saw a

Bleeker Twins Need Transplants To Survive

Vernon and Mary Nell Bleeker, longtime residents of Muleshoe, are spending as much time as they can at Keller, near Fort Worth with their nine month old twin grandsons.

Jared and Derrick Bleeker, who were born to Delmer and Sandy Bleeker on February 1, are both afflicted with a life threatening disease, and must have liver transplants in order to survive.

And, according to what doctors have told them, there is a 50 percent chance their sons can survive with a transplant.

Without the transplant, the twins chance of living to the age of four is very dim, said Mrs. Bleeker.

Insurance is taking care of their medical needs at this time as Delmer Bleeker is insured through Overland Bus Driver from Fort Worth, where he is a tour bus driver.

However, each transplant will cost at least \$250,000. The Bleekers have nearly enough money for one transplant, and they watch their twin sons slowly dwindle in the Children's Medical Center in Dallas where they have spent much of their brief lives.

They were born six weeks premature at Harris Fort Worth Methodist Hospital, and were then transferred to the hospital in Dallas by medical helicopter five days after their birth.

Jared and Derrick share a rare metabolic disease. They lack the enzyme that breaks down the ammonia produced when their bodies metabolize protein. The ammonia builds up in their blood and causes seizures and brain damage, eventually resulting in

death.

One of the twins was returned to the hospital this week for additional testing, and is said to probably be the weaker of the two.

In the event just one liver shows up for the transplant, the doctors will make the decision which twin is the healthier and who can tolerate the operation better.

According to their mother, Sandy, "They go from being normal, healthy babies - just a little small for their age - to near death, just in a matter of hours."

"When they're not sick and comatose, they're pink and healthy."

Both twins need the same size liver, as well as the same blood and tissue type.

Their mother, Sandy, recently went to Houston to confer with doctors who treated an eight year old boy, who was only partially deficient in the enzyme, with a liver transplant.

The Houston specialist told Mrs. Bleeker that he saw too many of them, and all of them end up with brain damage. Everytime they go into a coma, there is a greater chance, she added.

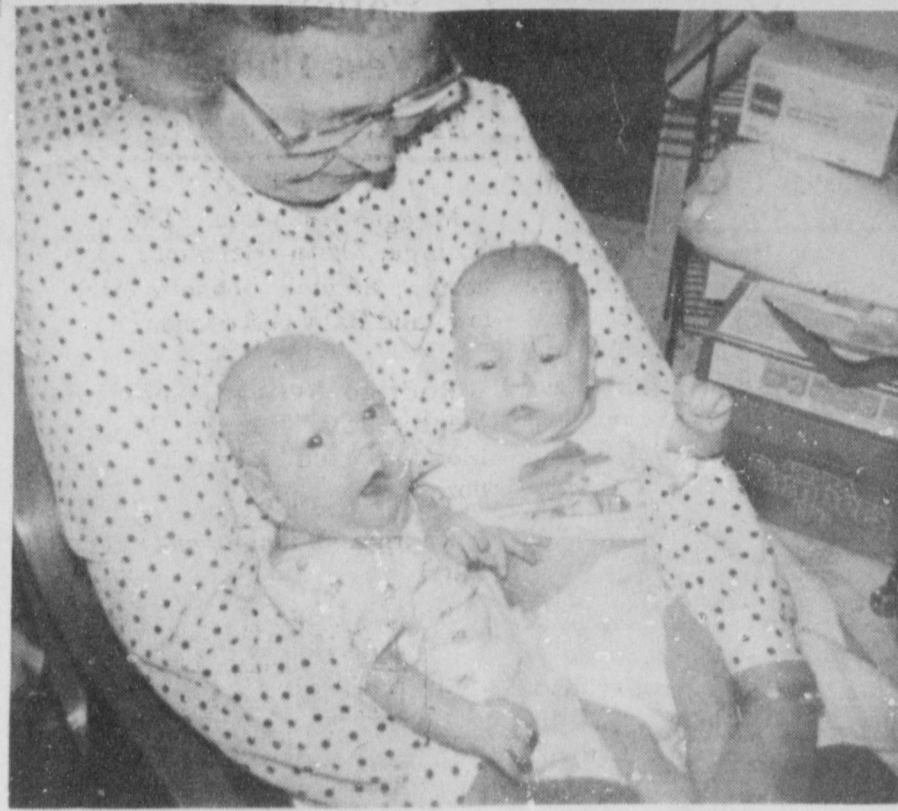
But, the Houston doctor said the Bleeker's best choice was a liver transplant. On the eight year old boy, who received a liver transplant for a similar disease, the liver started producing the enzyme right away. He is still being closely watched for rejection of the organ that has been transplanted into his body.

Lubbock J.P. Rules Death A Homicide

According to a story written by Jeff Tinnell of the Lubbock Avalanche Journal and printed in the Thursday, October 13, 1988 edition of *The Lubbock Avalanche Journal*, the death of Lee Palmer has been ruled a homicide.

This is the story in the Thursday morning Lubbock paper:

"Two recent South Plains traffic fatalities, including the death of 15-year-old Muleshoe resident Lee Palmer, were ruled homicides Wednesday by Justice of the Peace L. J. Blalack.

"Palmer died from injuries suffered in a Sept. 18 rollover on Texas 214 near Muleshoe. According to Department of Public Safety (DPS) accident reports,

Palmer was traveling with two companions in the bed of a pickup truck driven by a 16-year-old Muleshoe schoolmate.

"The driver of the pickup truck attempted to pass a car driven by another 16-year-old Muleshoe resident, but swerved into the path of the pickup, blocking the roadway. The driver of the pickup then swerved into a ditch and passed the car, according to the DPS report.

"But when the pickup re-entered the roadway, one of its tires blew out and the vehicle went out of control. The pickup rolled three times, and Palmer was ejected from the bed. He died from extensive head injuries, according to an autopsy by Dr. Ralph Erdmann of Lubbock.

"The Sept. 25 traffic death of Ramiro C. Palacios, 25, of Crosbyton also was ruled a homicide by Blalack."

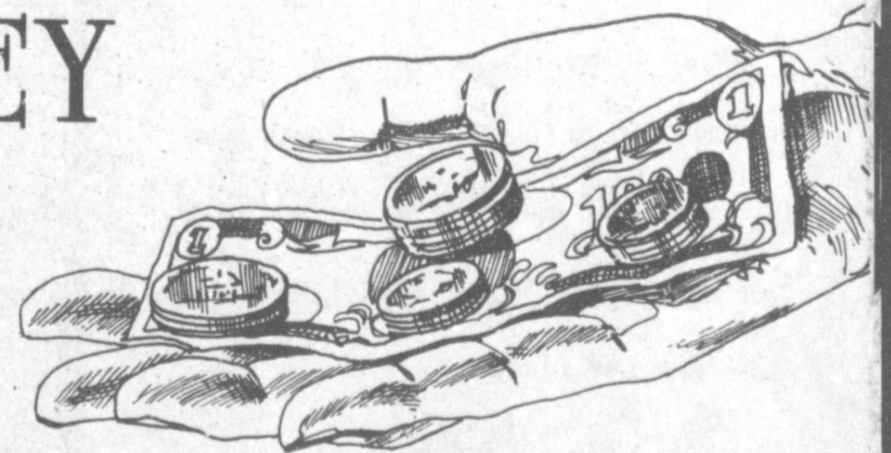

Eligible producers with crop losses greater than 65 percent **MUST** agree to purchase FCIC, multi-peril crop insurance on the applicable crop for the 1989 program year.

Participants in the 1988 annual programs that have lost from one percent to 35 percent on wheat, feed grains, and upland cotton are not eligible for the disaster payment but are eligible to retain a portion of the 1988 advance deficiency payment if the final deficiency payment rate for the crop is less than the payment rate used for making advance deficiency payments.

If a producer has a loss up to 35 percent of expected production and wants forgiveness of the advance payment, he/she must file all the necessary papers in the ASCS office prior to March 31, 1989. Producers who did not request the advance deficiency payment may now request it until October 27, 1988, in order to qualify for the forgiveness.

Producers with 1988 FCIC insurance that had a loss in excess of 35 percent and requesting a disaster payment, must furnish all premium, indemnity, and appraisal information for the applicable crop.

Wheat producers that lose in excess of 65 percent of expected production needs to act now because the final date to request FCIC insurance is October 31, 1989. A copy of the 1989 policy must be furnished prior to any disaster payment on any program crop if the loss is greater than 65 percent.

Infant Mortality Rate Reflects Slow Decrease

The Texas infant mortality rate dropped to 9.1 per 1,000 live births in 1987, another all-time low, according to figures from the Texas Department of Health's Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The rate is some 4.2 percent less than the previous record low of 9.5 deaths per 1,000 births in 1986. The infant mortality rate is a traditional index of the state's quality of health care.

The number of infant deaths decreased to 2,744, down 5.9 percent from 1986 total of 2,916. Health officials attribute the continuing decreases to improvements in prenatal care and care during and after delivery.

As recently as 1950, the infant death was 37.5. It declined to 30.3 in 1955, to 29.1 in 1960, to 26.1 in 1965, to 21.4 in 1970, to 16.6 in 1975, to 12.1 in 1980 and to 9.8 in 1985.

Last year, 301,827 babies were born to Texas mothers, a decline of 1.7 percent compared to the 307,003 born in 1986. The baby

boom of the 1950s produced almost a quarter-million births to Texans in 1957. The number of births dropped to less than 204,000 in 1967 before beginning the upswing which peaked in 1985 at 308,027 babies born to Texas mothers.

The number of births in 1987 produced a birth rate of 17.8 per 1,000 population, down 3.3

percent from the 1986 rate of 18.4.

Total deaths of Texans last year were 119,734 -- a rate of 7.1 per 1,000 population. That was an increase of 1,097 deaths -- or 0.9 percent -- over 1986 when there were 118,637 deaths. Despite the increase in the number of deaths, the death rate for 1987 is still at the 1986 level of 7.1 per 1,000 population.
