Foster named to TGCA All-State Team

The Texas Girls Coaches Association has named Hannah Foster to the 1st Team 2A-All State Team. Foster was listed with 39 other 2A softball players from within the State of Texas. Foster was a senior at Haskell High School and was a 4 year varsity Maiden, being named to First Team All District 3 years, including Co-MVP her senior year.

Foster contributed to the Maiden tradition advancing to the playoffs all four years including the Regional Quarterfinals three years and the Regional Semifinals two years.

Foster played several

positions including, pitcher, shortstop, first base and right field. Although she was right-handed, Foster batted in the leadoff position as a lefty. In district play her senior year, Foster's batting average was .575, with an on base percentage .667. In 40 at bats in district play, she did not strike out a single time.

For the season, Foster had a Maiden record-breaking .500 BA, her OBP was .568 with 47 hits, 36-singles, 9-doubles, 2 triples, 25 RBIs, and 44 runs. Defensively, in district play, Foster pitched 16 innings, 0.00 ERA, with a .829 fielding % at shortstop/pitcher.

Farm Service Agency County Committee nominations underway

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) announced that the nomination period for farmers and ranchers to serve on local Farm Service Agency (FSA) county committees begins Wed., June 15.

"Through the county committees, farmers and ranchers have a voice. Their opinions and ideas get to be heard on federal farm programs," said FSA Administrator Val Dolcini. "I encourage all eligible farmers and ranchers across the spectrum of American agriculture, to get involved in this year's elections. We have seen an increase in the number of qualified nominees, especially among women and minorities, and I hope that trend continues."

To be eligible to serve on a FSA county committee, a person must participate or cooperate in an FSA administered program, be eligible to vote in a county committee election and reside in the local administrative area where they are nominated.

Farmers and ranchers may nominate themselves or others. Organizations representing minorities and women also may nominate candidates. To become a candidate, an eligible individual must sign an FSA-669A nomination form. The form and other information about FSA county committee elections are available at www.fsa.usda.gov/elections. 2016 nomination forms must be postmarked or received in the local USDA Service Center by close of business on Aug. 1, 2016.

FSA will mail election ballots to eligible voters beginning Nov. 7. Ballots must be returned to the local county office via mail or in person by Dec. 5. Newly-elected committee members and alternates will take office on Jan. 1, 2017.

Nationwide, there are approximately 7,800 farmers and ranchers serving on FSA county committees. These individuals make decisions on disaster and conservation programs, emergency programs, commodity price support loan programs, and other agricultural issues. Committees consist of three to 11 members that are elected by eligible producers, and members

serve three-year terms.

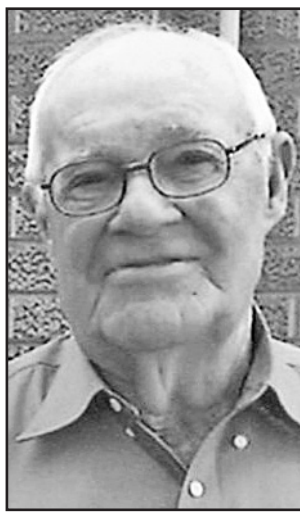
being with his pets Abby, Domino and Cato.

Professional child care training will be offered July 9 during "Inclusive Child Care for Preschool and School-Aged Children," a collaborative effort among the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service, the Texas Department of Family and Protective Services and Region 14 Education Service Center.

The workshop will run from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the Region 14 Education Service Center-NOLAN Room, located at 1850 Highway 351 in Abilene, said Jane Rowan, AgriLife Extension family and consumer sciences agent in Taylor County.

"This course offers six hours of continuing education units for early childhood educators and is designed for child care providers and directors," Rowan said. "Our speakers will be Dr. Jean Paulsel, AgriLife Extension family life and child development specialist, and Rebecca Dunn, AgriLife Extension child development specialist, both from College Station."

The course is being offered free of charge. Rowan advised registering early as seating is limited. The schedule includes a one hour lunch break which participants are responsible for their own lunch.

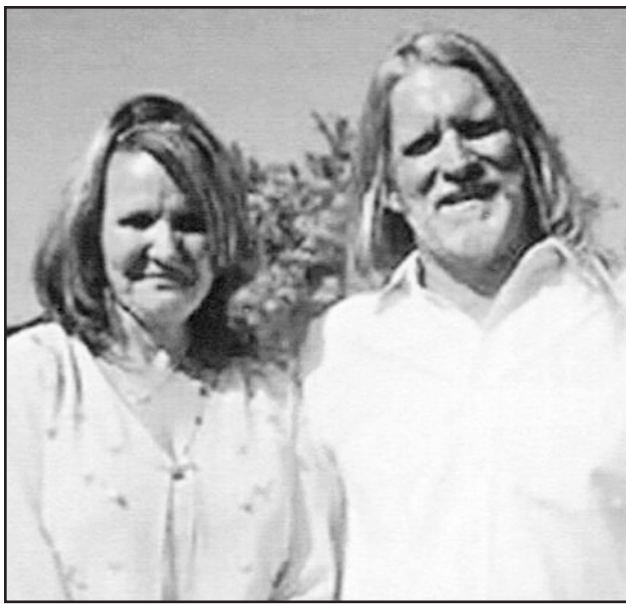

Food manager certification course slated in Abilene

Statistics indicate that foodborne illness continues to be a health issue in the United States. Each year, one in six Americans will become sick. 128,000 will become hospitalized, and 3,000 will die due to a foodborne illness.

Texas Food Establishment Rules state that each food establishment is required to have one certified food manager on site.

Texas A&M AgriLife Extension service in Taylor, Jones and Nolan Counties, is offering a professional food manager certification training course. This two day program will be offered for \$125 on Aug. 15 and Aug. 16 at the Taylor County Extension Office. Cost includes training, materials and the ServCafe food manager certification examination. The food manager's certification will be valid for five years. Registration deadline is July 25.

This program is designed to not only prepare foodservice managers to pass the certification examination; it will provide valuable education regarding the safe handling of food. Almost 50 cents of every dollar Americans spend on food is spent on meals prepared away from home. Therefore, careful attention to food safety will help keep customers safe and satisfied.

Foodborne illnesses are

estimated to cost thousands of dollars in lost wages, insurance and medical bills. With these statistics, knowledge of how to prevent foodborne illness is essential. The benefits of improved food safety include:

- Increased customer satisfaction
- Improved relationships with health officials
- Prevention of bad publicity and lawsuits due to foodborne illness
- By attending the course, foodservice managers will learn about:
 - identifying potentially hazardous foods and common error in food handling
 - preventing contamination and cross-contamination of food
 - teaching and encouraging personal hygiene for employees
 - complying with government regulations
 - maintaining clean utensils, equipment and surroundings
 - controlling pests

Foodborne illnesses can be prevented by following simple food safety practices. Safety tips for keeping food safe

With warmer temperatures and backyard grills resuming their place in the sun, UT Southwestern Medical Center toxicologists say a few cautionary steps can help you and guests avoid food poisoning.

"Make sure your guests carry home fond memories instead of stomach aches or worse with sound food handling and preparation practices," says toxicologist Dr. Kurt Kleinschmidt, Professor of Emergency Medicine and Chief of Medical Toxicology at UT Southwestern Medical Center.

Preparation

•Refrigerate or freeze perishable foods as soon as you get them home from the store.

•If you're not going to use meats within a couple of days, freeze them. Once you've thawed meat, cook it. Don't re-freeze thawed meat.

•Pack plenty of ice in coolers to store raw or leftover foods at tailgate parties.

•Keep meats for grilling cold until you put them on the grill.

Handling

•Before handling food, always wash your hands thoroughly in warm, soapy water or use hand sanitizer.

•Don't leave food standing for long periods of time. A general rule of thumb is not to leave foods out for more than one hour.

•Eat hot foods as soon as they're cooked or while they're still hot.

•Remove cold foods from the refrigerator just before serving and put them away quickly.

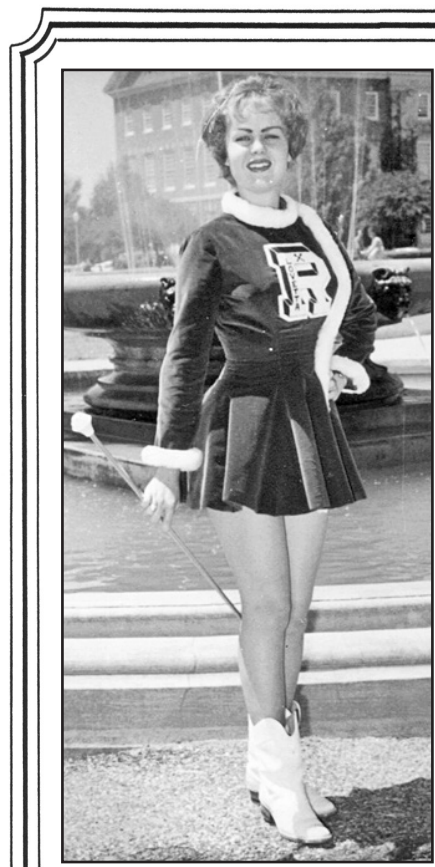
•Wash hands, surfaces, and utensils that come in contact with raw meats. Use different dishes and

utensils for cooked meats and raw meats.

Cooking

•Cook foods at recommended temperatures to kill bacteria. Use a meat thermometer to be sure the food is thoroughly cooked. That's especially important for ground beef. When grilling, cook hamburgers until they're no longer pink inside, or until juices run clear.

•Generally, grilled meats should be cooked to at least 145 degrees Fahrenheit and poultry to at least 160 degrees. Pork should be cooked to an internal temperature of at least 155 degrees in order to destroy the parasite that causes trichinosis. This disease causes abdominal pain, diarrhea, muscle soreness, fever, and swelling around the eyes. If you're grilling pork ribs, you don't want the meat to be red near the bone.

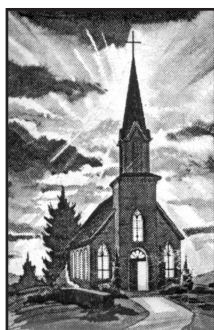

Arm yourself with two BP readings

If you take your blood pressure at home, get a reading on one arm and then get a reading on the other. If the systolic number—the higher number—varies by more than 10 points between the two arms, it could be an indicator that you are at risk of heart disease, says cardiologist Dr. Wanpen Vongpatanasin, Professor of Internal Medicine at UT Southwestern Medical Center.

Several studies in recent years have shown that variations in blood pressure readings on the right and left arm are associated with increased risk of death from heart attack or stroke, says Dr. Vongpatanasin, who

specializes in research on high blood pressure.

"While small differences from one arm to the other are normal, larger differences suggest that cholesterol-based plaque has built up in the arteries that supply blood to the arm with the higher reading, and is likely building up in the arteries that supply the heart as well. Narrowing of the arteries that supply blood to the heart muscle leads to heart attacks," Dr. Vongpatanasin says.

If you do find a large difference between readings taken from one arm to the other, consider making an appointment with a preventive cardiologist.

New traffic signals activated at busy Abilene intersection

The Texas Department of Transportation recently activated the Abilene District's first-ever flashing yellow arrow, or FYA, traffic signals at the intersection of SH 351 and FM 2833 (East Lake Road) and at the intersection of SH 351 and Enterprise Drive. This type of signal, in use by TxDOT since 2011, is designed to reduce confusion and increase safety at intersections.

The now fully-functioning signals are part of the SH 351 access management project that has been in progress since June 2015. The flashing yellow arrow indicates that motorists may make a left turn if there is no oncoming traffic. This arrow replaces the solid green light which typically indicates that drivers may make a left turn but must yield to traffic.

Transitioning to this type of traffic signal offers several benefits including improved safety by reducing crashes, increased flexibility by allowing more options for motorists making left turns, and more consistency as these signals are adopted as the national standard.

•Motorists will see the following indicators at the FYA signal:

- Red Arrow: Stop. Do not make a left turn.
- Solid Yellow Arrow: Left turn signal is about to turn red. Prepare to stop. Complete your left turn only if you are in the intersection and it is safe. Oncoming traffic might have a green light.
- Flashing Yellow Arrow: Left turn permitted, but drivers must yield to oncoming traffic and proceed with

caution.
•Green Arrow: Safe to turn left. Oncoming traffic has red light.
Drivers are reminded to use caution when traveling through this and all work

zones, especially as traffic is adjusting to a new signal in these locations.

Consider cancer risk when grilling

Cooking meat, including beef, pork, fish, or poultry, with high-temperature methods such as pan frying or grilling directly over an open flame can increase exposure to chemicals that can cause changes in DNA that may increase the risk of cancer, according to the National Cancer Institute.

Researchers also have found that high consumption of well-done, fried, or barbecued meats was associated with increased risks of colorectal, pancreatic, and prostate cancer, the NCI reports.

"Grilling at high temperatures and consuming red meat both increase

your risk of colon cancer. Done together, the effect can be compounded," says gastrointestinal cancer specialist Dr. Muhammad Beg, Assistant Professor of Internal Medicine and with UT Southwestern Medical Center's Harold C. Simmons Comprehensive Cancer Center. "Minimize your risk by limiting the time on an open flame, while still ensuring the meat is cooked to the correct temperature. Mixing up what you chose to grill by adding chicken and vegetables to the meal will automatically reduce the amount of red meat you eat."

Other considerations:

• reduce the amount of time on the grill;

• turn the meat often while grilling;

• remove charred or blackened meat before serving.
