Mr. Brunson died Wednesday, November 2, 2005, in Lockney. He was born in Rosedale, Okla-

homa in 1920.

He entered the U.S. Navy October 6, 1942. Following his basic training he was assigned to the USS Hermitage, a troop transport ship. He served in the Pacific transporting troops to and from India, New Zealand, Australia and New Guinea. For a short time it served in the Atlantic, making shuttle runs to England, Ireland and France. He was honorably discharged October 6, 1945.

He married Helen Ruth Logan November 8, 1946 in Quitaque.

He engaged in farming until 1957, when he went to work for the City of Quitaque as City Secretary. He retired in June 1986.

He was a member of the Quitaque Church of Christ where he was an Elder.

Survivors include his wife of 59 years, Ruth: two sons, David Brunson of Muleshoe and Perry Brunson of Silverton; two daughters, Patricia Maupin and Mary Texas in Lockney.

Graveside services were conducted at 10:00 a.m. Saturday, October 29, in the Silverton Cemetery with Ted Kingery, Church of Christ minister, officiating. Survivors include her parents,






