**THE PROPOSED PLAN** offered to Baird by the Sears-Roebuck Foundation -- which calls for ultimate construction of a medical office-clinic building -- is ready to move into the second stage.

The second stage will be formation of an independent group of residents from throughout this area to work directly with the foundation in laying the groundwork for the proposed program.

Directors of the Baird Chamber of Commerce endorsed the plan at their meeting Monday morning. Such endorsement by a local organization was necessary before the Sears Foundation could go any further in the program.

The foundation will assist only those communities which are willing to help themselves. So Sears insisted that the plan be endorsed by at least one Baird organization before any more effort was expended toward getting more medical facilities for this area.

With our new water storage tank in use, plus the improved system of water mains and fire plugs, the rate should go under the present 34 cents. The rate was 37 cents up until this last reduction, announced last week.

## FUNERAL SERVICES HELD IN BAIRD FOR MRS. HUFFINES, TWO CHILDREN

Last rites for Mrs. Yvonne M. Huffines, 28, and two of her children were at 2:30 p. m. Wednesday in Baird's First Methodist Church. Burial was in Ross Cemetery under direction of Godfrey Funeral Home.

The children are Michael, 5, and Melissa, 3.

Officiating were the Rev. Homer Salley, pastor of the Baird church, Rev. Charles Lutzrick of First Methodist Church in Floydada, and the Rev. H. Weldon McCormick of Abilene's Elmwood West Methodist Church.

**Five Killed**  
Mrs. Huffines, the two children, and two other persons were fatally injured Sunday morning in a violent two-car collision on Highway 351 between Albany and Abilene.

Killed besides the three in one family were Timothy Allen Rushing and Walter Jess Beams,

both 18-year-old Dallas residents. The two youths were en route home after attending a weight-lifting program in Abilene Saturday. They were football players at Highland Park High School in Dallas.

There were no witnesses to the head-on collision and officers indicated they may never be able to determine circumstances around the crash. Force of the accident scattered wreckage from both vehicles over a wide area on and near the highway.

Four persons were injured in another accident involving a Taylor County sheriff's officer en route to the wreck scene.

The accident occurred about 10:30 a. m. Sunday, but, since there were no witnesses, was not discovered immediately.

**Abilene Resident**  
Mrs. Huffines, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. M. M. Caldwell of Baird, had lived in Abilene in

recent months. She moved to Abilene from Baird after returning to Callahan County last summer following the death of her husband, Air Force Capt. E. C. Huffines Jr., who was killed in a military plane crash last June in South Carolina.

She was a 1954 graduate of Baird High School and a 1958 graduate of McMurry College, where she was an Indian band Maidenette.

Mrs. Huffines, the former Yvonne M. Caldwell was also a Totem yearbook beauty at McMurry two years, and runner-up two years. She was a member of the Future Teachers Assn. and Delta Beta Epsilon.

Michael Huffines was born at Webb AFB at Big Spring April 18, 1960, and Melissa Huffines was born at Webb March 1, 1962.

Surviving her in addition to her parents are Allan C., her one-year-old son; a brother, Sonny of Fort Worth; her maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. W. T. McCoy of Graham.

Surviving the children, in addition to their brother and the maternal grandparents, is their paternal grandmother, Mrs. Gladys Floyd Crutchfield of Fairmont, N. C.

**Two Plead Guilty In District Court**

Clifford Donald Mott, 27, of Beaumont was sentenced to three years in prison Tuesday after pleading guilty to forging a credit card invoice. His plea was heard in 42nd District court in Baird.

Mott admitted forging a \$63.58 invoice at Jennings Humble station in Baird March 31.

Also Tuesday, Ell James Abernathy of Putnam received a year's probated prison term after pleading guilty to second offense driving while intoxicated.

**Eula Girl Is Hurt in Crash**

Mary Jane Edwards, 21, of Eula was seriously injured in an automobile accident Sunday near Marlow, Okla. She is a student at Hardin-Simmons University and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. G. Edwards of Eula.

Rebecca Lynn Foshee of Los Alamos, N. M., also a H-SU student, and Billy Bob Couch of Okmulgee, Okla., a student at Oklahoma State University, were killed in the accident. George Partin of Abilene, an OSU student, was also injured.

The car in which the four students were riding was involved in a head-on collision with a truck during a heavy rain-storm Sunday. The truck driver was not injured.

**3 From Baird To State Meet**

Three girls from Baird High School qualified for the first state track and field meet for girls, which will be unreeled May 22 in Waco.

Baird finished third in regional competition Saturday at McMurry College in Abilene, compiling 65 points. Blanket was first with 83, followed by Banderera with 67. Santa Anna had 44 and Jim Ned 42 points to round out the first five schools.

Going to the state meet will be Ilean McIntosh in the shot put, Sally Green in the 80-meter hurdles and broad jump, and Betty Corn in the hop-step-jump.

Miss McIntosh was second in the shot put with an effort of 31-11½, with Betty Corn third at 31-10. Only first two finishers in each event advance to the state meet.

Miss Green won the broad jump with 16-7, and was second in the hurdles with 13.3. Miss Corn, who was second in the hop-step-jump with 22-7, was third in the hurdles with 13.4.

Baird placed third in the 880-yard relay and fourth in the 440-yard baton event. Running on both teams were Miss Corn, Miss Green, Sue Howard and Dianne Petty.

Getting maximum mileage out of two events, The Baird Bears made a bid for the state Class A track and field championship last Friday, coming within a half dozen points of success.

George West wound up with the crown on 38 points, with Baird second with 32 points.

A record-breaking mile relay team and husky Richard Windham scored all 32 points for the Bears, with most coming on a pair of first places.

Baird's mile relay foursome clipped about six seconds off its best time of the season to put together a 3:23 flat clocking for first place and a new record. The old mark was 3:25.3 set two years ago by Petersburg.

Joinerville Gaston was second in 3:24.8, also better than the old record, and Coahoma was third at 3:28.6 to tie the former record.

**Cross Plains Man Is Charged With Assault**

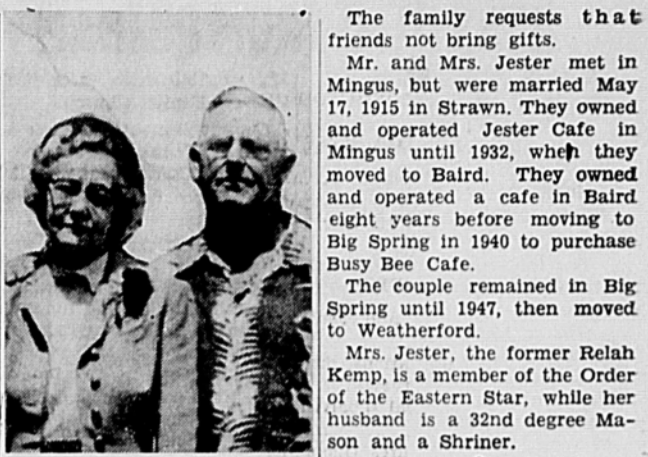

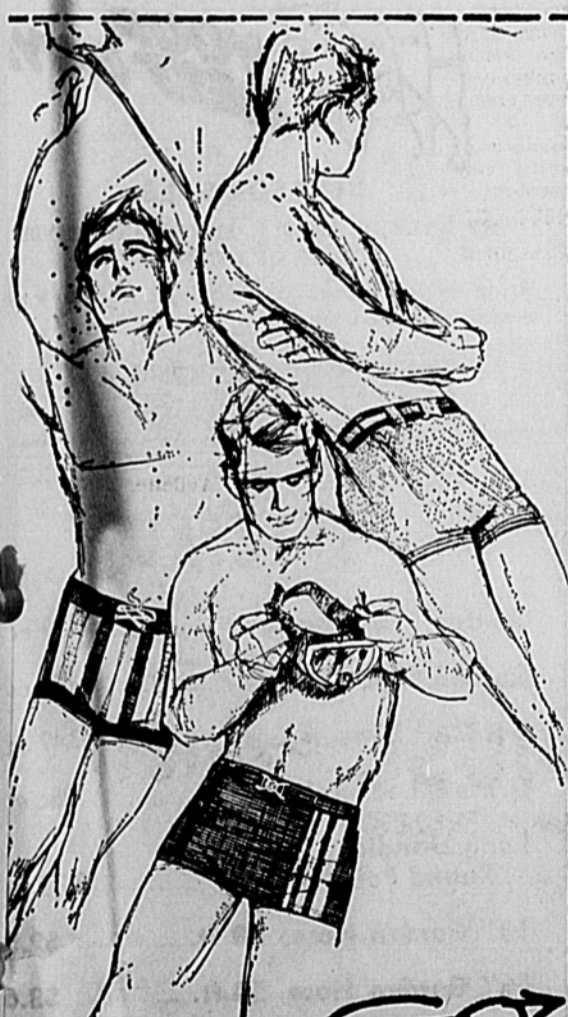

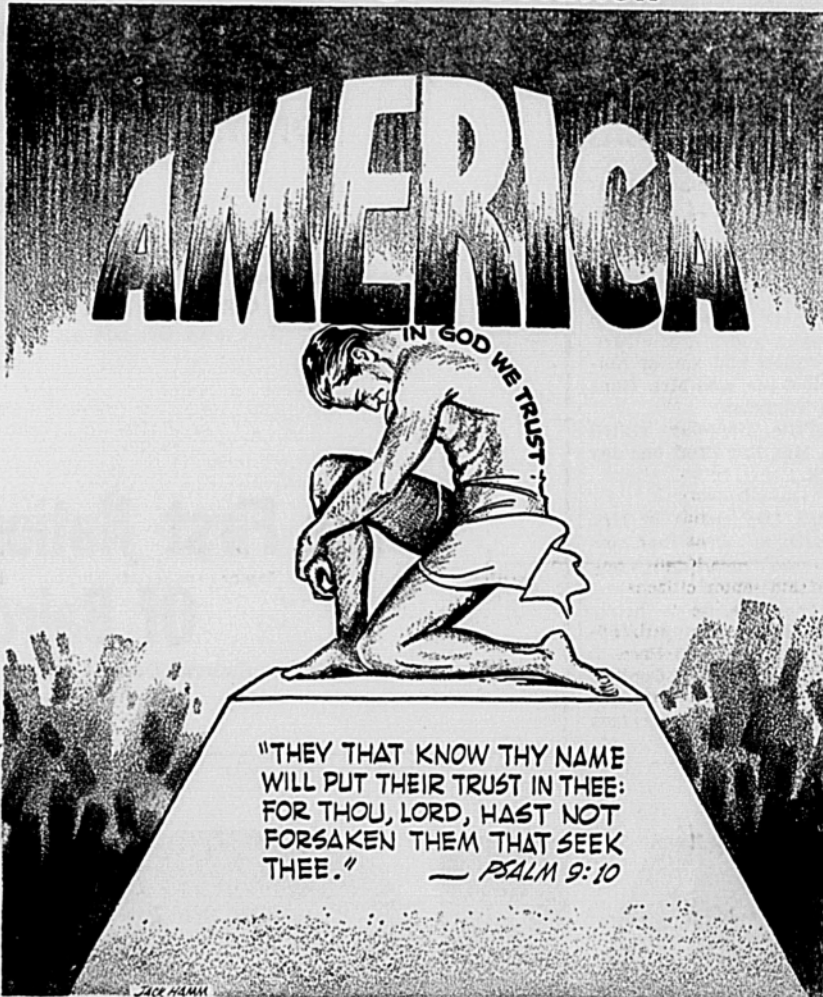

## Service Gross Down in County

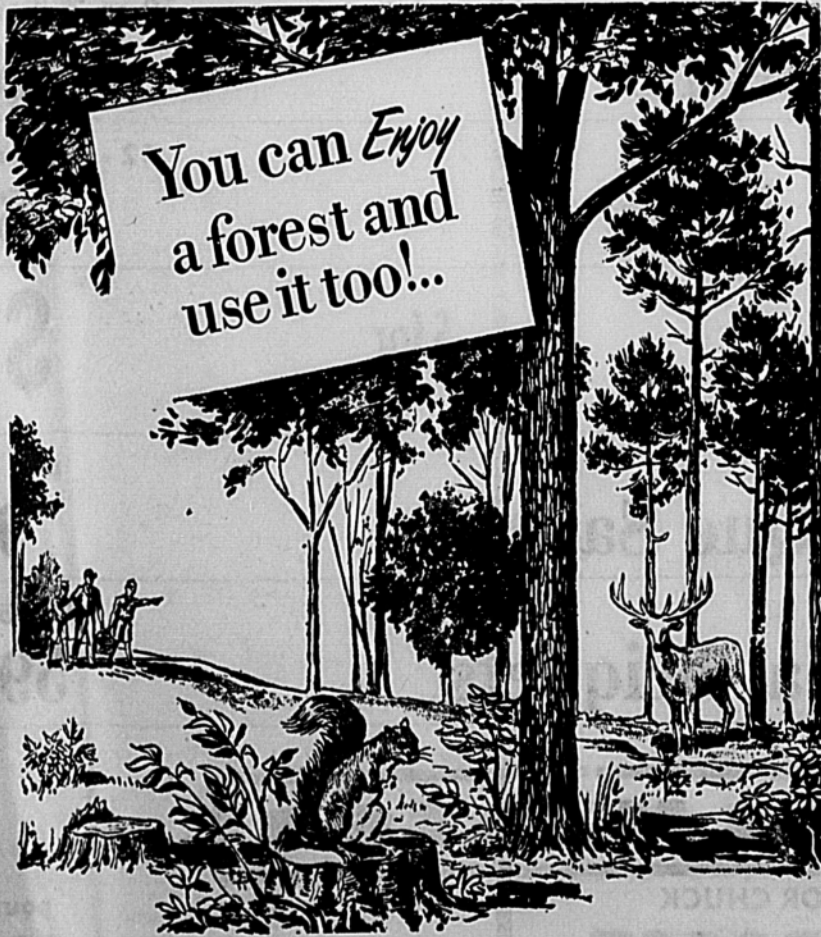
Callahan County's 66 service establishments had total receipts of \$451,000 in 1963, a decrease of 39 per cent from 1958, according to a report of the 1963 Census of Business just released by the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce. The last previous census of business covered operations during 1958.

The service trades in the census of business included those providing personal services to individuals; miscellaneous business services; auto repair and other auto services; and other repair services. Also included were motion picture production and distribution businesses; motion pictures theaters; other amusement and recreation services; and hotels and motels.

The selected service trade establishments in the county employed 21 persons (exclusive of proprietors) and had a payroll for the year of \$47,000. The state as a whole included 60,879 establishments with receipts of \$1,879 million.
