> The next step is to begin agitating the people about deepseated grievances against the landowners and against the government. When the people are excited enough, guerrillas stage attacks against small outposts of the army. Such attacks bring larger detachments of the military into the area.

Because the lack of supplies, soldiers are forced to confiscate food and lodging, which acts antagonize the local populace. With the help of the peasants, army units are usually ineffective against the hit-andrun guerrilla tactics.

As in the case of South Viet Nam and Java, Communists go a step farther by holding public executions of natives who do not cooperate with them. The people conclude their security lies with the guerrillas.

The next step is to increase activities against the central government, with the backing of the people from areas under

As in the case of some Latin American countries, the Communists provoke and inspire general strikes in the cities to coincide with attacks in more remote areas of the country.

By these total efforts they are able to build major crisis which call for all-out government use of massive force and, as in the case of the Dominican Republic, for example, the government calls on the United States for
