





In 1938 there were 1 609 possors crushed to death in strees and highway crishes. This figure was 23 percent lower than that of the previous year, and was brought about through the unreleating atforts of enforcement, education and engineering. The 1938 safety program, headed by the Toxas Safety Association and the Stag Department of Public Safety, proved to the moortals of Taxas that the stages that spring may have something better in store for many of us than just another of safety workers.




