Act Believed Prompted By THREE MEMBERS

R. L. (Bob) Dendy, well-known Haskell farmer and resident of this section for 30 years, ended his life Friday afternoon when he fired one bullet from a .38 calibre revolver through his forehead. Mr. Dendy had been brooding several days, apparently over ill health, relatives and neighbors said.

The tragedy occured at the farm home 4 miles northwest of Has-kell where Mr. and Mrs. Dendy had lived for many years, shortly before 3 o'clock Friday afternoon, a few minutes after Mrs. Dendy had left the house to go to a neighbor's and summon a physician for her husband. Mr. Dendy's body lying on a low platform entrance at one of the rear doors of the residence, was discovered by a neighbor, M. Brown who had called to inquire about Mr. Dendy's health and Mr. Brown immediately notified nearby neighbors and

summoned officers. One bullet from a revolver. found lying in the crook of Mr. Dendy's arm, had penetrated his forehead and caused instant death, said Dr. D. L. Cummins who assisted Sheriff Olen Dotson, County Attorney Walter Murchison and Justice of the Peace Clift in an inquest. A verdict of death from self-inflicted gunshot wound returned after officers had con-

ducted their investigation.

An aged Mexican employed on the Dendy farm, who was chopping wood near the Dendy home heard the shot, he told Mr. Brown but did not investigate because he thought Mr. Dendy had probably shot at a dog. An examination of (Continued on Page 8)

Possibility of a decrease of several hundred scholastics in Haskell county during the coming school year, which would result in loss of a proportionate amount of State Aid funds, is revealed in preliminary reports of the school census now being taken in Haskell county, school officials said this week.

The census must be completed Trustee Election for Haskell by April 1st, and school officials are anxious that every child of school age in the county be included in the census, in order that Haskell county schools will receive the maximum amount State Aid during the 1940-41 school term. Parents whose children have not been included are requested to render them to the census enumerator of their district or to the county superintendent's







A few years ago, at the age of 79; Thomas F. Ryan died worth many millions of dollars, In the meantime he had given away a lot of money also. But, so far as the main facts of his life are concerned, they do not differ greatly from those other poor boys who have risen to wealth and

A little story is told, however, which may give some insight into the manner in which young Ryan got his start toward great riches. His first job was with a Baltimore dry goods store, where he was bired for \$3 a week and told to report for work the next morning. Now, he was in earnest about that job and didn't want to take any chances on letting it get away from him, so he said to the boss: "If you don't mind, I'll start right now without any pay for today."

Needless to say he made good on that job, and two years later, at the age of 19, he obtained employment in Wall Street. At the age of 23 he became a member of the New York Stock Exchange, from which time his rise in the financial world was rapid and he became one of America's richest men.

Doubtless his remarkable success was due to the spirit which he displayed in cinching his first job-his willingness to "start right now." A good many boys of today might emulate that spirit with profit to themselves

It considers the title to property alone, that is the party to whom the property is recorded in the Clerk's office. He, in whose name, the property may be recorded in, may have the smallest percentage of equity in the property, but under the present Advolorem system of taxation he pays the taxes, when in fact, the party holding the first lien notes against the property possesses all the equity therein. That is in the strict sense a tax upon use, and not upon legal ownership. No man can say he legally owns the title to property when only has an equitable in-terest therein. His equity may vanish as do rainbows. Yet under the system of taxation now in use he must pay the taxes upon tae Advalorem Taxing units, with the assessed taxable value.
