It is from the Aug. 27, 1915 edition of the Star and gives a good example of the style used in wedding stories 50 years ago. For it is the story about the Hart's wedding.

It is under the headline "A Pretty Wedding."

"An interesting event of the past week," the story says, "was the marriage of Miss Maude Conner to Mr. Fred T. Hart, which event was solemnized at the home of the bride's parents, Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Conner, on Wednesday evening, August 25th at 8 o'clock, Rev. H. M. Peebles, pastor of the Presbyterian Church, speaking the words that joined together the lives of these popular young people.

"The home was artistically decorated in pink and green. The bridal couple stood beneath an arch of green entwined with pink and white rosebuds. Potted plants were grouped about in profusion."

The bride's dress was described as "of beautiful white crepe meteor trimmed in pearls. Her veil was fastened with lillies of the valley."

"A bountiful luncheon, in which the color scheme was tastefully carried out, was then served to a large number of relatives and a few special friends."

This all points out, we think, that although the world has changed greatly in 50 years, the simple dignity of a marriage ceremony has not.

Pesticides 'Must' in Efficient Farm Operation -- But Be Careful

Pesticides are helpful and necessary for efficient agricultural production, says County Agent Pat C. Garner.

Pesticides are defined as those chemicals that will control insects, weeds, crop disease organisms, rodents and other destructive life. They benefit the farmer and the consumer by helping assure the high quality and adequate quantity of the nation's food supply. They have also added to man's life span by reducing the effects of pests in transmitting human diseases. Without pesticides food quality and food quantity would drop rapidly and prices of food would increase. Many everyday foods, such as vegetable would become luxury foods.

It would be difficult to get along without agricultural chemicals, says Garner, but they must be used carefully. Only the person who applies a pesti-

cide can make sure it is applied properly and safely.

Farm chemicals should be used only on crops for which they are specifically recommended and only in the amounts specified. It is costly to use more and it may damage the crop yield or make the crop unsafe for food or feed. Apply chemicals at time specified on the label using only recommended methods of application.

Drifts of sprays or dusts can be dangerous. Carefully observe label precautions to protect those who apply the chemical, protect the crop from damage, and to prevent harmful residues of food or feed crops.

Garner adds three other cautions: keep pesticides out of the reach of children, keep the chemicals in the original container with the label intact to prevent mixups, and dispose of empty pesticide containers to avoid danger of injury to anyone in the future.

AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

WASHINGTON — In 1951 an agreement between the United States and Mexico provided for what is commonly known as the Bracero Program. The purpose was to regulate the movement of Mexican farm workers into the United States

in the summer and fall. Large numbers of such workers were admitted for a period of six to twelve weeks, paid wages equal to those of Americans, and returned to their homes below the border. Many workers returned year after year to the same em-

ployers, and it was mutually profitable.

Under pressure from large labor unions, some Church groups and the reformist liberals, the arrangement ended last January 1.

These forces argued that it caused unemployment in this country and that it hampered efforts to unionize farm labor.

The result is that at this very moment there are unharvested crops rotting in the fields in California.

The fact is, there are fewer and fewer Americans who are willing to perform "stoop labor." Anyone who has picked cotton will know it is not the easiest job in the world to pick berries or cut asparagus and celery. It is obviously not a matter of their willingness to work. True enough, the wage rate is only comparable to the lowest of common labor, but here again it was proved on trial that this is not a principal factor in the problem of recruiting field workers.

With all the federal help programs and local relief, the incentive is just not there. As developed in hearings in California, out of more than 8,000 able bodied people receiving public assistance in the City of Los Angeles, 235 accepted jobs. At the end of 10 days, there were less than 30 working.

The Federal Government attempted to supply the need for workers by recruiting high school students called A-teams. But the boys, athletes back home, found the work too hard and the sun too hot, and the teams melted away. Many college students were "standing up for their rights" in the last semester, found stooping over in the fields to earn a few dollars quite another matter. Of 300 Indians transported from the Dakotas at a cost of \$6400 to the vegetable fields near Salinas, California, all but 20 vanished in a few days.

At the same time all this is going on there is a \$100,000 Poverty Training Program in Oxnard, Calif., to train advisors to train seasonal workers. This would indicate the growers of the farm products to be harvested are unable to tell them how to do it.

This situation concerns more than just the fruit and vegetable growers of California. It concerns cotton growers, sheep and goat raisers, ranchers and about all other agriculture everywhere.

Furthermore, it concerns the housewife who is going to pay more for food. One lady recently buying a head of lettuce asked that it be "gift wrapped."

Prices are bound to rise for crops ripened in September and October, and after that, prices of canned goods are likely to increase in the winter.

The human element touches more deeply the braceros themselves. While Washington spends billions to help the poor in Egypt, India and elsewhere, and all the talk about the Alliance for Progress, our government has visited a cruel hardship on our nearest neighbors to the South. It is denying a livelihood to tens of thousands of Mexicans who depend on this work.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 24 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Article VII, Section 17, providing a method of payment for the acquiring, constructing and equipping of buildings and other permanent improvements at certain state institutions of higher learning; providing for allocation of funds therefor; authorizing the issuance of bonds or notes and the pledging of allotted funds for the payment of same; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 17 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 17. In lieu of the state ad valorem tax on property of Seven Cents (7c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation heretofore permitted to be levied by Section 51 of Article III, as amended, there is hereby levied, in addition to all other taxes permitted by the Constitution of Texas, a state ad valorem tax on property of Two Cents (2c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation for the purpose of creating a special fund for the continuing payment of Confederate pensions as provided under Section 51, Article III, and for the establishment and continued maintenance of the State Building Fund as provided in Section 51b, Article III, of the Constitution.

"Also, there is hereby levied, in addition to all other taxes permitted by the Constitution of Texas, a state ad valorem tax on property of Ten Cents (10c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation for the purpose of creating a special fund for the purpose of acquiring, constructing and initially equipping buildings or other permanent improvements at the designated institutions of higher learning provided that none of the proceeds of this tax shall be used for auxiliary enterprises; and the governing board of each such institution of higher learning is fully authorized to pledge all or any part of said funds allotted to such institution as

Stephen F. Austin State College at Nacogdoches
Sul Ross State College at Alpine
Angelo State College at San Angelo.

"Eighty-five per cent (85%) of such funds shall be allocated by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas on June 1, 1966, and fifteen per cent (15%) of such funds shall be allocated by said Comptroller on June 1, 1972, based on the following determinations:

"(1) Ninety per cent (90%) of the funds allocated on June 1, 1966, shall be allocated to state institutions based on projected enrollment increases published by the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System for fall 1966 to fall 1978.

"(2) Ten per cent (10%) of the funds allocated on June 1, 1966 shall be allocated to certain of the eligible state institutions based on the number of additional square feet needed in educational and general facilities by such eligible state institution to meet the average square feet per full time equivalent student of all state senior institutions (currently numbering twenty-two).

"(3) All of the funds allocated on June 1, 1972, shall be allocated to certain of the eligible state institutions based on determinations used in the June 1, 1966, allocations except that the allocations of fifty per cent (50%) of the funds allocated on June 1, 1972, shall be based on projected enrollment increases for fall 1972 to fall 1978, and fifty per cent (50%) of such funds allocated on June 1, 1972, shall be based on the need for additional square feet of educational and general facilities.

"Not later than June first of the beginning year of each succeeding ten-year period the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas shall reallocate eighty-five per cent (85%) of the funds to be derived from said Ten Cent (10c) ad valorem tax for said ten-year period and not later than June first of the sixth year of each succeeding ten-year period said Comptroller shall reallocate fifteen per cent (15%) of such funds to the eligible state institutions then in existence based on determinations for the said ten-year period that are similar to the determinations used in allocating funds during the twelve-year period beginning January 1, 1966, except that enrollment projections for succeeding ten-year periods will be from the fall semester of the first year to the fall

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 11 proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing loans to students at institutions of higher education; creating the Texas Opportunity Plan Fund and making provisions relating thereto.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section to read as follows:
"Section 50b. STUDENT LOANS. (a) The Legislature may provide that the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, or its successor or successors, shall have the authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed Eighty-five Million Dollars (\$85,000,000). The bonds authorized herein shall be called 'Texas College Student Loan Bonds,' shall be executed in such form, denominations and upon such terms as may be prescribed by law, provided, however, that the bonds shall not bear more than four per cent (4%) interest per annum; they may be issued in such installments as the Board finds feasible and practical in accomplishing the purposes of this Section.
(b) All moneys received from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited in a fund hereby created in the State Treasury to be known as the Texas Opportunity Plan Fund to be administered by the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, or its successor or successors to make loans to students who have been admitted to attend any institution of higher education within the State of Texas, public or private, including Junior Colleges, which are recognized or accredited under terms and conditions prescribed by the Legislature, and to pay interest and principal on such bonds and provide a sinking fund therefor under such conditions as the Legislature may prescribe.
(c) While any of the bonds, or interest on said bonds authorized by this Section is outstanding and un-

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965.
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 81 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Section 51-a and Subsections 51a-1 and 51a-2 of Article III so that the same shall consist of one section to be known as Section 51-a; providing that the Legislature shall enact appropriate legislation which will enable the State of Texas to cooperate with the Government of the United States in providing assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of needy aged persons over the age of sixty-five (65) who are citizens of the United States or non-citizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least 25 years, needy persons under the age of sixty-five (65) who are totally and permanently disabled and who are citizens of the United States, needy blind persons over the age of eighteen (18) who are citizens of the United States, and needy children under the age of twenty-one (21) years who are citizens of the United States and to the caretakers of such children; providing rehabilitation and any other services included in the Federal legislation providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and for the payment of assistance to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and other services for:
(1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or non-citizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years and are over the age of sixty-five (65) years;
(2) Needy individuals who are citizens of the United States who shall have passed their eighteenth (18th) birthday but have not passed their sixty-fifth (65th) birthday and who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a combination of physical and mental handicaps;
(3) Needy blind persons who are citizens of the United States and who are over the age of eighteen (18) years;
(4) Needy children who are citizens of the United States and who are under the age of twenty-one (21) years, and to the caretakers of such children.
"The Legislature may define the residence requirements, if any, for participation in these programs.
"The Legislature shall have authority to enact appropriate legislation which will enable the State of Texas to cooperate with the Government of the United States in providing assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of needy persons, and in providing rehabilitation and any other serv-

ices included in the Federal legislation providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and to accept and expend funds from the Government of the United States for such purposes in accordance with the laws of the United States as they now are or as they may hereafter be amended, and to make appropriations out of State funds for such purposes; provided that the maximum amount paid out of State funds to or on behalf of any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds; provided that the total amount of such assistance payments and/or medical assistance payments out of State funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds; provided that if the limitations and restrictions herein contained are found to be in conflict with the provisions of appropriate Federal statutes as they now are or as they may be amended, to the extent that Federal matching money is not available to the State for these purposes, then and in that event the Legislature is specifically authorized and empowered to prescribe such limitations and restrictions and enact such laws as may be necessary in order that such Federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care for or on behalf of needy persons; and provided further that the total amount of money to be expended for assistance payments only to recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled, Aid to the Blind, and Aid to Families with Dependent Children shall never exceed Sixty Million Dollars (\$60,000,000).
"Nothing in this Section shall be construed to amend, modify or repeal Section 31 of Article XVI of this Constitution; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision. Nothing herein shall be construed to permit optometrists to treat the eyes for any defect whatsoever in any manner nor to administer nor to prescribe any drug or physical treatment whatsoever, unless such optometrist is a regularly licensed physician or surgeon under the Laws of this State."
Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed

thereon the following:
"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for assistance to and/or medical care for the: (1) needy aged; (2) needy individuals who are permanently and totally disabled; (3) needy blind; and (4) needy children and the caretakers of such children; authorizing the Legislature to cooperate with the Government of the United States in providing assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of such needy persons, and in providing rehabilitation and any other services included in the Federal legislation providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and to accept and expend funds from the Government of the United States for such purposes, and to make appropriations out of State funds for the purpose of providing assistance to and/or medical care and rehabilitation included in the Federal legislation providing matching funds on behalf of such needy persons; providing that the amounts expended out of State funds to and/or on behalf of individuals shall not exceed the amounts that are matchable out of Federal funds; providing that the total amount of such assistance payments and/or medical assistance payments out of State funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds; provided that if the limitations and restrictions herein contained are found to be in conflict with the provisions of appropriate Federal statutes as they now are or as they may be amended, to the extent that Federal matching money is not available to the State for these purposes, then and in that event the Legislature is specifically authorized and empowered to prescribe such limitations and restrictions and enact such laws as may be necessary in order that such Federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care for or on behalf of needy persons; and providing further that the total amount of money to be expended per fiscal year out of State funds for assistance payments only to recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled, Aid to the Blind, and Aid to Families with Dependent Children shall never exceed Sixty Million Dollars (\$60,000,000). Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and held as required by the Constitution and the Laws of the State of Texas.
