Carriers to Deliver Livestock Cards

Rural Carriers across the state will leave livestock survey cards at random along their routes beginning Nov. 20. Information reported on these cards is used to set the yearly inventory of livestock and poultry on Texas farms. Since only an occasion- 51-36. al patron will receive a survey card, it is extremely important that every card be returned so that USDA can get true sample of the State's livestock holdings.

Terrell Williams, carrier on Rural Route 1 out of Baird, will conduct the survey out of the Baird Post Office. Facts and figures in this survey are the basis for Texas and National pig crop reports and inventories of livestock and poultry on farms as of the first of the year. Stockmen and many others use this information in making business decisions.

Survey results will be widely distributed through Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Services, newspapers, farm magazines, radio and television.

Two of the handiest items the hunter can have, Tnsley explains, are a short length of rope and a plastic bag.

First use of the rope is to tie one leg of the deer out of the way while dressing the animal. Then later it is used to hand the deer where it can drain.

The plastic bag can be used to transport the liver and heart to camp, to prevent clothing from becoming bloody.

INTEREST RATES STUDIED Stnte Banking Commissioner J. M. Falkner, on the heels of a new policy announced by U. S. Comptroller of the Currency James J. Saxon, has asked Attv. Gen. Waggoner Carr whether banks may charge the same interest rates as loan com-

Saxon said national banks in Texas may charge the same interest as loan companies regulated by the state. So Falkner wants to know if the State Banking Department should let state banks exceed the constitutional interest limit of 10 per

Texas law authorizes small loan companies to make loans with rates scaled from \$1 interest on a \$5 loan to about 17 per cent for loans up to \$1,500.

Governor Connally vetoed a bill earlier this year authorizing banks to raise their rates to 17% each year on \$100 loans up to \$1,500 and 14% per \$100 on loans between \$1,500 and \$5,000

Question now is whether state banks may charge the same interest rates as loan companies and national banks in Texas. ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES
