New Library Program open for parents in Parmer County

Each month, the Imagination Library will provide an age-appropriate book for each registered child under the age of 5 in Parmer County, absolutely free to the family, regardless of family income. Dolly Parton's Imagination Library was launched in 1995 by The Dollywood Foundation, providing free books to children in Parton's home area of Sevier County, Tennessee. The goal of the program is to inspire a love of books and reading among children.

Last year, the Parmer County Cotton Growers Association presented Camille Osterkamp with the Land O' Lakes Matching Funds grant to help launch Dolly Parton's Imagination Library. DPIL requires a local nonprofit partner, and after multiple generous attempts by local programs, the Friends of the Friona Public Library secured the partnership. Camille Osterkamp said, "I'm so excited to be able to get more books in kids hands. I truly believe that learning to read and to love books at an early age makes a huge difference. I can't wait for kids to get excited about getting their new books in the mail each month."

Children must be registered by a parent or guardian in order to receive the books. There is no charge to register or receive the books. Books are mailed directly to the homes of registered children each month. Registration is open on-line by filling out a brief form at www. imaginationlibrary.com. They may also register by completing a printed registration form available at the Friona Public Library. Completed forms may be mailed to Friends of the Friona Public Library, 109 W. 7th Street, Friona, Texas 79035. Registered children will begin receiving books at their home addresses about eight to 10 weeks after their forms are received. The first book distributed is always the children's classic "The Little Engine That Could."

Since launching in 1995, Dolly Parton's Imagination Library has become the preeminent early childhood book-gifting program in the world. The flagship program of The Dollywood Foundation, a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization, has gifted over 200 million free books in the United States, Canada, United Kingdom, Australia, and the Republic of Ireland. This is achieved through funding shared by The Dollywood Foundation and local community partners like Parmer County Cotton Growers Association. The program's impact has been widely researched, and results demonstrate its positive impact on early childhood development and literacy skills.

"The Friends of the Friona Public Library are proud to be the non-profit sponsor of the Dolly Parton Imagination Library for Parmer County," commented Jeri Lynn White, treasurer of the Friends. "Camille has invested so much time in organizing this program, and we are excited to support a program that encourages children to read and puts books in their hands."



Pattern of abuse at Texas juvenile facilities

A federal investigation into five state facilities concluded children in custody face excessive force, sexual abuse and a lack of vital services, The

Dallas Morning News reported.

At a news conference last week, Kristen Clarke, assistant attorney general in the Justice Department's civil rights division, said children held in those facilities are not receiving the treatment and rehabilitation they are supposed to get.

"Our investigation provides reasonable cause to believe that, far from achieving those objectives, TJJD engaged in a pattern of abuse, deprivation of essential services and disability-related discrimination that seriously harms children and undermines their rehabilitation, all in violation of their rights," Clarke said.

In response, the Texas Juvenile Justice Department said it had made "several significant improvements" in staffing, educational programs and mental health care. The Legislature appropriated more than \$1 billion last session to improve youth facilities.

The youth facilities are located in Gainesville, Edinburg, Brownwood, Giddings and Mart.

Investigators found evidence of physical and sexual abuse, according to the report.

TxDOT adopts long-range transportation plan

"Connecting Texas 2050" was adopted recently by the Texas Transportation Commission to help guide priorities in the next quarter-century. The plan establishes the vision, goals, objectives and strategic recommendations for the state's transportation system.

"With a growing population and new technologies changing how we move, these goals will help us plan for decades to come and connect future generations of Texans," Marc Williams, TxDOT executive director,

The agency held a series of public meetings to gather input from the state's citizens. Among the priorities listed were safety, alternative modes of travel, public transportation options and maintaining the state's existing transportation infrastructure.

Court: Buoys can stay in Rio Grande until trial

cuit of Appeals ruled last week that a 1,000-foot-long barrier of buoys can stay in the Rio Grande until a full trial is held. The buoys, meant to deter illegal migrants, were placed on orders by Gov. Greg Abbott. Their legality was challenged by the federal government, which argues their placement violates federal treaties between the United States and Mex-

At issue is whether this stretch of river is navigable, according to a report in the Texas Standard. A trial over the legal merits was slated to start in an Austin federal court this week.

Flesh-eating bacteria on rise along

Authorities are warning of an outbreak of flesh-eating bacteria, with nearly a dozen people infected thus far, The News reported. Galveston County officials said 11 cases of vibrio infections have been reported this summer, compared to just two at this time last year.

The bacteria occur in coastal waters and are found in higher concentrations when water temperatures are warmer. It can be contracted when an open wound comes into contact with coastal waters, or from eating raw or undercooked shellfish.

"There's no need to panic," Dr. Phillip Keiser, CEO of the Galveston County Health District, said in a statement. "Use common sense: avoid raw seafood, practice good hygiene, and stay informed to keep safe."

The Centers for Disease Control estimates 80,000 cases of vibrio occur in the U.S. each year.

PUC gets 72 applications for energy loan program

The Public Utility Commission received 72 applications for loans available through the Texas Energy Fund, which if all granted would provide \$24.41 billion to finance 38,379 megawatts of power generation projects in the region served by the Electric Reliability Council of Texas.

"Texans have made it clear that they expect reliable electricity today and well into the future, and I am pleased to see industry leaders responding to that call and planning for major investments in dispatchable power for the state," PUCT Chairman Thomas Gleeson said.

The program will provide low-interest loans to finance new construction or upgrades to existing power-generating facilities within the ERCOT region, which serves most of the state. Funding for the loan program was approved by Texas voters in a constitutional amendment election last November.

Nine Texas courthouses get historic grant funding

The Texas Historical Commission recently awarded more than \$46 million in preservation grants to historic courthouses in nine counties. Four grants for full restoration were awarded for courthouses in Comanche, Kimble, Van Zandt and Willacy counties.

Castro and Gonzales counties received planning grants that will create planning road maps for future restoration work. Donley, Duval and Refugio counties received emergency grants to address critical issues endangering these courthouse buildings and affecting their use.

THC has awarded more than \$400 million since the program's inception to restore courthouses in Texas.

"As part of our mission to save the real places that tell the real stories of Texas, we hope to work with even more counties in the future," Joseph Bell, THC executive director, said.

Water board details how it will spend \$1 billion

The Texas Water Development Board last week began detailing how it will divide \$1 billion in taxpayer approved funds for water infrastructure and supply projects throughout the state, The Tribune reported. Up to \$45 million will be reserved for towns with fewer than 1,000 residents, while about \$130 million will go to towns with 1,001 to 10,000 resi-

The board said it plans to spend up to \$450 million toward existing financial assistance programs, \$90 million on water loss and conservation programs, and \$15 million on awareness and educational programming.

"We have a whole lot more applications that are submitted than we have capacity in any given program year to provide financial assistance," said Kathleen Ligon, interim assistant executive administrator at the Water Development Board.

The board has already received 68 requests for funding from this pot of money.





Golden Spread Electric Cooperative, Inc. celebrates its 40th anniversary with a look back at its storied legacy and optimism for the innovation that drives its future.

"Initially, Golden Spread was comprised of 11 Member Cooperatives, and over time, membership grew to include 16 Members providing electric service to a rural territory that includes 24% of Texas' land and portions of Oklahoma, Kansas and Colorado," said Kari Hollandsworth, President and CEO of Golden Spread. "Those Members joined with a true cooperative spirit, realizing the benefits of being an integral partner with other cooperatives."

"Our Members came together so they could meet the financial and operational challenges involved in delivering cost-effective, competitive and reliable power to their end users," said Hollandsworth, who was named CEO in 2020 and was preceded by Bob Bryant from 1984 to 2008 and Mark Schwirtz from 2008 to 2020.

Strategic Board decisions in 1995 led to the construction of Mustang Station near Denver City, Texas, to manage peak load needs. Mustang Station not only fulfilled its initial role but also became a reliable yearround power source for Golden Spread Members.

The early 2010s marked a pivotal era, as the Golden Spread Board charted a transformative course from primarily purchasing power to directly sourcing its own power supply.

The journey to deliver competitive energy solutions yielded significant milestones in 2011 when Antelope Elk Energy Center (AEEC)

at Abernathy, Texas, and Golden Spread Panhandle Wind Ranch, a renewable energy source near Wildorado, Texas, each achieved commercial operation. In 2016, AEEC cleared all the regulatory hurdles to connect the facility to two grids, the Electric Reliability Council of Texas and Southwest Power Pool.

These achievements redefined Golden Spread's operations, increasing its generation capacity and substantially growing its workforce.

"This past year has been particularly outstanding for Golden Spread," Hollandsworth said. "We achieved record sales, benefited from low natural gas prices and enjoyed strong profits from consumers outside of our membership."

in Amarillo and to serve its Members' rural communities. Among many other charitable activities in its vast territory, Golden Spread has given generous college scholarships since 1991.



Grilling Recipes

Here is another kabob recipe but this time with the sweet addition of peaches. This recipe has a great combination of sweet and spicy. Hope you enjoy.

Barbecued Shrimp & Peach Kabobs

Ingredients

- 1 tablespoon packed brown sugar
- 1 teaspoon paprika
- 1/2 to 1 teaspoon ground ancho chile pepper
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cumin
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon freshly ground pepper
- 1/8 to 1/4 teaspoon cayenne pepper
- 1 pound uncooked shrimp (16-20 per pound), peeled and deveined
- 3 medium peaches, each cut into 8 wedges
- 8 green onions (light green and white portion only), cut into 2-inch pieces Olive oil-flavored cooking spray

Directions

Mix brown sugar and seasonings. Place shrimp, peaches and green onions in a large bowl; sprinkle with brown sugar mixture and toss to coat. On four or eight metal or soaked wooden skewers, alternately thread shrimp, peaches and green onions. Lightly spritz both sides of kabobs with cooking spray. Grill, covered, over medium heat or broil 4 in. from heat 3-4 minutes on each side or until shrimp turn pink. Squeeze lime wedges over kabobs.



\$4B in State Sales Tax Revenue for July

Comptrol-Texas ler Glenn Hegar announced this week that state sales tax revenue totaled \$3.99 billion in July, 0.1 percent more than in July 2023. The majority of July sales tax revenue is based on sales made in June and remitted to the agency

in July. "Monthly state sales tax collections were slightly positive compared with the same month a year ago for the second month in a row," Hegar said. "This continues a trend this year of growth at less than the rate of inflation, indicating slowing spending by both businesses and consumers on an inflation-adjusted basis.

"Sales tax remittances from the sectors driven primarily by business spending were mixed, with receipts from the manufacturing and construction sectors coming in greater than their year-ago totals and receipts from the mining and wholesale trade sectors coming in significantly lower than a year ago.

"Receipts from consumer spending-driven sectors were generally flat, with remittances from the retail trade sector being slightly down and receipts from the service sector being slightly up compared to their July 2023 totals.

"Receipts from restaurants were up, but at less than the rate for inflation for food away from home in June."

Total sales tax revenue for the three months ending in July 2024 was up 1.7 percent compared with the same period a year ago. Sales tax is the largest source of state funding for the state budget, accounting for 57 percent of all tax collections.

Texas collected the following revenue from other major taxes: (1) motor vehicle sales and rental taxes — \$599 million, down 4 percent from July 2023; (2) motor fuel taxes — \$319 million, down 3 percent from July 2023; (3) oil production tax — \$557 million, up 27 percent from July 2023; (4) natural gas production tax — \$164 million,

up 152 percent from July 2023; (5) hotel occupancy tax — \$75 million, up 5 percent from July 2023; and (6) alcoholic beverage taxes — \$150 million, up 1 percent from July 2023.






