



New Texas laws now in effect

It took some time, but a set of new laws and rules passed by the Texas Legislature in 2023 went into effect on Sept. 1, the Houston Chronicle reported. Prominent among these are the SCOPE Act, or Securing Children Online Through Parental Empowerment Act, which tightens restrictions for online users younger than 18.

Under the SCOPE Act, users must register their age on social media and other websites. Minors are prohibited from making purchases from those sites, which are also required to filter and block certain material. Examples include content that promotes suicide or bullying, as well as trafficking and other forms of exploitation.

Violators could be fined up to \$10,000 per incident.

One of the bill's co-authors defended its intent.

"Testimony from parents and children in committee gave graphic examples underscoring how desperately we need to better protect kids online," state Rep. Shelby Slawson, R-Granbury, wrote. "The SCOPE Act will do just that."

Others don't agree. The nonprofit Foundation for Individual Rights and Expression sued the state on Aug. 16, challenging the government restric-

"While these efforts to protect young people are well-intentioned, they lack perspective," the lawsuit states.

Another measure that took effect Sept. 1 updates qualifications for family violence shelters that provide lodging and care for domestic abuse victims in order to receive state funding. Criteria now includes providing direct services, establishing a referral service for victims, and having been in operation at least a year.

Eliminating property taxes would require massive funding

Eliminating the state's property taxes is high on the wish list of some Republican lawmakers. They received a reality check last week when state budget officials said doing so would require the state to produce \$81 billion each year to cover the costs of public schools, as well as the revenue now received by cities, counties and special taxing districts through property taxes.

The Texas Tribune reported that Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick directed the Legislative Budget Board to tally the costs of replacing property tax revenue, which funds teacher salaries, law enforcement and many other gov-

ernment functions. Eliminating the tax likely would require a massive increase in sales tax rates - something that appears highly unlikely.

State Sen. Paul Bettencourt, R-Houston, is Patrick's chief lieutenant on property taxes. He noted \$81.5 billion is "a huge amount of money to be able to replicate."

Lawmakers have worked to lower property tax bills the past few sessions by raising the homestead exemption and limiting how much school districts and local governments can collect. But without a state income tax, lawmakers are limited in how to completely replace property taxes with another form of revenue.

Perry joins Phelan's team as adviser

Former Gov. Rick Perry has joined House Speaker Dade Phelan's office as a senior adviser, the Texas Standard reported. The embattled speaker, who survived a tough runoff race, now faces at least three Republican challengers to his speakership.

"[Gov. Perry] understands every facet of the legislative process, and that will be a tremendous asset as we work to strengthen our state's economy, improve education and ensure every member's voice is heard in the Texas House this session," Phelan said in a statement.

Phelan has been under fire for backing an ultimately unsuccessful attempt to impeach Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton and for being perceived as not conservative enough by some of his Republican colleagues.

Perry will serve as a volunteer adviser until the 89th Legislature begins in January.

Schools hiring more uncertified teachers

Critical teaching shortages in Texas are compelling school districts to hire more teachers who have not received formal classroom training, The Texas Tribune reported.

The number of uncertified teachers in the state's public schools has risen dramatically since the COVID-19 pandemic, which prompted many longtime educators to leave the profession for various reasons - health concerns, lack of resources, and feeling burned out. As a result, uncertified teachers, many of whom work in rural school districts, accounted for about 38% of newly hired instructors last year.

Since 2015, school districts under the District of Innovation law have been able to hire people with different professional experience who then would work on getting certified through alternative certification programs. The last legislative session ended with no significant base funding increases, leaving many school districts with budget shortfalls, and making it even harder to fill teacher vacancies.

"When you have a state where their coffers are full and local school districts where their coffers are empty, or in the process of being empty, you're going to have to have some state help to make sure that we're funding these types of programs," said Mark Henry, who served as Cy-Fair ISD's superintendent for more than a decade.

According to the Texas Education Agency, the attrition rate among Texas teachers has increased since the start of the pandemic from 9% to 12%. Texas ranks 30th in the nation for average teacher pay — \$8,828 less than the national average, according to the National Education Association.

Paxton suing Bexar County over mail voter plan

Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton is suing Bexar County over its plan to mail voter registration forms to unregistered residents en masse, the Austin American-Statesman reported. The Bexar County Commissioners Court approved the voter registration plan last week, defying Paxton's warning that he would take them to

Paxton's suit argues that mail applications could entice felons and other ineligible people to register to vote. Commissioner Justin Rodriguez defended the plan.

"From our perspective, this was never a Democrat or Republican endeavor," Rodriguez told the Statesman. "It was making sure we used the resources within the elections office to be innovative, to be proactive when it came to registering voters, and we felt pretty strongly that we're doing everything (as it is) allowed by the Elections Code."

Paxton has warned repeatedly of potential voter fraud in November's general election. However, he has not provided evidence of widespread voter fraud in Texas, the Statesman reported.





State Sales Tax Revenue Totaled \$4B in August

State Comptroller Glenn Hegar announced that state sales tax revenue totaled \$4 billion in August, 0.4 percent more than in August 2023. The majority of August sales tax revenue is based on sales made in July and remitted to the agency in August.

"August sales tax collections grew modestly from a year ago, and at less than the rate of general price inflation," Hegar said.

"Growth was muted from both consumer and

business spending-driven sectors, as consumer spending continued to subside from the post-pandemic inflationary surge and employment growth stalled in July.

"Sales tax receipts among sectors reliant on business spending were mixed, with gains observed from construction and wholesale trade and declines from mining and manufacturing. Consumers continued to boost receipts for the services sector significantly, but

receipts from retail trade grew barely more than 1 percent over the previous year.

"Receipts from restaurants declined slightly from a year ago, the first decline for the sector since the pandemic."

Sales tax is the largest source of state funding for the state budget, accounting for 57 percent of all tax collections.

Texas collected the following revenue from other major taxes in August: (1) motor vehicle sales and rental taxes - \$649 million, down 2 percent from August 2023; (2) motor fuel taxes — \$330 million, up 0.2 percent from August 2023; (3) oil production tax - \$543 million, up 8 percent from August 2023; (4) natural gas production tax — \$80 million, down 42 percent from August 2023; (5) hotel occupancy tax — \$69 million, down 2 percent from August 2023; and (6) alcoholic beverage taxes — \$139 million, down 6 percent from August 2023.

Small Town Cookin' By Jeri Lynn White

Tomatoes

This is a unique way to use up those tomatoes. The reviews on this recipe say it is good on grilled cheese sandwiches and scrambled eggs. Hope you enjoy.

Tomato Bacon Jam

Ingredients

½ pound smoked bacon

2 pounds ripe tomatoes, chopped

1 yellow sweet onion, finely diced 1 cup white sugar

2 ½ tablespoons apple cider vinegar

1 ½ teaspoons salt

¼ teaspoon black pepper

1 dash hot pepper sauce (such as Tabasco) (Optional)

Directions

Cook bacon in a large skillet over medium-high heat, turning occasionally, until evenly browned, about 10 minutes. Drain bacon slices on paper towels. Crumble bacon when cool. Stir tomatoes, sweet onion, sugar, apple cider vinegar, salt, black pepper, and hot sauce together in a saucepan and bring to a boil, stirring constantly to dissolve sugar. Stir in crumbled bacon and cook over medium heat, stirring often, until the spread is very thick, about 1 hour. Adjust salt and black pepper. Cool and spoon into a clean 1-pint glass jar with a lid; store in the refrigerator for 1 week or frozen for 2 months. If freezing put spread into small jars and let jars thaw in refrigerator overnight before using.

Gas prices continue slide

Average gasoline prices in Texas fell 2.2 cents last week, averaging \$2.80 per gallon, according to Gas-Buddy's survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. According to Gas-Buddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas was priced at \$2.19 while the most expensive was \$3.73 per gallon.

The national average price of gasoline fell 7.2 cents last week, averaging \$3.22 per gallon. The national average price of diesel has declined 4.5 cents in the last week and stands at \$3.62 per gallon, the lowest since early 2022.

"Impressively, for the sixth straight week, gas prices have dropped to their lowest since winter. GasBuddy now counts 11 states and over 45,000 stations with gas prices below \$3 per gallon," said Patrick De Haan, head of petroleum analysis at GasBuddy.

"With oil prices falling below \$70 per barrel, their lowest since 2021, there's solid room for gas prices and diesel to continue falling for some time. We expect the national average could fall below \$3 per gallon as early as October for the first time since 2021," De Haan noted.

GasBuddy data is compiled from more than 11 million weekly price reports covering over 150,000 gas stations across the country.

but to truly see that Jesus is the King of Kings and Lord of Lords. The students listened intently, and will hopefully respond obediently in the days and weeks ahead. Thank you Pastor Paul for your message!

In all honesty, though, its not just the students who are prone to reduce Jesus to simply an endorsement of our lifestyles. Political parties love to stamp Jesus' endorsement on their ticket, but have no intention of lining up with God's word, and many believers have settled for a lukewarm, powerless faith, that brings little transformation and change to their lives. Welcoming Prodigals Home

In the last few weeks, I have heard two real-life prodigal son stories. In one story, the young man was told by his father that he would come crawling back home. When he did come home, it was more of an "I told you so" attitude on the part of the parents, and there is still a big, thick wall between the prodigal and his family.

In the other story, problems arose after the prodigal returned, and the prodigal moved and started a life for himself elsewhere.

When I heard these stories, I couldn't help but wonder why people can't welcome prodigals with open arms, like Jesus welcomes us when we admit we have messed up; why people aren't thrilled the lost has found his/her way home; why we aren't willing to help the prodigal get another start in

As I have written before, for the longest time, I saw myself as the oldest son in Jesus' parable in Luke 15:11-32, because I am the type that stays home and does what I am supposed to do. If my brother had been a prodigal, would I have welcomed him home with open arms? It would depend on my age and where I am in life. As a 30 year-old, I wouldn't have welcomed him; I would have been jealous of all the attention he was receiving; and my attitude toward him would not be forgiving!

At nearly 70, I see myself as a parent, and I work at seeing people like Father God sees us, and I would hope I would be welcoming, that I would help her/him any way I could, with boundaries. Having dealt with a prodigal, trust was a big issue with me. I wasn't sure I could let things go back to the way they were because I wasn't sure I could trust; behaviors do have consequences.

Surrendering pride is a great way to begin reconciliation. Hopefully the prodigal surrendered pride before starting his/her journey home, and hopefully the family receiving the prodigal surrenders their pride, whether it be concern for themselves and their feelings of hurt, jealousy, anger, etc. Surrendering pride knocks down a lot of walls, and is a jump start to welcoming a prodigal home.

Forgiveness is another place to start in welcoming home a prodigal, on the part of the prodigal and the person having trouble welcoming home the prodigal. Sometimes we have to forgive more than once.

Taking life a little slow and easy helps, and patience goes a long way when a prodigal returns. Everyone changes when a prodigal leaves home and then returns. It takes adjustments, and it takes sorting out things to get life back to as close to "normal" as pos-

Praying is essential while a prodigal is gone from home, and when he/she returns. We want God's hand on our prodigal at all times while they are gone, but we also want His hand on us as we navigate life without our prodigal, and then when he/she comes home! Putting the whole situation of a prodigal in God's hand and letting Him handle it seems too easy, like we aren't doing enough to "fix" our prodigal, but God always knows best and what needs to be done!

Loving a prodigal, even when you are hurt, jealous, angry, etc. is the greatest thing for a prodigal, and you, when he/she returns home. It can take courage for a prodigal to leave. They think they are doing the right thing; that it is their life, and they can live it the way they want; but for sure, it takes courage to go home and have to face no telling what kind of reaction. Welcoming a prodigal home like the father did in Jesus' story of the prodigal son, knowing that he was loved, began the building of a father/son relationship. The way the older brother reacted made building a brother/brother relationship more difficult.

Life is short. We all have choices to make. I hate it when people, especially in families, are estranged. Sometimes we have to do things we don't want to do; we have to take that first step; we have to give that first hug; we have to be the first to say "I'm sorry", but it is definitely worth it when a relationship is healed!








