Vehicle inspections end in 2025

Texas car safety inspections will no longer be required in 2025, after HB 3297 passed the Legislature in 2023. The Austin American-Statesman reported inspections end Jan. 1, though drivers living in and near major Texas cities will still be required to take their vehicles in for emission tests.

Although actual inspection is ending, all noncommercial vehicles in Texas still will be charged a \$7.50 inspection fee when the vehicle is registered with the Texas Department of Motor Vehicles.

Counties requiring emission tests to comply with federal cleanair requirements are Brazoria, Collin, Dallas, Denton, El Paso, Ellis, Fort Bend, Galveston, Harris, Johnson, Kaufman, Montgomery, Parker, Rockwall, Tarrant, Travis and Williamson. Costs range from \$11.50 to \$35.50, depending on what tests are required.

Diesel vehicles and motorcycles are exempt from emissions testing.

PUC secures refunds, credits

The Public Utility Commission has secured refunds and bill credits totaling \$502,982 for Texas electric, water and telecommunications customers for fiscal year 2024, which ended Aug. 31. Nearly 13,000 complaints were filed by consumers during the fiscal year.

"Protecting consumers is the first commitment listed in our agency's mission statement, and our staff works every day to make sure Texas utility consumers are treated fairly and receive high quality service," Chris Burch, with the PUC, said.

The bulk of refunds and credits were for electric customers.

Customers who believe they were unfairly charged can file a complaint at puc.texas.gov/consumer/complaint.

Bitcoin plant expansion faces backlash in North Texas

A proposal to build a new 300-megawatt power plant next to two existing neighborhoods in Granbury drew about 150 angry residents to a public meeting hosted by the Texas Commission of Environmental Quality last week.

Marathon Digital, a Floridabased cryptocurrency company, operates a 300-megawatt bitcoin mine on property owned by Constellation Energy, according to the San Antonio Express-News. Residents have complained about the constant noise coming from thousands of fans used to cool the banks of computers processing bitcoin transactions.

Constellation hopes to erect

eight new turbines powered by natural gas to generate additional electricity and has applied for air permits to release nearly 800,000 added tons of carbon dioxide each year. Residents near the plant objected.

"It's not right. Y'all moved in on top of us. We didn't move in on v'all," said Nick Browning, who lives about 800 feet from the property.

Texas leads the nation in bitcoin mining, which is an electronic payment system that forgoes use of banks and credit card companies and requires vast amounts of computing power. TCEQ officials have not decided whether to grant a permit for a new plant. Constellation says the new plant would only operate about 40% of the year and "would be prohibited from directly serving industrial load," such as bitcoin. However, opponents say the new plant would allow existing plants to be used for more bitcoin mining than being done now.

you vote, all ballots are paper. If you vote on our ExpressVote, you touch the screen and it prints your selection. You have the opportunity to review your choices twice before placing it in the ballot box. You can make any changes if you desire to by asking a poll worker how to correct your ballot.

If you color in your bubble, you must make sure you do not "color outside the lines" or mark an X or circle your choice because those won't count. That is why we prefer the ExpressVote. There is no question using that voting method.

All paper ballots can be counted, recounted, and audited to ensure accuracy. After each Election we must audit a certain percentage of our ballots to ensure accuracy and report that information to the Secretary of State.

Poll Books are connected to each other. If you vote in Friona, they know in Lazbuddie, Bovina, and Farwell that you have already voted. No one can vote more than once.

There is also false information that if your ballot has writing on it that it is not valid. By Election Code the presiding judge in the polling place must sign or stamp their signature on the ballot. This prevents someone from stuffing non-valid or fake ballots in the ballot box.





City Council covers wide-ranging agenda

The Friona City Council met in regular session on Monday, August 12, 2024 at 6:30 p.m. in the City Council Chambers at 617 Main in Friona, Texas. The meeting began with roll call, an invocation, and the Pledge of Allegiance. Council member Cindy Moreno was not present.

A public hearing regarding the proposed city budget and tax rate was held at 6:30 p.m. and no individuals addressed the council concerning either of the items.

The proposed 2024-25 Budget for the City of Friona was approved by a unanimous 4-0 vote. The proposed tax rate of .5852/\$100 valuation was also approved. A separate vote for the General Fund and the Interest & Sinking Fund was required. By law, council members voted individually. Both motions passed by a 4-0 unanimous vote.

The 2024-25 proposed budget for the Friona Economic Development Corporation (FEDC) was also approved. The FEDC receives 25 percent of the sales tax allocation money distributed to the City of Friona from the State of Texas. The Chamber of Commerce receives 10 percent of the FEDC amount to help fund its operations.

End-of-year transfers from the water account and the sewer account to the capital improvement fund in the amounts of \$75,100 and \$43,590 respectively were approved. The funds will be used for capital improvement projects in

the future.

A motion to accept the proposed 2024-25 Fee Schedule was approved.

A construction contract with Oasis Water Playground, Inc. was approved for the construction of a \$300,000.00 Splash Pad for the City of Friona. The project is funded by a 2024 Texas Parks and Wildlife grant awarded to the city.

A negotiated settlement between an Executive Committee of Cities and Atmos Energy concerning a rate increase was approved. The amount of the increase was mediated by the Texas Public Utilities Commission (PUC). A rate increase proposed by Southwestern Public Service was denied by the city council and will be arbitrated in much the same manner as the Atmos request.

In other business, the accounts payable for August 2024 were approved as well as the financial statement for August 2024. Also, Minutes of the August 12th regular meeting, August 22nd special meeting, September 4th tax rate meeting, and the September 4th budget workshop meeting were approved.

A motion was approved to increase the fees for the collection of residential and commercial garbage. Residential customers will see a 15% increase and commercial customers will see a 18% increase. The increases are due to the new agreement signed with Republic Services which included different collection dates and added an extra roll-off box. A 5% increase is

projected for next year. A motion to approve a request from Efrain Balli to receive outside city limit water and sewer service, as well as the costs for such such services, at 1619 West 10th Street in Friona was approved.

A motion to designate the Friona Star as the City of Friona's official newspaper was approved.

A motion to adopt administrative rules regarding the consumption of alcohol at City of Friona rental facilities and on City of Friona properties was approved. The rules are in accordance with TABC guidelines. Publication of the rules will be announced at a later date.

The City of Friona approved a one-year agreement with Parmer County to maintain a roll-off box to be used by residents of the county. The city will receive \$15,000 from the county to defray expenses and the roll-off box will be located at East 8th and South Jackson Ave. in Friona, next to the city roll-off boxes. Plans are to start opening the roll-off boxes each Saturday instead of the first Saturday of the month.

City Hall will be closed on September 26th and 27th in order to conduct year-end procedures. The next scheduled regular meeting is Tuesday, October 15th due to the Columbus Day holiday on Monday.

All meetings are open to the public. Information in this article is only a summary.

Small Town Cookin' By Jeri Lynn White

Tomatoes

This is a quick way to use up an over abundance of tomatoes. The reviews suggested you can use Italian seasoning if you don't have rosemary, and a sprinkle of grated parmesan or mozzarella cheese is also delicious. It was also suggested to sauté the garlic before you add it to the tomatoes if you want to be sure it is fully cooked. Ingredients

2 tablespoons olive oil, divided, or as needed 1 large tomato, cut into 1/2-inch-thick slices 1 sprig fresh rosemary, leaves stripped and finely chopped 1 clove garlic, minced

salt and ground black pepper to taste

Directions

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C). Brush a baking sheet with about 1 table-spoon olive oil. Arrange tomato slices on the baking sheet; sprinkle rosemary and garlic on top. Brush with the remaining 1 tablespoon olive oil; season with salt and pepper. Bake in the preheated oven until tender, 5 to 10 minutes.

Gas prices keep falling

Average gasoline prices in Texas fell 13.2 cents last week, averaging \$2.67 per gallon, according to GasBuddy's survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. According to GasBuddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas was priced at \$1.99 while the most expensive was \$3.59 per gallon.

The national average price of gasoline fell 6.9 cents last week, averaging \$3.15 per gallon. The national average price of diesel declined 3.4 cents last week and stands at \$3.57 per gallon, the lowest level

since January 2022.

"Gasoline prices continue to crumble across nearly the entire nation, with average prices below \$3 per gallon in 18 states, with some 65,000 stations selling below that psychological mark. Diesel prices are also falling and are at their lowest level in nearly 1,000 days," said Patrick De Haan, head of petroleum analysis at GasBuddy.

GasBuddy data is compiled from more than 11 million weekly price reports covering over 150,000 gas stations across the country.

Commissioners approve budget and tax rate

Parmer County Commissioners met in regular session on Thursday, September 12, 2024 at 10:00 a.m. in the County Courtroom of the Parmer County Courthouse in Farwell, Texas. The meeting began with prayer and the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag and Texas Flag.

There were no comments from the public during the public hearing or the open forum. Minutes from the August 26th regular meeting were read and approved.

Commissioners approved the payment of the accounts payables as presented by County Treasurer Sharon May. The Treasurer's Payroll Report was also approved.

By a unanimous 5-0 vote, Commissioners voted to approve a budget of \$7,896,988.22 for fiscal year 2025. A 2024 tax rate of 0.3800/\$100 valuation was also approved by a unanimous 5-0 vote.

Sheriff Geske reported that the Parmer County Law Enforcement Center is currently housing 21 inmates, 16 from Parmer County and 5 from

Lamb County.

A Memorandum of Understanding with the Auto Theft Task Force was approved. This non-binding agreement involves the implementation of the Catalytic Converter Grant. Cameras will be installed on Highway 60 and 70/84 to capture photos of license plates. The Sheriff's Office will be notified by local law enforcement agencies in our surrounding counties when a potential crime has been

committed and help is needed to track a suspect's vehicle. Activation of the system is not limited to auto theft.

Renewal of a Maintenance Agreement with White Services of Lubbock concerning the Law Enforcement Center's HVAC system was approved. A Maintenance Agreement renewal with Tremco was tabled

Sheriff Geske announced that the annual National Night Out event, which honors local first responders, is scheduled for Tuesday, October 1st from 6:00 - 8:00 p.m. at the Law Enforcement Center located at 300 4th Street in Farwell.

In other business, approval was given to repair a water line under County Road B in Precinct 2. Also, installation of a new water line under County Road B was also approved. The two water lines are at different locations on CR B. The next Commissioner's meeting is scheduled for September 23rd.

All meetings are open to the public. Information in this article is only a summary.

Listen Close

In my morning quiet time of prayer and reading the Bible I recently read through the Psalms and it was rich and challenging. Spending a few moments in the Word before going to work is a time to hear from the Lord and draw near to him in preparation for the day. I am thankful for how the Lord speaks through His word and how the Holy Spirit highlights what I need to hear. Psalm 85:8, says, "Let me hear what God the Lord will speak, for he will speak peace to his people, to his saints; but let them not turn back to folly." I don't know how I didn't already have that

verse marked, but it is so rich and raises some convicting questions to ask myself.

First, am I listening to the Lord? In our world that is striving for the wrong things and headed in a hellish direction, I must carve out time to hear from the Lord. This is true in my role as pastor, but this is equally true for each one of us who know the Lord as well. Satan is a great deceiver, but he is also an excellent distractor, and I must battle the clutter that keeps me from the Lord. Next, notice that God speaks peace to His saints. In a world of turmoil and sin, the peace that passes understanding flows in part from God's Word to His children. When I look for peace and tranquility am I looking to the Lord and listening to His word?

Final question, am I turning back to folly in any areas of my life? The final warning of Psalm 85:8 warns against turning back to folly after drawing near to the Lord. True confession, the "Don't just pretend to love others. Really love them... Love each other with genuine affection" convicted me. I can quickly name three family members I can't honestly say I love with what I consider "genuine affection". Cole says, "To love God, we must first understand that He first loved us (1 John 4:19). Romans 5:8 says, 'But God demonstrates His own love toward us, in that while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us."

Cole further states that, "Based on Christ's self-sacrificing love on the cross, we can define biblical love as 'a self-sacrificing, caring commitment that shows itself in seeking the highest good of the one loved.' If you're not seeking to live out that kind of love in relationships, you're disobeying God. By the power of the indwelling Holy Spirit, you can choose to sacrifice your selfish interests on behalf of others with the aim that they will be conformed to the image of Christ (their highest good). The first fruit that results from walking in the Spirit is love (Galatians 5:16, 22-23)."

As Scripture tells us, our love must be without hypocrisy. It has to be real and genuine; it has to be

sincere; it can't be fake. You can't be all loveydovey with someone and then trash them behind their back. Cole says, "Biblical love must be wise and discerning, always keeping in mind the highest good of the one loved." Sometimes that means confronting sin, not ignoring it; sometimes you have to teach people something. Your motive has to be to help the person grow in Godliness and conforming to the image of Jesus Christ.

I can honestly say I am "kindly affectionate" to these ladies. I have never been ugly to them; I have always taken them for who they are for the sake of family peace. In other words, I let them have their say, but I stay quiet. If I get the courage, I hope to ask them some day how the two justify their beliefs about Scripture when what they believe is not in Scripture. 
City to receive \$55K in **Monthly Sales Tax Revenue**

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar announced today last week that he will send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose districts \$1.1 billion in local sales tax allocations for September. This amount represents a 6.3 percent increase over September 2023. These allocations are based on sales made in July by businesses that report tax monthly.

The City of Friona will receive \$55,832.72 in sales tax allocation for September. This amount represents a 0.13 percent increase over the September 2023 total of \$55,754.88. For year-to-date 2024, the total is \$494,868.69 which is a 0.42 percent decrease as compared to YTD for 2023 of \$496,958.91. The FEDC will receive \$13,958.18 of the August allocation for its operating budget.




quiet and observant, hardworking truck driver and mechanic. He loved playing with his grandchildren, watching wrestling on TV and had an amazing John Deere toy collection.



DPS Issues Reminders for Child Passenger Safety Week

In recognition of Child Passenger Safety Week, which runs Sept. 15-20, the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) is reminding drivers to educate themselves on the best child safety seat practices in order to keep our state's youngest passengers safe on the road.

"Children mimic the adults around them, so it is critical for parents, grandparents and loved ones to model the importance of wearing seatbelts and following other safe practices in the car," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "A child's best protection in a vehicle collision is to be buckled up correctly in the right car seat - and the department urges all drivers to make sure they know what those best practices are as soon as possible."

According to the U.S. Department of Transportation's National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHT-SA), motor vehicle crashes are a leading cause of death for chil-

dren ages 1 through 13. In 2022 alone, there were 1,129 children killed in motor vehicle crashes.

DPS offers the following tips to ensure children are properly restrained while riding in a vehicle:

- When selecting a car seat for your child, ensure it fits in your vehicle properly before purchasing it.
- Avoid purchasing a car seat if you are not aware of the history (i.e. yard sales, social media platforms).
- Model good behavior to young passengers and make sure you are wearing your seatbelt so your children will know it's the right thing to do.
- Infant car seats should always be rearfacing, and never used forward-facing.
- Be sure to check the maximum height and weight limits of the car seat so children may be properly transitioned to the next one.
- For older children who are using booster seats with lap belts, ensure the belt is across

the pelvic area and the shoulder belt strap is placed across the shoulder. It should never be placed along a child's neck or abdominal area. It should never be used under the arm or behind the back as it could cause severe injury in a crash.

- Texas law states all children younger than 8 years old, unless taller than 4'9", are required to be in the appropriate car seat wherever they ride in a passenger vehicle. The car seat MUST be installed according to the manufacturer's instructions.
- Children 8 years and older must be in a seatbelt, if an adult hasn't properly restrained a child, they can receive a \$250 ticket.

Certified technicians are available to inspect your car seat installation or assist with the process at locations across the state. Visit the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration website to find a location near you.



Reimagining Texas' Health Care System by Investing in Primary Care Research and Innovation

Until 2021, most Texans didn't think twice about the state's electrical grid. But that year, the grid widely failed when an Arctic snowstorm strained its capacity, leaving millions without electricity or heat for several days, wreaking havoc on the state. The collective shock of that experience drew Texans' attention to the fact that the electrical grid needs regular maintenance, investment, and research and development to ensure it can keep pace with the state's growing population and changing energy needs.

Like the electrical grid, Texas' primary care system has struggled to keep pace with the needs of a modern state. Of the state's 254 counties, 224 are designated as primary care health professional shortage areas. Is it any wonder that getting a primary care appointment can be a nightmare, even if you already have a primary care physician? In a state brimming with world class medical schools, health sci-

ence centers, and hospitals, many Texans have been left scratching their heads, asking how the state's primary care system got to this point.

We know a robust primary care "grid" is vital to Texas' interests, serving as the bedrock of the state's health care system. Numerous studies show that robust access to primary care benefits both individual patients and communities. Patients with a regular primary care relationship have better health outcomes, higher satisfaction, and lower overall health care costs, while communities with higher numbers of primary practices enjoy better and more equitable population health, making primary care a common good — like electricity.

Nationally, primary care practices provide more than one in three health care visits and often serve as the only source of care for patients, including people with chronic conditions, such as diabetes, or mental health needs. For underserved communities, primary care often is the only

option.

Increasing the number of primary care physicians practicing in Texas is the first step to fixing this problem, and it's a step Texas has taken. Over the past several legislative sessions, lawmakers have allocated significant funds to expand graduate medical education, grow rural primary care training programs, increase access to primary care loan repayment, incubate new federally qualified health centers, and more.

However, expanding the primary care workforce without better understanding how to optimize the practice of primary care, its integration into the larger health care system, and its ability to adapt to a rapidly growing population is like installing more power lines without knowing if they're going to the right place or can handle the load. Texas should now pair investments in its primary care workforce with research into how to improve its efficacy and ingenuity, developing strategies to improve patient management, health outcomes, and interprofessional collaboration. In other words, Texas must help primary care practices adapt now so they will be available in the future.

Research dollars dedicated to primary care account for only 0.3% of all federal research funding. Texas similarly spends little to no dollars specifically on primary care practice improvement. As a result, primary care clinicians are reliant upon research conducted in settings unlike theirs or among patient populations that do not directly correspond to primary care.

According to the National Academy of Science, Engineering and Medicine, "The neglect of basic primary care research ... not only adversely affects primary care outcomes but also leads to the lack of a population-based understanding of illness and disease along the health care spectrum. Better [primary care research] support could lead to answers to questions

that are critically important for improving population health."

Texas can solve this deficiency by establishing and funding its own Primary Care Research and Innovation Lab, in partnership with the state's health science centers, with the express purpose of evaluating strategies to improve primary care resiliency, capacity, access, efficacy, cost effectiveness, and interprofessional, primary care collaboration.

As the state's primary care system goes, so goes the rest of the health care system. Texas has long incubated state-of-the-art medical and specialty services, such as cancer research to improve cancer treatment, with the goal of improving the health of its own residents as well as the nation. That expertise now should be harnessed to research and reimagine a sustainable, resilient, integrated, cost-effective, and accessible primary care model that can power Texas' health




VDG visits Noon Lions Club


