

County 4-H Members Awarded Gold Stars

District 2 Texas 4-H held its Gold Star Banquet Tuesday evening in Lubbock. Two Parmer County senior 4-H members, Peyton Schueler and Aubrey Schueler, were honored.

The Gold Star is the highest award given by the Texas 4-H Youth Development Program. County Offices and Agents are asked to maintain a high level of integrity and honor through their selection process of county Gold Star recipients.

At the minimum, the following guidelines should be used in the eligibility and selection process for each county: (1) The member must have at least completed, or be completing their 9th grade school year at the time of application, and must have completed at least 3 years in 4-H, including the current year. (2) The Texas 4-H Gold Star Award can only be awarded once in a member's 4-H career. (3) The 4-H member must have completed

submit a Texas 4-H record book in the year they are to be consid-



Mobile STEM Lab Visits Friona Junior High

This is a three-part article on the recent visit of Learning Undefeated's Texas Mobile STEM Lab to Friona Junior High students. Part 1 is an introduction, Part 2 covers the learning experience, and Part 3 is a summary and student reaction.

Part 3 — Student Reaction

An Exit Poll was conducted with the students after their visit to the mobile STEM lab. They were asked questions about their lab experience.

When asked about the favorite part of the lab, Brianna Rocha responded, "Building stuff, I really enjoy engineering." Dustin Shields added, "Trying to build the bridge with limited time and resources." Noah Beltran opined, "When my bridge collapsed under the smallest amount of pressure."

When asked if the STEM lab was fun, Luis Grado answered, *Yes, but it took work to make a bridge for a wagon to try to cross it."

When asked if you would like to participate again with a different lab, Ian Vazquez replied, "Maybe, but I really liked the bridge one." Fernando Moreno replied, "Yes, even if it was a completely different subject, because my favorite part was working with my group."

Learning Undefeated's Texas Mobile STEM Lab visit to Friona Junior High was a success as it gave the students a hands-on experience with science, technology, engineering, and mathematics. It challenged them and left them wanting more.



Commissioners Approve Reinvestment Zone

Parmer County Commissioners met in regular session on Thursday, September 23, 2024 at 10:00 a.m. in the County Courtroom of the Parmer County Courthouse in Farwell, Texas. The meeting began with prayer and the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag and Texas Flag.

Commissioners approved a resolution designating a Parmer-Lazbuddie Wind Reinvestment Zone #2, establishing boundaries, and providing an Effective Date. An amended and restated Tax Abatement Agreement with Lazbuddie Wind Energy LLC was also approved as well as an amend-

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ed and restated Tax Abatement Agreement with Lazbuddie Wind Energy II LLC. All three actions were pursuant to Chapter 312 of the Texas Tax Code.

Sheriff Geske reported that he was currently housing 20 inmates which includes 12 from Lamb County and 1 from Castro County. Also, the K-9 unit plans to visit all of the county's schools.

In other business, commissioners approved a motion to deposit the TAC HEBP Surplus Check, in the amount of \$27,828.69, into the Healthy County account. The funds would enable the county ness Incentive Program. Also, a state-mandated Election Cyber Security Plan was discussed and approved.







Lower prices for gas and diesel

Average gasoline prices in Texas fell 2.3 cents last week, averaging \$2.70, according to GasBuddy's survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. According to GasBuddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas was \$2.15 while the most expensive was \$3.59 per gallon.

The national average price of gasoline fell 3.3 cents last week, averaging \$3.13 per gallon. The national average price of diesel declined 1.3 cents in the last week and stands at \$3.56 per gallon.

"The median U.S. price for gasoline just slipped below the \$3 per gallon mark for the first time since early 2024, while the national average price of gasoline declined as oil prices have begun to cool off after Iran's attack on Israel, due in part to sources saying Israel has agreed not to attack Iran's oil infrastructure," said Patrick De Haan, head of petroleum analysis at GasBuddy.

GasBuddy data is compiled from more than 11 million weekly price reports covering over 150,000 gas stations across the country.

Pumpkin

This week I found a savory pumpkin dish that sounds delicious. The website says, "... let me clarify that this recipe is not sweet, nor does it taste anything like pumpkin pie. Instead, the pumpkin puree and cheese give the sauce a rich alfredo-like texture that coats the pasta with a savory flavor." Since this only uses one cup of pumpkin, it is a good way to use up a partially used can. Hope you enjoy.

Easy Pumpkin Pasta Sauce

Ingredients

16 ounces penne pasta 2 tablespoons olive oil 2 garlic cloves, minced 1 cup pumpkin puree

1 cup reserved pasta water ½ cup half and half 34 cup milk

1/4 teaspoon nutmeg

1 teaspoon salt 1 cup shredded Parmesan cheese, plus more for serving

Directions

Cook the pasta according to package directions, reserve 1 cup pasta water, drain, and set aside. In a large skillet, heat the oil over medium-high heat. Add the garlic and sauté for about 30 seconds, until fragrant. Add the pumpkin puree and half of the reserved pasta water. Whisk until a smooth

paste forms. Stir in the half and half milk, nutmeg, and salt to the sauce bring to a simmer while occasionally stirring. Cook for 5 minutes or until thickened and smooth. Add in the grated Parmesan and whisk until the cheese is dissolved. Add the cooked pasta to the sauce and toss to combine. Add a little more pasta water if your sauce is too thick. Top with additional Parmesan cheese and serve.

Tool helps students learn which universities will accept them

Texas high school students can now see which of the state's public universities would accept them based on their academic information, using a new tool called Direct Admissions, according to the Texas Standard. The tool is meant to streamline the college application process and let students quickly know participating which Texas public universities will accept them based on their class rank, grade point aver-

age, and test scores. "Direct Admissions has the potential to reduce time, boost confidence, and increase transparency, encouraging Texans who might not otherwise consider college to take the next step," Interim Commissioner of Higher Education Sarah Keyton said in a press release.

A total of 31 public universities in the state are using the new tool.

Meanwhile, the Texas Higher Education Coordinating **Board** is extending the state

financial aid application priority deadline a month to Feb. 15 for the 2025-2026 application cycle because of continued delays with the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA), which slowed applications last school year.

The state's priority deadline is intended to encourage students to complete their application promptly in order to raise the likelihood of receiving state funding.

Early vaccinations urged as flu season arrives

The Texas Department of State Health Services is urging Texans to get vaccinated against flu as soon as possible, as cases traditionally begin to rise this time of year. It takes about two weeks for the body to make flu antibodies after getting the shot.

"We recommend everyone ages six months and older get a flu shot as soon as possible," said DSHS Commissioner Jennifer Shuford.

People with the flu are most contagious in the first three days of illness, with the virus

being spread through droplets. Vaccines for other respiratory illnesses, such as VOCI-19 and RSV, are also available and can be taken at the same time as a flu shot, depending on advice from one's healthcare provider.

The state's estimated population as of Jan. 1, 2024 was 30,749,519, according to the Texas Demographic Center. That is an increase of 1.6 million since the 2020 census count - or 5.5%.

The two fastest-growing counties in terms of percentage increase are Kaufman, up 26.7% since 2020, and Rockwall, up 25% for the same time period.

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

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

WT Leading Plan to Modernize Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum and Pioneer Amphitheatre

A visionary plan to bring Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum and Pioneer Amphitheatre into the 21st century is underway, thanks to West Texas A&M University and state leaders.

Under an initial design commissioned by WT President Walter V. Wendler and others, the museum's historically significant Pioneer Hall would remain intact and new construction would bring to life the story of the Texas Panhandle in innovative ways.

A feasibility study already has been conducted, with support of The Texas A&M University System Chancellor John Sharp, to address critical issues with the museum's existing facilities.

The timing is right, Wendler said, because the price tag for deferred maintenance costs and projected upgrades for the existing facilities is approaching \$100 million.

The study, conducted by DLR Group and Gallagher & Associates, found improvements that could be made in fire and life safety, exhibition and programming space, and the visitor experience.

DLR and G&A's plan — which can be read at online.flippingbook.com/view/760628752 — is just a starting point and may not reflect the final design.

The full project would require a budget of several hundred million dollars to fully transform the museum into a lasting testament to the Panhandle and the state of Texas.

"Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum, for around 90 years, has been dedicated to preserving and interpreting millions of artifacts unique to Texas, and it serves as a cultural center serving the educational needs of every Texas school district in a 25,000 square-mile radius," Wendler said. "We want to ensure the museum continues to provide upcoming generations, though interactive educational experiences, the opportunity to connect the past with their present and future."

The Panhandle-Plains Historical Society was founded in 1921 in an effort to preserve this region's human, cultural and natural history. Construction on Pioneer Hall began in 1932, and Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum, now the largest history museum in the state, opened its doors the following year on WT's campus.

Since 2021, the museum has operated under the umbrella of WT's Cultural Foundation of the Texas Panhandle, which also manages the Texas Panhandle Heritage Foundation, which

produces the outdoor drama "Texas" in Palo Duro Canyon State Park.

WT owns the museum's physical building, and its staff members are WT employees. The Panhandle-Plains Historical Society owns the museum's collection and operates the exhibits, programs and public events. Both WT and PPHS work closely together to ensure the museum's success.

"While the current PPHM building has served generations of people in unforgettable ways, the prospect of having a reimagined museum is a very positive one," said Dr. Andrew Hay, CFTP executive director. "PPHM is daily dedicated to impacting a variety of visitors, students and researchers with the rich history and memories of this region—from prehistoric

to present day. I'm very enthusiastic about the priority that WT is placing on having a museum building that matches the unparalleled importance of the collection."

Wendler and CFTP have worked extensively with local leaders, elected officials, the Texas Historical Commission and The Texas A&M University System to put the plan into motion, but it will require significant public and private funding to make the dream a reality.

"This is nothing more than a vision at this point, but we all agree that it is vital to address the state of the current museum facilities and to make this gem of the Panhandle shine as brightly as possible," Wendler said. "The museum houses what is arguably the state's and the nation's most im-

portant historical collections of the history of the American West, and it is our duty to preserve it and make it available to future generations."

The plan from DLR Group and G&A would maintain the original museum building, Pioneer Hall, which is a registered landmark with the Texas Historical Commission, as the focus of a new museum facility, "like a jewel box in front of the larger institution." New construction would mimic the hall's Art Decostyle.

Behind Pioneer Hall and a new entrance area, two new major buildings would be constructed a North Museum and a South Museum, connected by a glass bridge.

"The reimagined PPHM will tell vibrant stories that bring to life the region's histories—

natural, cultural and industrial-while emphasizing their relevance in contemporary visitors' lives," the DLR Group and G&A plan says. "The interpretive approach will focus on encouraging visitors to find personal connections within the collections and narratives of the PPHM while highlighting the global connections between the region, the state and the broader world."

To the west of the museum, adjacent to 23rd Street, a new, state-of-the-art collections building would be constructed to house and conserve artifacts not currently on display. An outdoor artist plaza is proposed, as well, featuring terraced seating, a tree-lined promenade, and a museum café.

DLR Group and G&A's feasibility study also calls

for extensive renovations to Pioneer Amphitheatre, where the outdoor drama "Texas" is staged annually in Palo Duro Canyon State Park.

"Palo Duro Canyon and the play, combined with PPHM, represent in concrete ways the history, heritage, and culture of the region, state and nation," Wendler said. "Therefore, the amphitheater deserves to be part of our vision for renewing the spaces which house and represent who we are."


The amphitheater would be significantly enhanced, with new seating, new stage wings, improved lighting and sound systems, and new support buildings, including dressing rooms, restrooms, costume and scenic storage, and a green room. A new entrance plaza would include all-new structures for ticketing, a gift shop, concessions, public restrooms and an art gallery that would host temporary exhibits and artifacts from the PPHS collec-

Focusing on the needs, history and future of the Texas Panhandle are key components of the University's long-range plan, WT 125: From the Panhandle to the World.

That plan is fueled by the historic One West comprehensive fund-raising campaign, which reached its initial \$125 million goal 18 months after publicly launching in September 2021. The campaign's new goal is to reach \$175 million by 2025; currently, it has raised nearly \$160 million.

About West Texas A&M University

WT, a Regional Research University, is redefining excellence in Canyon, Texas, on a 342-acre residential campus, as well as the Harrington Academic Hall WTAMU Amarillo Center in downtown Amarillo. Established in 1910, the University has been part of The Texas A&M University System since 1990. 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
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
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
