Local rationing boards already have been instructed to allow wholesalers and retailers to increase their sugar inventories. Allotments have been increased to cafes, hotels, boarding houses and institutional users, if the number of meals they are serving has increased

As a further liberalization of the sugar program, local boards that started out following Department of Agriculture estimates and granted only six pounds per person for city dwellers and nine pounds of sugar yearly to rural residents for canning, have now been told to go ahead and issue certificates to the limit of one pound of sugar for each four quarts of finished fruit, where the circumstances of each indivi-


quantity These certificates for home canning sugar still are limited to the circumstnaces of each individual applicant. The board must weigh such facts as the number of quarts of fruit a family canned last year, how much it has on hand, and how much fruit is available to it for packing this year.

Farmers, too, are to be given extra sugar allowances at the rate of half a pound a week per person for seasonal laborers, such as cotton choppers, grain threshers, corn huskess, and other workers whom a farmer employs and boards in addition to his own family. This extra allotment of sugar is for the period of a seasonal worker's employment only. A farmer may apply to the local War Price and Rationing Board in the county where he lives for such an allotment.

#### Typewriters Needed

War Production Chairman Donald Nelson has appealed to American business to sell to the government as many old typewriters as can be spares. In a letter to 25,000 of the largest users of typewriterr he has pointed out that the Army and Navy need at least 500,000 machines. Less than a third of this number ran be had from manufacturers. 



fenced brooding areas for grouse in the Panhandle has been com-pleted by field biologists, the Game Department announced to-

The areas, located in Wheeler County, are approximately 50 yards square and include excellent grouse, or prairie chicken range. Similiar prairie chicken restoration work is being conducted in other Panhandle Counties in an effort ot restore the species to relative abundance.

Known to Texans and most other Southwesterners as the prairie chicken the bird really is a grouse, of the sub-species known as the pinnated grouse. It gets this name from the wing-tufted feathers about its neck which are most readily seen during the mating or "booming" season.

The grouse is now protected by law in Texas and may not be molested at any time. Aside from its excellent qualities, as a game bird it also is consistent feeder on insects such as grasshoppers and is thus worth thousands of dollars annually to Panhandle farmers. Its value to farmers as a predator on insects that devour crops was one of the principal factors that led to the prairie chicken restoration program, the Executive Secretary of the Game Department said

There are two sub-species of grouse or prairie chicken in Texas. Those in the Panhandle are known as the Lesser prairie

chicken and occupy a range spread over about 26 Panhandle Counties and extending southward to the lower South Plains adjacent to the New Mexico state line. The other sub-species is found along the Gulf Coast and is known as the Attwater's prairie chicken. Neither of the species is abundant, and in fact face extermination unless restoration work is continued, officials said.

## **Timely Suggestions On Canning Peaches**

water bath

er the peaches with boiling hot With peaches now coming on the market in large quantites, the juice or syrup in which they have been pre-cooked. If necessary, add following timely suggestions about selection and canning a little boiling water, since fruit must be covered by liquid. peaches are given by Miss Cathryn Sands, county Home Demonstrajars and process pre-cooked peation Agent:

Peaches are good sources of vitamin A—especially the yellow peaches. Many of the yellow-fleshed varieties rate excellent in this respect. They also contain vitamin C, vitamin B1 and a little vitamin C. vitamin G.

Good peaches should be fairly firm. This is evident from the appearance of the fruit - or from examining one or two of the lot It is not good shopping etiquette to pinch every peach. Each pinch means another bruise,

Canned peaches are always a popular favorite. To prepare them for canning, immerse them in boiling water for about one-half minute or until the skins will slip easily, plunge at once into cold water for a few seconds, remove the skins, cut the peaches into halves and discard the pits.

Peaches may be packed Taw but a better pack is obtained if they are pre-cooked for a few minutes. Pre-cooking brings out juice which is usually sufficient to cover the fruit. Juice is extracted more readily from sliced peaches than from halves. If peaches are juicy, heat slowly to boiling point, adding sugar to sweeten to taste and to help draw out juice. Be careful not to cook probability that she soon will peaches until they are soft.

Some of the best news is found in ship production figures. Records are being made so fast in leading shipwards, especially the West Coast's Kaiser yards that it is hard to keep up with them. One yard recently completed a 10,800 ton Liberty Ship in 40 days

At the same time, some experts doubt that the overseas transport problem can be solved by ships alone. Major de Seversky, for instance looks forward to the time when a great part of our supplies men and equipment will be flown to their destinations in air transports of incredible size This, he argues, is the best way to answer the U-boatsto take our shipping off the seas and put it in the air. Then the submarines can prowl about the ocenas from now on, without finding anything to destroy

To build such air transports in quantity would be a tremendous job, piled on top of all the other tremendous jobs that the war demands. But it may happen, if the war goes on as long as many authorities seem to think A merchant ship, for instance, can make only three or four round trips a year to Australia-air transports could make fifty trips or more. Their advocates say they could be armored to the point where they would be flying battleships, virtually safe from fighter-plane attack

### Have Your Bucket Ready

The United States has been shelled by enemy worships It is completely possible that before long the United States may be attacked from the skies. And if those attacks come, fire bombs of one kind or another will be one of the principal weapons used. Unless this country is ready to deal with fire on an unprecedented scale, disastrous damage to our homes, our factories and our farms will be inovitable

In connection with this, James M Landis, Director of the Office of Civilian Defense recently said: "Obviously the first thing that is apparent is that the fire-fighting forces of every city have to be enormously expanded . Recruiting, training of auxiliary firemen, and the re-training of existing forces, are thus a mandatory obligation of every community in the vast target areas of this country. And this program cannot wait It must not only be
