Hill of Daugherty and Associates, P.C. of Amarillo, Texas, to discuss the redistricting process in an open meeting of the Commissioners Court at 5:00 p.m. on August 13, 1991, in the Sherman County Courthouse. She will review the law and rules which govern the redistricting process as it applies to the Sherman County Commissioners Court, review the current boundaries of Sherman County Commissioner's Precinct, and discuss possible alternative plans. Input and recommendations from the committee, commissioners and other interested persons will be welcomed.

Stratford ISD Residents To Go To the Polls Saturday, August 10, 1991

Stratford ISD residents will go to the polls to cast a ballot on Saturday, August 10, that will have a great impact on the Stratford School system. On the ballot will be two constitutional amendments and three County Education District issues.

CED Amendment No. 1, if approved, will allow the voters of county education district to adopt certain exemptions from the district's ad valorem taxation for residence homesteads and to provide for the taxation of certain tangible personal property.

Amendment No. 2 will decide whether to allow a 20 percent exemption on the market value of residence homesteads. Also whether to allow a \$10,000 exemption of the market value of residence homesteads for disabled individuals and an additional

Friends of the couple are invited to congratulate them as they join the ranks of royalty.

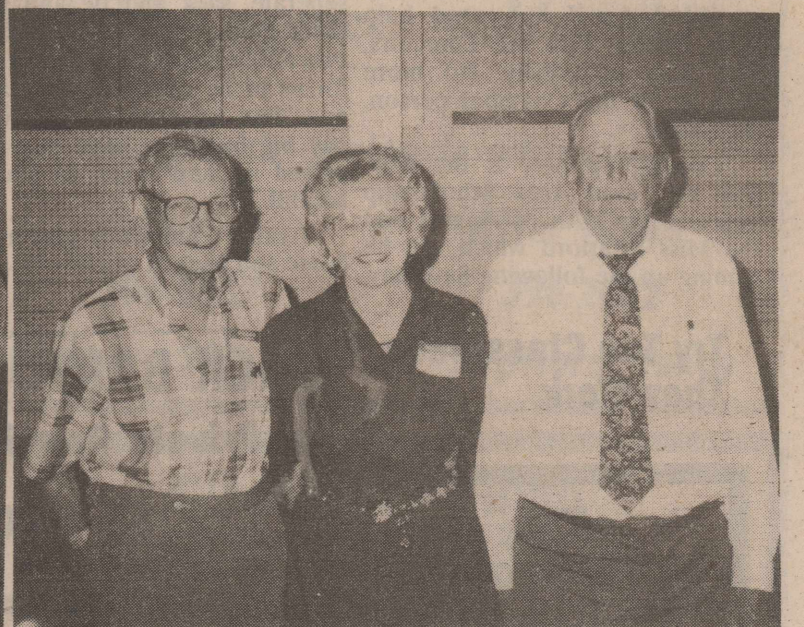

Students are required to have three DPT or TD Immunizations with the last being after their fourth birthday; three Oral Polio (OPV) at least one dose must have been received after the fourth birthday. One immunization is required for Rubella, Measles, and Mumps. It was mistakenly reported in last weeks paper that a TB test is required. A TB test is not required of entering students.

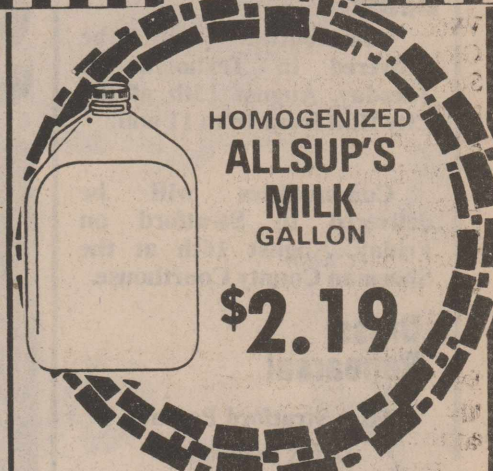

Talking so that others listen to you, and listening so others will talk has long been a guideline for effective communication skills for use by family, business and society. Sharing information on feelings with other people, shows respect and appreciation. Communication encourages independence and provides guidance and control.

At any age, communication is important. It is in a family setting that children first develop communication skills that last a lifetime. Effective skills include:

*Communicate by need, not by schedule. When you're in touch, you can communicate.

*During dinner is a prime communicating time. It draws kids out and deepens relationships.

*Learn to listen with all your senses.

*Be warm and friendly. Body language often sends a different message than the ears hear.

*You don't have to talk loud or all the time, but assume some responsibility for sharing ideas.

You can never "not" communicate. Your words, gestures, facial expressions or stance all send a message. Consider what you said and what you meant.



Your Right To Know

When the sirens were tested Monday, a resident on the north side of town reported that the siren in that part of town did not work. It is being checked and should be working by next Monday. The cable interrupt was also tested. The sheriff did the test so as to be familiar with the system in case of an emergency. If you heard the test, you should be satisfied with the ability of the county to communicate. In the event of an accident involving hazardous material, this is the way the news would be related to you residents in Stratford. Should the sirens go off at a time other than Monday morning at 10:00, turn on your television set and listen for announcements. You would be told what has happened and what you need to do to protect yourself. This may be as simple as staying inside with all the doors and windows shut, or as complicated as packing up to evacuate the town.

Here Are Tips for Buying Safe Toys for Your Children

(NU) - Can that toy chest trap a child? Will that popped balloon choke him? Does a little girl risk injury riding her bike without a helmet?

A free poster/brochure called "Play It Safe!" raises these points and offers tips to help parents protect their youngsters.

Published jointly by the Trial Lawyers of America and the Johns Hopkins Injury Prevention Center, the booklet points out potential dangers associated with a wide variety of playthings, from crib toys and buttons to electrical toys and guns. It even suggests what used toys to steer clear of at yard sales.

EXTRA LIGHT POUND CAKE

- 2 1/4 cups sifted cake flour
- 1 1/4 teaspoons salt
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 1/4 cups sugar
- 2/3 cup Extra Light olive oil
- 1 teaspoon grated lemon peel
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- 2/3 cup milk
- 3 whole eggs (or egg substitute)

Sift together flour, salt and baking powder. Blend olive oil and sugar on medium mixer speed for 3 minutes. Add lemon peel and juice, follow with milk, and mix well.
Add sifted ingredients to oil mixture, blending for 2 minutes at low mixer speed. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Pour into oiled and floured bundt pan. Bake at 300°F for 1 hour and 25 minutes, or until golden brown and cake tests done. Cool slightly and turn the cake out onto a cooling rack.

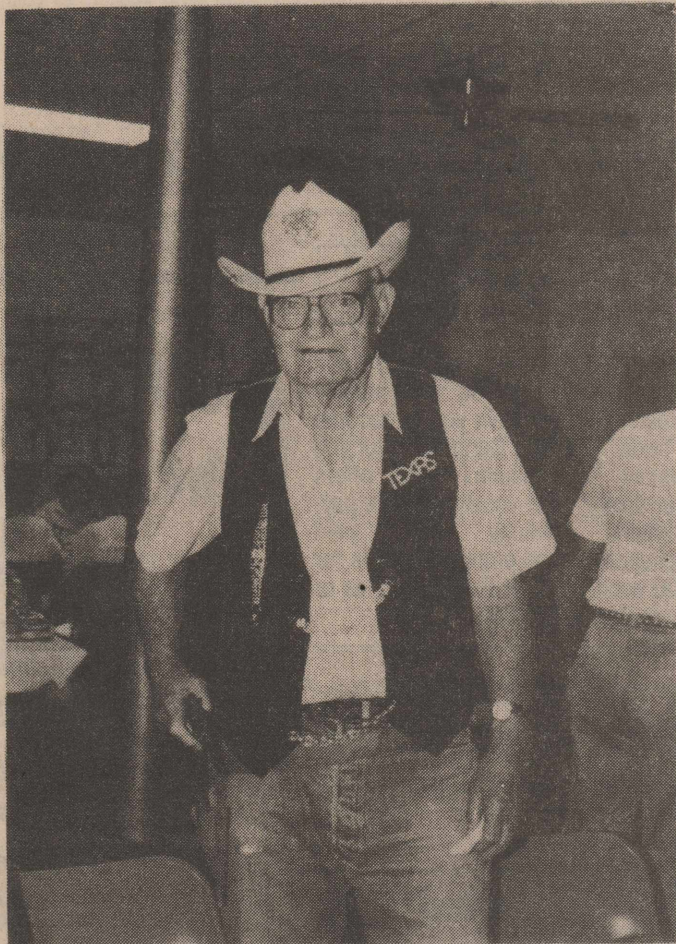

On April 9, 1991, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas to request that the optional feature "Call Transfer Disconnect" be available to all PLEXAR I customers by including the feature in Southwestern Bell's PLEXAR I tariff. Currently, this optional feature is available only on a customer requested basis.

Call Transfer Disconnect (CTD) is an optional feature that allows PLEXAR I customers the ability to transfer a call to another telephone number within or outside their PLEXAR I system, hang up, and permit the two remaining parties to continue with the call. The PLEXAR I user is then free to place or accept another call. CTD is not intended to be used to avoid toll charges. Therefore, CTD will not be available to PLEXAR I customers subscribing to optional Extended Metropolitan Service or Extended Area Calling Service.

If the company's application is approved, the monthly rate for CTD will be \$4.00 for each PLEXAR I station line. Prior to the June 19, 1991, interim rate approval, Southwestern Bell was billing customers who receive the service \$1.50 for each station line equipped with this feature. In addition, under Southwestern Bell's proposed tariff, every line within the PLEXAR I system must be equipped with this feature. The nonrecurring charge for the additional lines which must be equipped with CTD will be waived for existing CTD customers. The tariffed monthly rate will apply to all existing and future CTD customers.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the commission as soon as possible. Medicine for the Public

Early Treatment Prolongs Life for People with HIV

People infected with the Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV) who receive early treatment can greatly improve the quality and length of their lives, experts agree. They can delay the onset of AIDS and may do well long after those who ignored their health have serious illnesses or early death. When people first acquire HIV, they often feel healthy and are unaware that they have been infected until they have a blood test.

When patients are first diagnosed with HIV, doctors begin monitoring their ability to ward off infections. If HIV patients who have not developed symptoms begin taking anti-retroviral drugs such as azidothymidine (AZT) when their white blood cell count drops, they can delay the onset of AIDS complications. HIV-infected people also need counseling and information so they can take precautions against spreading the virus.

Aloe Consumer Products Protection

(NU) - Wonder why that "aloe" product didn't do what you thought it would? Moisturize. Relieve pain. Increase the rate of healing.

It may not have enough pure aloe in it, suggest experts at the International Aloe Science Council.

"There are still some companies that are selling bogus aloe," says C. Ray Henry, president of the IASC. "They might put a drop into 10,000 gallons of their product and call it aloe." And that certainly is insufficient, because aloe, as a natural plant material, needs to be present in fairly large amounts to produce some of the desired results.

To avoid potential problems, the council, with a current membership from 14 countries, is continuing its efforts to ensure the quality of products containing aloe vera.

Your Child Needs You When School Opens

School Principals Give Tips to Parents

(NU) - It's that back-to-school time again, when every store in town has a special sale on clothes, lunch boxes, notebooks and other school-related items. For storekeepers, all this upbeat advertising usually pays off.

But what your child needs on the first day of school can't be bought in any store. Your child needs you to be just as upbeat and just as excited about the opening day of school as any storekeeper. Even more so.

What does it take? Here are four simple suggestions from the principals of America's elementary and middle schools. If you follow them, the first day of school — and every day thereafter — will go more smoothly for you and your child:

Begin School Day Schedule

— Start now to ease out of your carefree summer schedule and into a school-year routine of regular meals (especially breakfast and lunch) and earlier bedtimes. Also, little by little, cut down the time your child can watch TV. (I know it's not easy. But please try.)

— Make sure you and your child know how to get to and from school. Walk on the same streets and pathways your child will use every day. Has anything changed from last year—new construction, for example, or a new fence? If your child

takes a bus, visit the bus stop together. Talk about bus safety. Emphasize good behavior on the bus.

— Avoid the confusion of opening day. If your child is new to school, call the principal and ask for an informal tour for you and your child a few days or a week before school starts. Walk around the playground. Visit the cafeteria and library. Note the location of the bathrooms.

Read and Read

— Finally: Read. I hope you've been reading to your youngster throughout the summer. If not, do it now. It's never too late. Check a few books and magazines out of the library and read them aloud to your child. Ask your child to read to you, too: the comics in the newspaper, descriptions in mail-order catalogues, and anything else that's handy.

Spend 15 to 30 minutes a day reading together. It could be your child's best preparation for a school year's worth of concentration and homework.

And I'll add my own fifth suggestion: Don't change when school opens. If you show your child you truly care about school and education, your child will care, too.
