Fire Fighters Attend School

Five fire fighters from Stratford Fire Department attended the 1991 Texas Firemen's Training School at A & M in July. Those attending were: Eddie Williams-Fire Chief, Justin Coaly-Asst. Fire Chief, Johnny Pulliam-Fire Marshall, David Davis-Fire fighter and Sandy Williams-Fire Fighter. There were 2,581 students and 400 instructors representing 18 states and 6 countries.

All students participated in actual "Hands on" fire fighting control & suppression. Those in the advanced class of fire fighting III were Eddie Williams, Justin Coaly and David Davis. They received instruction in Loading Terminal Fires, Pipe Rack Fires, Process Unit Fires, Apartment Complex fires, Pressure Pit Fires and Pressure Ventilation as well as class room instruction in public relations, hydraulics, inspection and preplanning, communications, rescue, general/specific fire problems and fire protective systems.

Johnny Pulliam attended classes in fire prevention VI, Phase I which included behavior of fire, fire investigation, incendiary fires and fire causes, motivation of the firesetter, photography and fire scene photography sketching. The office of Fire Marshall includes the study and investigation of possible arson and sources of fires.

Sandy Williams attended classes in fire fighting I and is the first woman fire fighter from Stratford to attend the training school. Sandy received instruction in LP gas Safety, LPG Fire control, Hand extinguishers, automobile fires, pump seal fires, hose evolutions and hose loads, breathing apparatus, protective equipment, chemistry of fire, forcible entry and small tools.

Students attending will receive a certificate from Texas A & M for 40 hours credit. Participation in this school by at least 3 fire fighters from our community results in decreased fire insurance rates for our city.

Stratford's representation as Texas Firemen's Training School was made possible by the support of the City of Stratford, Sherman County and Citizens of this community.

Continuing Education is important in fire prevention and control. Trained fire fighters are an asset to the community. A volunteer fire Department must meet certain state requirements some of which are meeting twice monthly for at least 2 hours of training per meeting. At least 24 hours per year must be accumulated per person each year in training exercises. The levels of fire fighting and number of hours required to attain each level are: Basic-162, Intermediate-122, Advanced-187. Careful records are maintained and reported to the state certification board annually.

Stratford Volunteer Fire Department is comprised of 20

members. Four members of SFD have achieved intermediate level and six members have reached basic certification. These volunteers give time away from home and families during emergencies. Businesses who employ volunteer fire fighters provide a vital community service by allowing their employees to respond to fire and rescue calls.

School Begins August 20th

With no further word of changes in the academic school year length, Stratford Schools will go ahead with plans of August 20, 1991 being the first day of instruction for the students of SISD. Classes will begin at 8:30 a.m. and will dismiss at 3:45 p.m. Buses will run the morning and afternoon of August 20 for the first time of the new bus routes. Please be patient with us the first day or two. Route pick-up time may vary only slightly. The cafeteria will also begin serving lunches on a new schedule on the first day of school.

Steve Haynes, High School Principal announced the following schedule for registration for High School. August 15, Seniors 9:00 to 11:00 a.m. Juniors 1:00 to 3:00 p.m. August 16, Sophomores 9:00 to 11:00, Freshmen 1:00-3:00 p.m.

Jim Taliafero, Middle School Principal has announced that those students who will be in grades 5,6,7 and 8 and who did not attend Stratford Schools last year, may begin registration on August 14. This may be done in the Middle School Principals office from 9:00 to 12:00 noon and from 1:00 to 3:00 any week day. Returning students from last year will report to school on August 20th at the regular time.

Jim Bob Brown, Mary Allen Principal, has announced that students who will be in grades K-4, and did not attend Stratford Schools last year, may begin their registration at the Mary Allen Elementary School on August 14 from 9:00 to 12:00 noon and from 1:00 to 3:00 p.m. Students may register any week day during these times. All new students should have an immunization record with them at the time of enrollment. Students are required to have three DPT or TD immunizations with the last being after their fourth birthday; three Oral Polio (OPV) at least one dose must have been received after the fourth birthday. One immunization is required for Rubella, Measles, and Mumps.

School Board Meets In Regular Session

The Stratford ISD Board of Trustees met in Regular Session on Thursday, August 8, 1991 at 8:00 p.m.

Minutes were approved as read and July bills were reviewed and approved for payment.

In other business, vehicle insurance bids were opened and awarded to the Smith Agency. Bids were opened for the high school computer lab. Motion carried to table the bids on computers.

A preliminary budget for 1991-92 school year was discussed. The board will meet on August 29 at 8:00 p.m. for a tax hearing. The Board voted to have teacher in-service during October, November, and January.

Superintendent Brite gave a report on summer maintenance, first day of school for employees and tax collection. Meeting adjourned at 10:00 p.m.

Herbold, Critically Injured

Norma Herbold, daughter of Marilyn Albert and sister of Leonda Fedric, was critically injured in a taxi accident in Russia last week. Norma, a science teacher in Redding, Ca. along with her husband Joe, were enroute to the airport after attending an International Science Symposium in Moscow. Norma was one of the speakers to the group of 500 American and 500 Russian Teachers. The taxi hydroplaned in heavy rain, turned over three times and rolled down a steep embankment. Norma was thrown through the rear window. Joe was in the front seat with a seat belt and suffered only bruises. There were no seat belts in the back seat. She said the Russian hospital was extremely primitive compared to U.S. Standards and was a frightening experience. Only through the intervention of the American Embassy was her husband able to get her removed from the Russian hospital. She is currently in the hospital in Schriesheim, Germany. She hopes to be able to return home in a week or two. Extensive plastic surgery will be required.

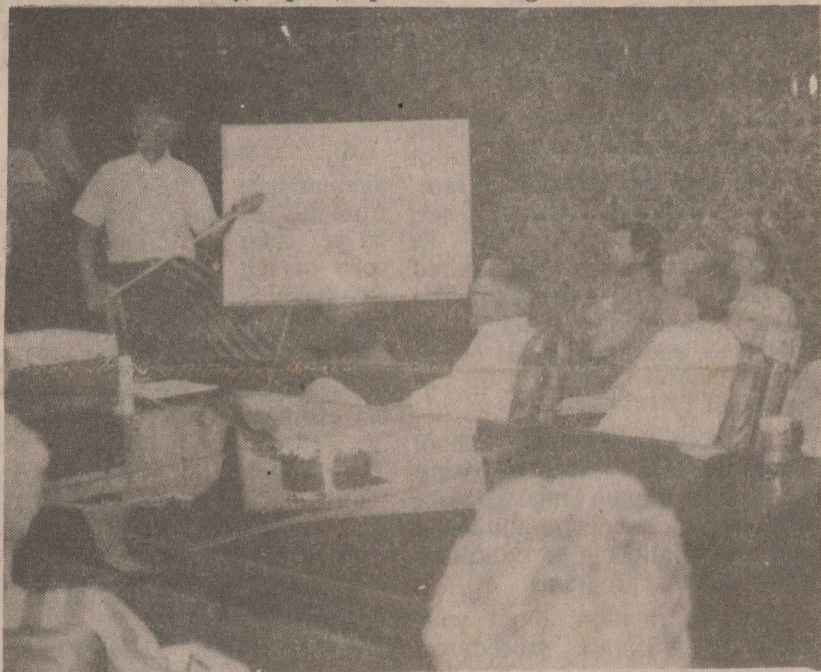

Public Notice

On April 9, 1991, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas to request that the optional feature "Call Transfer Disconnect" be available to all PLEXAR I customers by including the feature in Southwestern Bell's PLEXAR I tariff. Currently, this optional feature is available only on a customer requested basis.

Call Transfer Disconnect (CTD) is an optional feature that allows PLEXAR I customers the ability to transfer a call to another telephone number within or outside their PLEXAR I system, hang up, and permit the two remaining parties to continue with the call. The PLEXAR I user is then free to place or accept another call. CTD is not intended to be used to avoid toll charges. Therefore, CTD will not be available to PLEXAR I customers subscribing to optional Extended Metropolitan Service or Extended Area Calling Service.

If the company's application is approved, the monthly rate for CTD will be \$4.00 for each PLEXAR I station line. Prior to the June 19, 1991, interim rate approval, Southwestern Bell was billing customers who receive the service \$1.50 for each station line equipped with this feature. In addition, under Southwestern Bell's proposed tariff, every line within the PLEXAR I system must be equipped with this feature. The nonrecurring charge for the additional lines which must be equipped with CTD will be waived for existing CTD customers. The tariffed monthly rate will apply to all existing and future CTD customers.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the commission as soon as possible.
