COTTON PRODUCERS TO VOTE ON 1940 MARKETING QUOTAS IN ELECTIONS DECEMBER 9

All 1939 Cotton Growers FUNERAL SERVICE Referendum

Cotton producers throughout the nation will ballot Saturday, December 9th to determine whe-ther cotton Marketing Quotas will remain in effect during 1940, in conjunction with the government's agricultural conservation proram. The vote is not being taken determine whether or not there will be a farm program in 1940, but merely to ascertain if pro-

ducers want the production of cotton to be controlled in 1940.

All growers who in 1939 produced cotton with a staple less than one and one-half inches will

than one and one-half inches will be eligible to vote in the referendum. This includes both landowner and farm tenant.

In charge of the referendum will be the county Agricultural Conservation Committee in each county in the state. The committee will designate voting places in the county and select three local farmers as election officers in each community. Voting will be by secret ballot. Voting places will be open from 9 a. m. until 5 p. m. Cotton producers should if possi-Cotton producers should if possible, vote at the designated polling laces in their community, however the producer will be entitled to vote at any voting place in the

If a two thirds majority of al roducers who vote in the refer endum approve quotas, the marketing quota provisions of the Farm Act will apply wherever cotton is produced and in the United States.







Additional reports of pneumonia cure through the use of sulfapyridine, the new "wonder drug" meeting of the Southern Medical Association at Memphis a few days ago.

New Pneumonia Cure

This drug, which is derivative of sulfanilamide and has been proved effective in a dozen or more diseases, was only approved for general clinical use by medical and government authorities last March. Since that time it is credited with saving hundreds of lives in pneumonia cases alone.

A report of pneumonia patients treated by Dr. Richard E. Ching of Memphis since last spring, using sulfapyridine, showed that only 15 out of 116 died-about one-half the percentage of deaths in previous years. Of these 15, a majority were in advanced stages of disease when admitted to the hospital.

An interesting fact is that no deaths occurred in 11 cases of type three pneumonia, one of the in between swallows of solid food.

Great Quake Recalled

Recent slight earth tremors in the Mississippi valley recall the great earthquakes of 1811-1812, which centered at New Madrid, Mo., and were the heaviest shocks ever recorded in North America.

Three principal shocks were experienced-on December 16, 1811, January 26 and February 7, 1812—with many lighter ones between and after these dates. These greatest shocks were felt as far away as Boston, 1,100 miles distant from their cen-

Over an area about 100 miles long, lying in a northwesterly-southeasterly direction, and 50 nore miles wide, the earth was in some places raised, in others depressed, forming ridges, domes and akes. The current in the Mississippi river is said to have been actually reversed for a short time, and a temporary waterfall was created.

Great cracks opened in the ground, landslides fell from the river bluffs, and the whole surface of the county was altered. Because the country was very sparsely settled at that time the loss of life and property was very small.

Although many faint earth tremors are felt in various parts of the United States from time to time this country has been remarkably free from major earthquake disasters,
