'Hangin' a pot's like bulldoggin' a steer'

THE modern linerider has a language all his own, much the same as the West Texas cowboy uses a "range" tongue "foreign" to most of us.

These linemen are banging a pot on a 50-foot Black Diamond. They are using a gut on the bot wires for pro-tection against high voltage juice.

A "pot" is a transformer, fixed high up on a creosote pole. It reduces voltage to 110 or 220 volts so that elec-tric current can be safely used in your home. A "gut" is the rubber line hose placed around the wires to prevent shock.

Until a worker is experienced enough to perch atop the pole without fear and without holding on with one hand, he is known as a "clumb-some." The man working on the re is known as a "clumb-some." The man working on the ground, sending up tools and handling paraphernalia is called a "Grunt." "Coon that pole" is the signal to climb a pole when not equipped with climbing hooks or spurs. "Suck on it" means to take up the slack in a new wire being strung. A "johnnie ball" is an insulator. A "nigger-head" is a porcelain fuse cutout around which wires are tied on cross-arms for insulation purposes. "The Bear" is the sobriquet sometimes given "the boss."

Our Army Air Chief

In connection with the proposed great expansion of our military air force, the personality of the Army's air corps chief is of particular inlerest. He is Major General Henry H. Arnold, who has been the head of the corps since September, 1938, and is now 53 years old.

General Arnold was one of the army's earliest aviators, and has been a flying officer for 29 years, during which time he has set many aviation records, the first being on altitude record of 6,540 feet in 1912, when planes were crude affairs compared with those of the present.

In the same year he was the first flyer to receive the Mackay trophy for a reconnaisance flight in the vicinity of Washington in what has been described as "an elaborate, chain-and-sprocket, 40horsepower, biplane of the early Wright type." In this year, too, he was the first military aviator to use radio to report his observations.

Five years ago General Arnold again won the Mackay trophy for his notable feat of leading a group of 10 bombing planes from Washington to Fairbanks, Alaska, under most adverse conditions. He is known as an expert in general aeronautical engineering, in aerial mass tactics and other technical branches as well as being one of the most skillful fliers in the army.

A consistent advocate of an enlarged air force. General Arnold will now have a leading part in directing the new program which is expected to give this country the most powerful air fleet in the world.

WATCH THESE THREE PLACES IF YOU WOULD STOP THEM

There is just no excuse for drafts in your new home, because drafts are definitely curable if you will watch just three places-and all three places are around your windows.

First and foremost offender in the making of drafts in your new home is the window frame. Now you've never bought window frames so you don't know anything about them and that is one reason why so many home builders have drafty windows, because they were careless about the window frame that went into their homes. Now, we aren't going to go into detail about window frames. We just want you to remember that the most important thing about a window frame is how it joins the wall. If it makes a permanent leakproof weathertight joint with the wall-fine and dandy. If it doesn't, you'll have drafts, no end of drafts. How can you make sure about a weathertight joint? Just specify that the window frames used in your new home have wide blind stop construction. This special construction should be familiar to your contractor.

Proper Fitting Necessary

Next in importance to window frame is the window sash (the part of the win-dow that moves within the frame). Many dow that moves within the frame). Many home builders buy window frames in one place and sash in another with the result that the sash and frame never fit proper-ly in spite of trimming and cutting on the job. And sash that don't fit properly cause drafts, and more drafts. The modcause drafts, and more drafts. The mod-ern trend is towards what is known as complete window units that are delivered with frame and sash precision fitted to each other at the factory. Many of these window units are even complete with weatherstrip. In any event be sure that the window sash are fitted properly to the window frame and you'll eliminate another big source of drafts.

another big source of drafts. Glass Cools Air Now here is the third cause of drafts. It's warm air being quickly cooled against a single pane of glass. The cold air then drops to the floor. This flow of air causes drafts. What's the cure f A double pane of glass. Some windows are made so that this double pane of glass fits on the inside of the window, while the most common is the ordinary storm windows which are hung on the outside. Whether your double glass is inside or outside, the result is the same. The glass that is within the heated room is kept warmer by the dead air space between the double panes. Result: Warm air is not cooled so fast: no cool air—no drafts.
