

## Haskell Public Schools Sponsor Youth Training Projects for This Area

### Training Offered Girls and Young Men in Phase of Defense Program

The Haskell Public Schools are cooperating with the Federal Defense Program in sponsoring two training projects for out-of-school youths. One of these projects is the teaching of homemaking to girls in the NYA Resident Center serving Haskell, Knox and Throckmorton counties. The other is instruction offered to out-of-school boys and young men between the ages of 17 and 25. This project offers training in such vocational lines as electricity, woodwork, metal work and motor mechanics.

Instructor in the girls project is Mrs. Nina Young, former teacher of homemaking in Haskell High School. Work was begun Monday, December 9. The project for boys training will open January 1, with G. C. Irvin, local carpenter, offering instruction in woodwork as the first unit, which will continue through a period of eight weeks. Arrangements for further activities will be worked out before that time.

School authorities sponsor the projects select and pay instructors and supervise the work. The Federal Government, acting through the State Board of Vocational Education, will reimburse the school for all of its expenditures.

Boys taking training will be expected to do a minimum of 18 hours each week, with a maximum of 40 hours. Since skilled workers are in great demand in government defense work, it is expected that any boy who takes proper training in this field will be able to enter upon his year of military training with a decided advantage in rating which will give him a considerable increase in pay over that earned by untrained men. Registration is now in progress and any boy 17 years of age and not more than 25 who is interested in the project is requested to get in touch immediately with Mr. Irvin or Homer Neal, teacher of vocational agriculture in Haskell Schools.

### P-T Employees Will Be Given Holiday Bonus

## TWO INJURED IN TRAFFIC MISHAP WEDNESDAY NIGHT

### Mrs. Sterling Edwards and Ruby Wimberly Hurt Slightly

Two Haskell women were slightly injured in the collision of two automobiles late Wednesday night on the highway near Cook's filling station several blocks south of the square. Four other occupants of the two cars were unhurt. Mrs. Carrie Edwards, wife of Constable-elect Sterling Edwards, received a severe injury to her right knee and bruises about the body, and Ruby Wimberly, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Wimberly received a cut on her forehead and bruises about the face and body in the crash. The accident occurred when the car in which the Wimberleys and Mrs. Edwards were returning from church services was involved in a collision with a light pickup truck driven by Tom Cluck of Munday, who escaped injury. Victims of the crash were rushed to the Haskell hospital for emergency treatment. Mrs. Edwards was still a patient in the hospital Thursday afternoon, but Miss Wimberly was able to be removed to her home Thursday morning.

## Wichita Falls Man Hurt Saturday In Traffic Accident

J. H. (Monty) Montgomery, employe of the Sun Ray Oil Company of Wichita Falls received injuries to his neck and back in an automobile accident on the highway a mile north of Haskell Saturday afternoon.

Montgomery and John Ogan, Abilene driller, were en route from Wichita Falls to Abilene during the height of the severe cold wave which struck this section Saturday. Approaching a curve on the ice-coated road, the machine overturned when Ogan applied his brakes to slow down from the turn. Both men were pinned in the car and were removed from the wreckage by O. F. Etheredge, district game warden, who with Mrs. Etheredge were driving a short distance behind Ogan's car. Mr. Etheredge brought both men to the Haskell hospital, where Montgomery was given treatment. Mr. Ogan escaped with only slight bruises.

## 5,000 Youths Are Needed to Fill CCC Quota for January

More than 5,000 youths and young men will be needed to fill the January quota of the Civilian Conservation Corps, according to Mrs. Kate Ferdue, county enrollment official, and every young man wishing to enroll in the CCC should make application at the County Welfare Office in this city at the earliest possible date, she explained.

"Boys who are of good character, unemployed and needing work, and who are 17 to 23-1/2 years old, will find the CCC an ideal place to become skilled in many types of work and trades," the enrollment official declared. With each boy now receiving \$15 of his \$30 monthly pay, \$8 in cash and \$7 put aside for him when he has dependents (or \$22 saved if he has no dependents) an opportunity is presented to become independent when the enrollee leaves the CCC, it was pointed out.

In the present defense program many Camp Commanders and members of their staff are being called into service, as are men in private life. Because of this, large numbers of CCC enrollees are being offered the opportunity to qualify for positions of great responsibility with increases in pay several times the amount they are now receiving. Enrollees who have applied themselves and taken advantage of the opportunities available in each CCC camp are reaping a reward for their efforts. The CCC offers the ambitious youth more opportunity for advancement than he can find in private employment at the present time.

## Olney Planning District Golden Gloves Tourney

### Modern Structure Recently Completed at Cost of \$12,000

## Proposal For Soil District Fails to Carry

With a light vote recorded in elections held last Saturday, landowners of Knox county and the north half of Haskell county rejected the proposal for creation of the Brazos-Wichita Soil Conservation District, the measure lacking thirteen votes of receiving the required two-thirds majority necessary to authorize the district.

Total vote was 227 for, and 120 against the proposal. Inclement weather which prevailed during the week-end kept the vote from being much greater, it was believed. In Knox county the total was 162 for and 87 against, while in Haskell county territory embraced in the proposed district was 65 for and 33 against.

### Farm Leased By Jan. 1 Is Goal of Farm Security

Robert E. Skipworth, Farm Security Administration supervisor in Haskell County, is making his New Year's resolution early. The resolution is that New Year's Day will find every farmer in the county having completed arrangements for the land he will farm during the year. "This can be done," Mr. Skipworth said, "if farmers who are having difficulty renewing their lease agreements because of excessive debts will come to the Farm Debt Adjustment Committee for help."

This committee, he explained, can help a farmer work out an agreement with his creditors revising his debt structure so that it will be within his ability to pay. "No farmer should let a top-heavy debt structure prevent his renewing his land lease, or lose his land by foreclosure if he has an equity in it, or lose his livestock or equipment," he stated, "with-out concluding the Debt Adjustment Committee."

Mr. Skipworth promised that after a farmer's debts have been brought within his debt-paying ability, the FSA will in most cases extend its loan and advisory service to the farmer so that his income can be increased and he can eventually pay his obligations. The Debt Adjustment Committee meets on Friday, December 20 at the Farm Security office in Haskell, Texas.

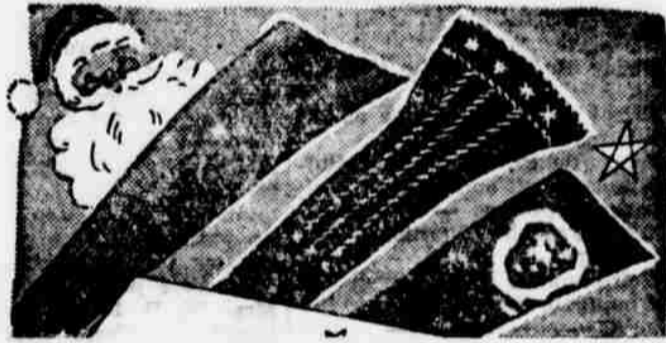

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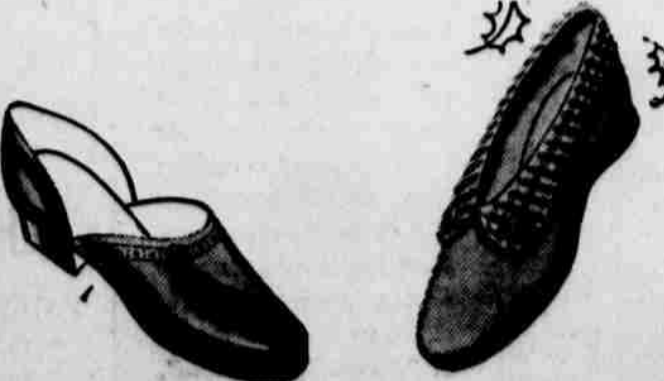

### Chile At Bat Again

Since President Roosevelt proclaimed the United States would not permit any foreign power to get a new foothold in the Western Hemisphere and obtained naval and air bases in Britain's American possessions, there has been much talk of seeking similar favors in South America.

In Chile this talk has received a decidedly frosty nip. The leading government-controlled newspaper denounced any rumors that Chile was going to give the United States any such bases. It said such action would be contrary to international law. It maintained that even the gravest situation would not warrant such sovereignty, because the sovereignty itself would be worse than the danger "played up as an excuse."

Then the paper added: "Chile can look after itself." The newspaper's tone is in entire keeping with a certain belligerent, bantam rooster spirit in the Chileans. There was a time when it looked as if in their temerity they would come into armed conflict with the United States.

Back in 1891 the supporters of the Chilean Congress revolted against President Balmaceda and overthrew him. Those who engineered the successful revolt charged the United States had shown favoritism toward Balmaceda. Oct. 16, 1891, a party of sailors landed at Valparaiso on shore leave from the U. S. warship Baltimore. They were attacked in the town. Two sailors were killed and many wounded by knives and clubs.

President Benjamin Harrison demanded an apology and indemnity, but the Chilean foreign minister simply made an insolent statement which excited both sides. The Chileans boasted of what they would do in case of armed conflict. And so weak at that time was the American navy that the Chileans navy was actually superior in certain types of vessels.

January 21, 1892, Harrison sent an ultimatum to Chile and four days later sent what was tantamount to a war message to Congress. But by that time Chile had a new foreign minister who used his common sense and the troublesome episode was ended by a satisfactory apology.

But the incident illuminates American dealings with Latin America. The Latin Americans have long memories. They don't easily forgive troubles with Uncle Sam. And forces unfriendly to the United States see that they don't forget.

### Tagging Our Brains

In recent years there has been an ever increasing effort on the part of psychologists, psychiatrists, psychoanalysts, and what have you, to determine and classify the mental deficiencies of the well-known human race.

Some time ago a comprehensive survey of mental diseases by specialists in psychiatry and allied fields was undertaken. After nearly three years of labor, a new classification of such diseases has been published, the chief divisions of which are:

Amnesia, neuroses, and psychoneuroses, schizophrenic neuroses, psychopathic constitution, affective and emotional psychoses, toxic psychoses, epileptic psychoses, organic brain disease psychoses, and other miscellaneous types. Which ought to catch nearly everybody on one count or another.

It is interesting to note in this connection that a mental diagnosis of the late Sigmund Freud, high priest of psychoanalysis and dream interpretation, revealed that he himself was a bit goofy, through "lack of inward integration."

Whether all these investigations in mental science and pseudo-science are doing us any practical good is a moot question. To a great extent, the conclusions reached by the so-called experts appear to be so much bunk, although some discoveries of value may have been made.

A close analysis would probably reveal that all of us are a little cracked, either habitually or occasionally. In fact, as someone has said, "crazy people are just like other people, only more so. And if, as some contend, crazy people are the happiest, why worry? But perhaps it is more fun to be nutty with a fancy psychosis."

### A Famous Operation

Grover Cleveland was elected President of the United States in 1884, but failed of re-election four years later, although he received the highest number of popular votes. In 1892 he sought election again, although he was suffering from a mouth ailment which proved to be cancer, and was successful in winning a second term.

Shortly after he took office for the second time the country experienced the severe panic of 1893, and President Cleveland's condition became such as to require an edge that the President was afflicted with cancer would further depress the economic situation, it was decided to have the operation performed secretly.

As related by Dr. W. W. Keen, one of the attending surgeons, this was done on the yacht Onida owned by Commodore E. C. Benedict, while cruising in the waters of Long Island Sound. A part of Cleveland's left jaw and a portion of his palate were cut away, and in five days the distinguished patient was able to walk ashore from what was supposed to have been merely a recreation cruise.

Cleveland recovered, served out his term and lived until 1908, some 15 years after the operation, the story of which was not made public until it was told by Dr. Keen, in 1917. A vulcanized rubber substitute for the removed jawbone had enabled Cleveland to keep his secret.

### WHAT DOES AMERICA MEAN TO ME?

America! America! Shouted in the Latin tongue of many foreign people are those words. Their dreams are finally coming true when they start out for America. Realization thrills them when, through the fog, the lights of New York shine on the Statue of Liberty. At this time, I visualize them very emotional.

As most modern stories of that type go, the Latin ones call on their mother of pearls, and with tearful eyes sing "Ava Maria." But I believe a certain per cent (perhaps a small one) of the foreigners coming in, stand astern and are looking steadily at the New York skyline. They have seen so much bitterness of the European wars that they have no heart to rejoice. Their life is nearly spent, though not referring to age, and they look bleakly at the future.

The aliens, in my imagination, hold school on board the vessel on which they are traveling to America, learning the Preamble of the Constitution. They are to be prepared, in their own stubborn Latin way.

Most of this theme seems as if the title were "What Does America Mean to Aliens", but truly saying what America does mean to me—well, I am like the rest; I take it for granted. I was not born to be an unfortunate foreigner; I mean born in Europe.

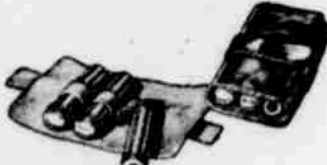

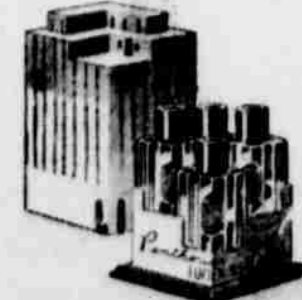
