## WHAT IS THIS NUMBER 4-1121

Since we have no local operators at the phone office now, many people are unaware of how a fire alarm is turned in. You can't call "central" and say John Doe's house is on fire — you have to dial a particular number — 4-1121.

For those who have not given the matter any thought, should it become necessary for you to turn in a fire alarm, dial 4-1121. This rings three stations where the alarm can be sounded during the day, the City Hall, Power Plant and Fire Station and one station during the night — the power plant, at the same time it rings 10 firemen's phones.

Of course, for a while, until the public understands the only way to turn in a fire alarm is to dial this certain number 4-1121 there will be a certain amount of confusion.

Stop and learn this number now so that you can act promptly should it become necessary for you to turn in an alarm.

Each moment is valuable to the firemen and delay in sounding an alarm could cost more damage than necessary.

## Tuberculin Tests Start Here Dec. 5

The State Department of Health and Callahan County Tuberculosis Association, in conjunction with county health authorities and the schools, will conduct the annual school tuberculin testing program of the pupils beginning the last week in November.

Senate Bill 130, passed by the Legislature in 1965, suggests that pupils in the first and seventh grades should be examined each year for evidence of tuberculosis infection. The State Department of Health will provide for the examination of these pupils and the county TB association will provide for the testing of the Seniors and other pupils in the schools. under the direction of Dr. M. L. Stubblefield, county health officer.

Health officials emphasize that the examination for tuberculosis is not completed by the tuberculin test alone. Each positive reactor, children and associates, must have a chest x-ray to determine if the germs have caused active tuberculosis. Other tests may be needed as recommended by the family physician.

The positive tuberculin reaction is a sign that no one can afford to ignore. Even if the chest X-ray is negative, it must be remembered that the child or associate has been infected with tuberculosis germs. As a result of this infection, extra precautions must be taken to prevent the development of active tuberculosis at a later age.

These recommendations contain the essence of the child-centered approach to eradication of tuberculosis in Texas.

Parents of the pupils to be tested are urged to sign the request forms for their children and return them to their teacher. The test will not be given to any pupil without the parent's permission. Your cooperation in this testing program is important to the health of your family.

# FHA Loans Exceed \$123,000 For Co.

In Callahan County, Farmers Home Administration has made twelve housing loans, totaling \$123,420.00, in the past 12 months, as reported by FHA representative, John Curry.

More than 2,443 Texas families — some 70 percent more than that of the previous year — during fiscal 1966 used \$16,787,304 of Farmers Home Administration credit for construction and improvement of homes.

L. J. Cappelman, the Agency's State Director, with offices at Temple, Texas, reported. Some \$1,733,590 of this amount was advanced directly to Texas Senior Citizens for improved housing facilities, a 400 plus percent increase over credit extended the previous period to rural residents of 82 years or over. Director Cappelman explained.

Rural housing loans to Texas individuals other than Senior Citizens totaled \$15,053,714 during 1966 — 66 percent more than that of the previous twelve months.

These loans ranged from small amounts for minor repairs to loans for building modest, but adequate homes. Some of the

funds were used to improve or construct essential farm buildings.

"Farmers Home Administration's rural housing program has resulted in untold benefits to scores of Texas communities as well as to the hundreds of rural involved," Director Cappelman emphasized. "That is only part of the story, for improvements made by borrowers to their homes have increased the tax base which makes it easier

## Small Packages To Be Air Lifted To Boys

Public Law 89-724 -- The Dulski Military Mail Act -- signed by President Johnson on Nov. 2, 1966, will greatly accelerate the movement of mail to our overseas military personnel.

All first class mail, personal sound recordings (voice letters) and parcels weighing 5 pounds or less and measuring not more than 60 inches in length and girth combined, will be airlifted on a space available basis between the United States and all military post offices overseas.

Also on second class publications such as newspapers and magazines published weekly or more often, and featuring current news of interest to the military will be airlifted from San Francisco to the armed forces serving in Viet Nam.

Parcels within the above category, (5 pounds and 60 inches length and girth combined) paid at surface rates, will be moved by surface transportation within the United States from points of mailing to the port of embarkation. From the point of embarkation the parcels will be airlifted directly to all military personnel.

Postmaster John Towler reminded mailers that Christmas parcels weighing 5 lbs. or under, though they are given air-lift priority from San Francisco

to Viet Nam on a space available basis, should be mailed no later than December 1. Airmail parcels should be sent no later than December 10.

For parcels weighing over 5 pounds and going all the way by surface transportation, the deadline for Christmas delivery was November 10.

Bible Thought: "For indeed we have heard the good news, as they did. But in them the message they heard did no good, because they brought no admixture of faith to the hearing of it." (Hebrews 4:2 - N.E.B.)

I remember as a boy that I was asked more than once, "Do you hear me?" It was not that I did not hear. I am sure that I heard every word that was being spoken, but it made no change in my inactivity. I was just hearing and not hearkening.

Moses, in telling of Christ's coming said, "I will raise them up a Prophet from among their brethren, like unto thee, and will put my words in his mouth; and he shall speak unto them all that I shall command him. And it shall come to pass, that whosoever will not hearken unto my words which he shall speak in my name, I will require it of him. But the prophet, which shall presume to speak a word in my name, which I have not commanded him to speak, or that shall speak in the name of other gods, even that prophet shall die." AUSTIN — School teachers are moving boldly forward with their drive for an \$85,000,000 a year pay raise. This, despite the fact that they don't have the support of the governor's committee on education needs.

Texas State Teachers Association seeks salary increases ranging from \$61 to \$100 a month. This would cost the state \$68,000,000 and local school districts \$17,000,000 annually.

TSTA says it has rounded up considerable support in the Legislature and among education-support groups.

But the governor's committee voted not to make any reports on any phase of its far-reaching study until it has completed its research into all areas of public schools.

Chairman Jeon Jaworski expressed confidence that Gov. John Connally will call a special session of the Legislature in 1968 to consider the committee's final recommendations.

A committee resolution recognized that salaries are important to staffing schools but added that other factors are just as vital in determining the effectiveness of teachers and administrators.

Without a committee recommendation, there will be sentiment among lawmakers to tell teachers they will have to wait another year for pay adjustment. Teachers will bring pressure on legislators to act immediately. This will be one of the toughest problems legislators will face during the 1967 session.

Decision is all the more difficult in view of an anticipated tax bill of well over \$100,000,000 that is exclusive of the teacher pay question.

COLLEGE LOANS APPROVED — A total of \$9,535,000 in federal loans has been approved for Texas colleges and universities under federal higher education facilities. They will help finance \$23,000,000 worth of buildings.

Dr. J. K. Williams, commissioner of Texas Public Education, announced that the following loans have been cleared:

Texarkana College, \$75,000, science;

Wharton County Junior College, Wharton, \$600,000, science;

St. Mary's University, San Antonio, \$1,922,000, science;

Trinity University, San Antonio, \$445,000, science;

Texas Southmost College, Brownsville, \$136,000 library.

AIR STANDARDS HEARING SET — Air Control Board set January 5 for public hearing on proposed regulations to control pollution from smoke and particulate matter.

Tentative regulations would outlaw burning of burrs, trash, lint and other wastes from cotton gins and require mechanical dust collectors for asphalt portable plants. They cover flues, grading of smoke density, combustion units and distance of pollution sources from neighboring property.

TEXTBOOKS ADOPTED — State Board of Education has adopted \$6,400,000 worth of new textbooks on 11 subjects.

Board also authorized development of state plan to support \$2,500,000 federal loan application for educational services to children of migrant agricultural workers.

In other action, it reviewed appeal from ruling of Commissioner J. W. Edgar concerning transfer of pupils from Neches school district to adjoining Frankston and Palestine ISDs.

FEDERAL LANDS — Texas Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler has gone on record as favoring a plan to give to the individual states control of the revenue from federally owned lands within the states.

Sadler said he will make that recommendation to the federal Land Law Review Commission, of which he is a member.

His plan would give to the state in which the land is located 40 per cent of the revenue from that land. Other 60 per cent would be divided among the other 49 states. Texas has no federal lands.

Proposal would exclude national parks and military reservations, but Sadler feels that all the other federally owned land could be put to better use, since state agencies and state officials could do a better job of supervising the use of the land.

U. S. Department of Agriculture said the killing freeze of November 2 will cut the yield of late-planted cotton fields, particularly on high and low plains.

Texas Liquor Control Board warned licenses may be suspended for night clubs featuring "topless" dancers.

Interscholastic League has voted a committee study of the controversial rule which forces high school athletes to lose a year of sports eligibility if they change schools.

Texas motor vehicle registration increased 3.6 per cent this fiscal year.

## Questionnaires To Be Mailed To Veterans

Annual income questionnaires and dependency questionnaires for veterans and their dependents will be included this year with November checks received on December 1. Jack Coker, Manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Waco, said today. Approximately 80,000 questionnaires will be mailed to beneficiaries residing within the Waco Regional Office area.

Questionnaires will be sent to all veterans and widows on the VA pension rolls and parents of deceased veterans who are receiving Dependency and Indemnity Compensation as of October 1966. Dependency questionnaires will also be dispatched this year to parents of deceased veterans receiving death compensation by reason of a dependent parent.

Completed questionnaire cards should be returned promptly to the VA, but in any event before January 31, 1967, so that pension payments may be continued. The envelope enclosed with the questionnaire should be used for mailing.

Veterans and beneficiaries may obtain assistance in completing the questionnaire card by visiting a Contact Office of the Veterans Administration or by contacting a local representative of any approved service organization or County Service Office.

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## School Students To Be Honored Friday At "Dyess School Day"

Abilene area school students will be honored at "Dyess School Day," to be held at Dyess Air Force Base, Friday, Nov. 25. Highlighting the day's events will be a performance of the precision flying United States Air Force official aerial demonstration team, the famed Thunderbirds.

Theme of the program is "Interest In Youth."

School superintendents, principals and students, in the nine-counties surrounding the Dyess-Abilene area, will be extended personal invitations to the School Day event. The general public is also invited to attend the program.

Gates to the base will open to the public at 8:30 a. m. Friday, and the festivities will begin at 9:45 a. m., on the Dyess flightline, with a performance by the Dyess Drill Team, the "Pace-makers." Following their demonstration, Colonel Eugene A. Stalzar, commander of the host 96th Strategic Aerospace Wing will present Air Medals to four members of the 96th. Music for the 1200 man parade is scheduled to be furnished by the 32-piece Second Air Force Band, from Barksdale AFB, Louisiana.

Immediately following the parade, the 516th Troop Carrier Wing's aircrews flying the C-130E Hercules troop transport/cargo aircraft, will demonstrate its flexibility in combat operations.

The Thunderbirds are scheduled to take-off at 11:30 a. m. for their 30-minute show; flexing their muscles in such aerial acrobatic demonstrations as: the inverted to inverted pass; Bon Ton Roule (one F-100 will turn completely upside-down while his partner flies upright) at speeds in excess of 400 mph; the Wedge Roll with six F-100's; Arrowhead formation; Arrowhead roll; and a number of other breath-taking maneuvers.

After the Thunderbirds complete their thrilling show numerous static displays will be available for the public to see. These will include the B-52 Stratofortress bomber, the KS-135 Stratotanker, and the C-130E Hercules.

## OLD STONE FORT, Nacogdoches

The Old Stone Fort standing on the campus of the Stephen F. Austin State Teachers College at Nacogdoches is generally believed to have been built during 1779 or 1780.

It has been held and garrisoned at various times by Spain, Mexico, the Republic of Texas, the Confederacy and the United States.

It was truly an outpost in the wilderness! Nacogdoches itself, one of the four oldest civilized settlements in Texas, was named for the Nacogdoches Indians. Here in 1716 the Spaniards established Mission Nuestra Senora de Guadalupe around whose deserted buildings Nacogdoches was permanently established in 1779.

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
