Constipation

Constipation is a term for difficulty in eliminating stool; it usually is associated with hard, dry stools.

Should everyone have a bowl movement daily?

The frequency of bowel movements varies greatly. It is not necessary to have a bowel movement every day, some healthy people have bowel movements every 2 or 3 days whereas others may move their bowels twice or more a day. Bowel movements are considered normal as long as the stool is soft and easily eliminated.

What causes constipation?

Constipation may result from a number of conditions, but the most common causes are constipating diets constipating medications, poor bowel habits, and inactivity. Constipating diets are low in fiber, or roughage; lack of fiber contributes to hard, dry stools that are difficult to pass. Inactivity and pain medications contribute to constipation, because they slow the bowel down and result in delayed passage of hard stools.

Poor bowel habits involve failure to respond to the urge to have a bowel movement; delay causes increased absorption of water from the stool, which makes the stool harder to eliminate. Painful anorectal conditions such as hemorrhoids also result in constipation by causing the person to delay bowel movements.

What are the complications of constipation?

Prolonged constipation can result in impaction, or being unable to empty the rectum. This may be accompanied by paradoxical diarrhea, in which watery stool is passed around the mass of hard stool. Impaction requires medical treatment.

How is constipation treated?

Treatment of constipation depends on its cause. Any painful condition, such as hemorrhoids, must be relieved. A diet containing plenty of fiber should be followed, and breakfast should be a meal of adequate bulk. Fiber can be found in cereal bran, the skins of fruits and potatoes, whole grain breads, and vegetables such as beans, peas, celery, and broccoli. Fiber, or roughage, is important to your diet because it provides the bulk your large intestine needs to carry away body wastes.

If you are unable to eat enough high-fiber foods, you may need a bulk laxative or a bran mixture. Bulk laxatives are available in powder form, capsule form, and wafer form; the dose must be individualized according to your response (the goal is to create soft stools that are easily eliminated). A suitable bran mixture is made from 1 cup of millers' bran, 1 cup of applesauce, and 1/4 cup of prune juice. You should take 1 to 2 tablespoons of this mixture daily; you may increase the dose if needed to create soft

It is essential that you get adequate fluids when adding bulk to your diet; you should drink at least 8 to 10 8-oz. glasses of fluid a day. This prevents clumping of the bulk laxative and helps keep your stools soft.

You should also increase your activity as much as possible; a simple walking program is very effective in stimulating normal intestinal activity. Another very important step in preventing constipation is to establish regular bowel habits and to respond promptly to the urge to defecate.

A common approach to constipation is routine use of stimulant laxatives or enemas; this is not recommended because chronic use of stimulants creates bowel dependency, a state of reduced intestinal activity.

Explanatory Statements for the November 3, 2015 Constitutional Amendment Election

Proposition Number 1 (SJR 1)

SJR 1 - Current law provides an exemption of \$15,000 from the ad valorem taxation for public school purposes of a residence homestead. The proposed amendment would increase this exemption to \$25,000, starting in the tax year beginning January 1, 2015. In order to reflect the increased exemption on the homestead of a person 65 years of age or older or a disabled person, the proposed amendment would provide a reduction to the current limitation on the total amount of ad valorem taxes. The proposed amendment would protect school districts from all or part of the revenue loss by authorizing an appropriation of funds according to formulas set by the legislature. In addition, the proposed amendment would authorize the legislature to prohibit a political subdivision from reducing or repealing a homestead exemption adopted by the political subdivision. Finally. the proposed amendment would prohibit the imposition of a tax on the conveyance of real property, but would not prohibit the imposition of a business tax measured by business activity, a tax on the production of minerals, a tax on the issuance of title insurance, or a change in the rate of a tax in existence on January

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment increasing the amount of the residence homestead exemption from ad valorem taxation for public school purposes from \$15,000 to \$25,000, providing for a reduction of the limitation on the total amount of ad valorem taxes that may be imposed for those purposes on the homestead of an elderly or disabled person to reflect the increased exemption amount. authorizing legislature to prohibit a political subdivision that has adopted an optional residence homestead exemption from ad valorem taxation from reducing the

exemption, and prohibiting the enactment of a law that imposes a transfer tax on a transaction that conveys fee simple title to real property."

Proposition Number 2 (HJR 75)

HJR 75 - In 2011, voters approved a constitutional amendment to allow a surviving spouse of a 100 percent or totally disabled veteran an exemption from ad valorem taxation from all or part of the market value on the disabled veteran's residence homestead, as long as the surviving spouse had not remarried. The amendment did not apply to surviving spouses of veterans who died before 2011. This amendment would extend the exemption in such cases. The proposed amendment would apply only to ad valorem taxes imposed for a tax year beginning on or after January 1, 2016.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of a 100 percent or totally disabled veteran who died before the law authorizing a residence homestead exemption for such a veteran took effect.'

Proposition Number 3 (SJR 52)

SJR 52 proposes a constitutional amendment to repeal requirement for the Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Commissioner of the General Land Office, the Attorney General, and any other officers elected statewide to reside in Austin, Texas, the state capital. Under current law, these statewide elected officers are required to reside in the capital of the State of Texas while in office. This amendment would not apply to the residency requirement for the Governor.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment repealing the requirement that state officers elected by voters statewide reside in the state capital."

Proposition Number 4 (HJR 73)

HJR 73 proposes a constitutional amendment that would grant the legislature the authority to pass statutes to allow a professional sports team charitable foundation to conduct charitable raffles under the terms and conditions imposed by general law. The laws passed under this authority may provide that the professional sports team charitable foundation may use proceeds from such charitable raffles to pay reasonable advertising, promotional, and administrative expenses. Any law enacted by this provision only applies to entities defined as professional sports team charitable foundations on January 1, 2016. Additionally, any law enacted by this provision may only allow charitable raffles to be conducted at games hosted at the home venue of the professional sports team associated with a professional sports team charitable foundation.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to permit professional sports team charitable foundations to conduct charitable raffles '

Proposition Number 5 (SJR 17)

SJR 17 proposes a constitutional amendment which would increase from 5,000 to 7,500 the maximum total population threshold of a county that is allowed to construct and maintain private roads as long as the county imposes a reasonable charge for the work

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize counties with a population of 7,500 or less to perform private road construction and maintenance.'

Proposition Number 6 (SJR 22)

SJR 22 proposes a constitutional amendment that would add the right to hunt, fish and harvest wildlife. including by use of traditional methods, in the Bill of Rights of the Texas Constitution. This right would be subject to laws and regulations intended to conserve

and manage wildlife and to preserve the future of hunting and fishing. The proposed amendment would establish hunting and fishing as the preferred method of managing and controlling wildlife in Texas. The proposed amendment is not intended to affect any law or provision related to trespass, property rights or eminent domain, and would not prevent the legislature from authorizing a municipality to regulate the discharge of a firearm in a populated area in the interest of

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment recognizing the right of the people to hunt, fish, and harvest wildlife subject to laws that promote wildlife conservation.'

Proposition Number 7 (SJR 5)

SJR 5 proposes a constitutional amendment to dedicate a portion of revenues from (1) the state sales and use tax, and (2) the tax imposed on the sale, use, or rental of a motor vehicle, to the State Highway Fund (SHF). Under current law, these funds would be deposited to the General Revenue Fund. Money deposited to the SHF is intended to be used only to construct, maintain. or acquire rights-of-way for public roadways other than toll roads; or to repay certain transportation-related

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment dedicating certain sales and use tax revenue and motor vehicle sales, use, and rental tax revenue to the state highway fund to provide funding for nontolled roads and the reduction of certain transportation-related debt."

Texas wheat variety "Picks" for grain

Continuing a long-time High Plains practice, Texas A&M AgriLife has extended our wheat "Picks" suggestions for Texas wheat producers across the state. Texas A&M AgriLife's sister agencies for Research and Extension collaborate by region across the state to conduct extensive wheat variety testing in both research settings and onfarm sites.

Our ongoing Picks criteria include a minimum of three years of data in AgriLife wheat variety trials across numerous annual locations. A "Pick" variety means this: given the data these are the varieties we would choose to include and emphasize on our farm for wheat grain production. Picks are not necessarily the numerical top yielders as important disease resistance traits (leaf or stripe rust, wheat streak mosaic virus), insect tolerance (greenbugs, Hessian fly), or standability can also be important varietal traits that enable a producer to better manage single-variety potential risk using a "mix and match" approach to variety selection to cover basic defensive traits on your farm.

While in some years we make no changes to our annual Picks, for 2015-2016 we have made some deletions and additions for the four Texas regions where AgriLife wheat variety testing is conducted. Much of the data used in discussion below is published in "Texas Wheat Variety Trial Results-2015," (SCS-2015-06), available at http://varietytesting.tamu. edu/wheat/index.htm. In

Leaf rust and stripe rust resistance ratings in Texas wheat

Because these two fungal diseases have a significant potential impact across Texas, particularly when spring production conditions are wet and humid, we have included current resistance ratings for both. These ratings are noted as R, Resistant; MR, moderately resistant; MS, moderately susceptible; and S, susceptible. For example, a variety designated (R/MR) is resistant to leaf rust and moderately resistant to stripe rust (e.g., TAM 304). For further information on wheat variety characteristics see pages 5 (hard winter wheat) and 6 (soft winter wheat) in the above document.

Deletions: We removed TAM 111 as a full irrigation Pick in part due to trouble this variety experienced with stripe rust in 2015. This is the first year of significant underperformance for TAM 111 in our many years of trials, but stripe rust issues and moist conditions-which may be compounded in full irrigation-raise this caution. We have also deleted Duster and Hatcher. Though the long-term performance of these varieties has been solid overall as a Pick for all production conditions, their continued yield has become somewhat marginal relative to newer lines that

are available. Additions: T158 (Limagrain) is now a Pick for dryland and limited irrigation Texas High Plains wheat production. Part of T158's performance is tolerance to stripe rust.

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

Many Texas producers are interested in having planting seed tested for various crops. This is particularly important for wheat and other small grains seed, which farmers may save for their own planting use (unless they have a variety that requires a signed agreement stating you are not permitted to do so).

Texas A&M AgriLife Extension recently updated our annual document outlining seed testing certification standards as well as possible seed labs for your testing needs. Historically, many Texas producers turned to Texas Department of Agriculture, which had three public seed labs. Since 2011, however, TDA has limited seed testing services available only at their Giddings lab.

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


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
