Weinert Gunner on B-24 Has Distinguished Unit Badge

15th AAF in Italy. — Cpl. George L. Walker, 19, Weinert, Tex., a tall turret gunner with a B-24 Liberator group commanded by Col. Brooks A. Lawhon, Tacoma, Wash., now wears the Distinguished Unit Badge with one Bronze Cluster as a member of a combat organization that has been twice cited by the War Department for outstanding performance while engaged in armed conflict against the enemy.

The 461st Bombardment Group, then commanded by Col. Frederic E. Glantzberg, Fresno, Calif., won the first citation for an attack on the Duna aircraft factory at Budapest, Hungary, April 12. The second was for the July 15 bombing of the Creditul-Hinier oil refinery at Ploesti, Rumania.

Both ground and combat crews were given full credit for their share in the successes.

At Duna, despite a desperate attack by Nazi fighters firing rockets, cannons and machine-guns, the B-24s accomplished their two-fold purpose: to destroy fighters in the air and smash production on the ground.

To pierce the chemical smoke screen defenses of Ploesti, and cripple oil refineries with 1,500,000 tons capacity, crews trained for weeks developing a new technique of non-visual, synchronous bombing.

Although bad weather broke up the formation before it reached the target, the planes got through, re-formed, and made a highly successful bomb run, pioneering the new method.

The group has now flown more than 170 missions.

Walker was graduated from the Weinert high school in May, 1942 and entered the AAF in November, 1943.

3 Plaintiff says that prior to their separation the Defendant began a course of cruel conduct toward her, and was guilty of excesses and cruelties toward her, which were of such a nature as to render and does tender their further living together unbearable and insupportable to Plaintiff.

4 That to the union of Plaintiff and Defendant the following children were born: Franky Mullins, a boy now 7 years of age; Myrtis Mullins, a girl 6 years of age, and Eugene Mullins, a boy 5 years of age. That said children are now in the custody of the Plaintiff and she is and has been supporting them. That she is entitled to their permanent custody and that Defendant should be required to contribute to her a reasonable amount toward the support and maintenance of said children. Plaintiff and Defendant do not own any community property.

WHEREFORE, Plaintiff prays that the Defendant be cited to appear and answer herein as provided by law, and that upon a final hearing hereof she be granted a divorce from the Defendant, the permanent custody of said children, that Defendant be required to contribute a reasonable amount toward the support and maintenance of said children and for such other and further relief, general and special, in law and in equity, to which she may be entitled.



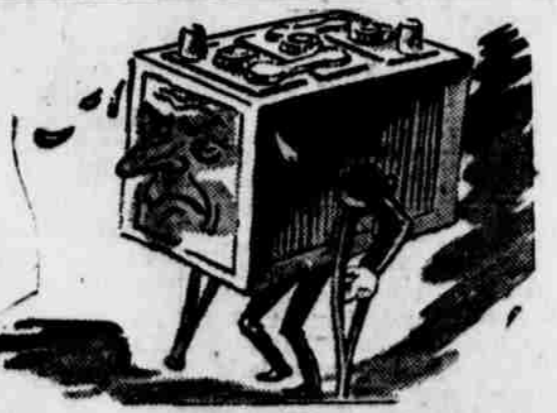

PUBLIC SCHOOL

TEACHERS GET \$300 RAISE

By participating in the State Equalization Aid program, the teachers of Haskell schools will receive \$75.00 per month in addition to the regular salary for the next four months. The Legislature of Texas has passed unanimously to pay from funds accumulated in the State funds this addition to the salaries of Texas teachers. This addition was made possible by the \$4.00 per Capita paid in August of last year and by an emergency appropriation by the 49th Legislature.

This raise will not constitute any raise in taxes of any person and therefore is a slight remuneration that is due the teacher. This increase is only for the present year and will not continue unless the Legislature that is now in session passes another law for the purpose of making a similar advance in teachers salaries a law

for the next biennial.

The people of the state have begun to realize that the teacher is one of the greatest guiding forces in the training of the citizenship of the state and have been working untiringly with very slight pay. It is nothing but fitting that the teacher should receive a living wage from her noble work. Thus, it is important to the life of your child and grandchildren and all of those who follow them that they have the best training possible.

It is impossible to give that training in the school without properly qualified teachers and a teacher cannot become qualified with **THREE MONTHS** training.

We expect teachers to have a degree from a first class college and to continue learning as she teaches. The underpaid teacher cannot do this. It is up to you to demand of your Legislators that they pass laws by which the teacher can live and advance in her professional life by having an adequate salary.

THOSE CREEPING COSTS

No housewife needs to be told that living costs have risen substantially in recent years. She comes in contact with this unpleasant fact almost daily in the course of shopping. In respect to other costs, such as building a home, for example, many people are living in blissful ignorance. If fire should destroy their homes they would awake with a shock to the realization that those homes were a lot more valuable than they had thought—and that in the light of today's values, were inadequately insured.

Never before was it so essential to prevent fire and never before was it so necessary to check values periodically and insure accordingly. Regardless of adequacy of insurance protection, there is a good chance that much property destroyed by fire at the present time cannot be replaced at any price.

The fire insurance industry is doing everything within its power to prevent fire, through various organizations designed for that purpose. Chief of these is the National Board of Fire Underwriters. Its engineering staff, operating in every state, has brought about standardization of fire-fighting equipment, better fire resistant construction of buildings, and other advancements. It cooperates with public authorities in curbing mischievous incendiaries, and arsonists who set fires for profit. Model legislation for local supervision of fire hazards and for other means of control also are constantly studied and recommended by the Board's experts. It also initiated fire prevention week.

All of these things the fire insurance industry is doing on behalf of fire prevention. The least that property owners can do in return is to observe caution individually.

More Poultry Needed

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24. — Latest official estimates indicate that civilians will get from 12 to 15 per cent less red meats—pork, beef, lamb and mutton—in 1943 than last year and probably 15 per cent less chicken. Supplies are expected to be extremely short during the summer season of low livestock marketings.

The prospective reduction in meat supplies is the reflection of a lower level of livestock and poultry production and of increasing military requirements.

Suggestions were advanced by some War Food Administration officials several weeks ago that the government put on an aggressive campaign to get more poultry produced.

It was pointed out that chickens offer a quick method of converting feed into meat. Broilers can be produced within 12 to 16 weeks.

Those urging more poultry say that, due to last fall's record harvest of feed grains, supplies are ample to support a sharply expanded poultry production program.

Follow These Rules in Providing Brooding Equipment

1. Have one square foot of floor space for each three chicks.
2. Have seven square inches of hover area for each chick.
3. Supply at least one gallon fountain capacity per 100 day-old chicks.
4. Provide one inch of feeding space per chick for first four weeks. See 8.
5. Keep several inches of clean, dry litter beneath chicks at all times. One bale peat litter will cover 100 square feet three inches deep.
6. Have two accurate thermometers graduated to 140° F. in the brooder house. These let you know the temperatures in other parts of the house as well as at the edge of the hover. Reliable weather thermometers are satisfactory if they are graduated high enough to prevent their bursting at the temperature which are likely to result before the brooder stove accurately regulated.
7. A 36-foot strip of 18-inch wide deadening felt, or some rigid material for a chick guard around the hover at the start of the brooding period.
8. Provide 2 inches of feeding space per chick after the fourth week using large hopper.
9. Place small grit hopper at the wall of the house.
10. Provide roost mesh chick guard under roosts to prevent chicks from scratching in droppings.
12. Keep hover and house at temperatures given below.

Hover Temperature under edge of Hover and 2 inches from floor	Room Temperature
First week, 95 to 100	70 to 75
Second week, 95 to 100	70 to 75
Third week, 92	70 to 75
Fourth week, 88	70 to 75

Fifth week and on, gradually reduce till no more heat is required, which will usually be about eight weeks.

Do Not Overcrowd Your Birds

BROODER HOUSE

The important thing in brooding chicks is not how many you start with or how many you keep alive, but how many good pullets you will have in the fall.

This season when food is so important and poultry and egg prices are high, many poultry raisers are tempted to purchase more chicks than they can house properly. They get along all right when the chicks are small, but when the chicks are 6, 8 and 12 weeks old, they don't have the house

facilities to care for them properly.

For best results, allow at least one square foot of floor space for each three chicks.

LAYING HOUSE

One light-breed hen needs four square feet of floor space—a good hen in each four square feet of laying space you now have. Each heavy hen should have five square feet of floor space.

Use Adequate Equipment

Be sure to have sufficient fountains, feeders, roosts, nests, etc., for your baby chicks and laying flocks.

Adequate equipment will pay dividends both in labor-saving and better results.

Make your houses and equipment do double or multiple duty this year. Raise as many broods of chicks as you can properly handle.

LITTER

Several kinds of litter are popular, but Servall cane litter, wheat or oat straw, and soft wood shavings are probably the

most common. We do not recommend cotton seed hull, as the chicks sometimes eat it.

FEED

Use the very best feed obtainable. This year, when ingredients are hard to obtain, the best feed will prove the cheapest. Use poultry feeds only from those companies upon whose integrity and ability you can depend.

Follow These Rules in Providing Flock Equipment

1. Allow four square feet of floor space per bird for light breeds and five square feet for heavy breeds.
2. Feeders that allow birds to eat from both sides should be 1 to 1 and a-half feet long per ten birds.
3. Provide 16 quarts fresh water daily per 100 hens with ample drinking space.
4. Provide one nest for every 5 birds.
5. Ventilating system should provide 7,000 cubic feet air displacement per hour.
6. Perches should be 14 inches apart; 8 to 10 inches of floor perch per bird.
7. Litter required depends on housing conditions and is often changed.
8. Place a grit hopper on the wall of the house where hens will have easy access to it.
