Indians defeat Pirates; keep play-off hopes alive

The Indians scalped the Petrolia Pirates 36 to 6 with the reawakening of the running game, led by senior quarterback Dylan Hanson, who carried the ball nine times for 115 yards and one touchdown. Sophomore Rocky Haggard was

impressive on the ground averaging over seven yards per carry, running the ball nine times for 66 yards and one touchdown.

Hanson also completed all three of his pass attempts for 73 yards and one touchdown, connecting with senior wide receiver Kadin Seeliger for

one of his two catches on the night. In the running game, the Indians handed the ball off to eight different players, with not one carrying the ball more than twelve times, showing great depth with their multiple options on the ground.

Defensively, the Tribe

stood tall all night only allowing six points, which came in the fourth quarter with the victory already in hand. Junior Lane Burson had eight tackles, followed closely by senior Garret Tatum with seven. Two other juniors, Devon Barrios and Rudy Espinoza, each

recorded one sack.

Coach Grady Benton was proud of his team after the hard fought victory and had this to say. "I'm very proud of how we played knowing our goals were at stake. Our kids and staff understood how important it was to get off to a fast start and we were able to do that. We were able to find rhythm early on offense and get off the field quickly defensively. In the second half, we were able to impose our will and finish strong."

Haskell is very much alive in the play-off race heading into the last game of the regular season facing the Munday Moguls, where the winner will get in. Where the Indians will be seeded is however questionable. If every thing worked out just right, and Haskell defeats Munday, while Electra and Seymour both lose, I think we can get to the second seed. But, it seems we are more likely looking at the third or fourth seed being more probable. Of course, we need to score a win over Munday to secure a spot, before we worry about seeding.

Events to honor local veterans

It is our love of this country, and the freedom it represents, that has always been and continues to be the reason we go to battle.

For the ninety-sixth year since President Wilson proclaimed November 11 as the first commemoration of Armistice Day, our country will pause to honor its veterans.

The eleventh has significance, because it was at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month of 1918, when major hostilities of WWI formally ended with the German signing of the Armistice.

The Veterans' Day national ceremony is held each year on Nov. 11 at Arlington National Cemetery. The ceremony begins precisely at 11 a.m. with a wreath laying at the Tomb of the Unknowns and continues inside the Memorial Amphitheater with a parade of colors by veterans' organizations and remarks by dignitaries.

There are approximately 1.7 million veterans living in Texas. They represent WWII, the Korean Conflict, the Vietnam Era, the Gulf War, peace time, and those battles currently being fought.

Haskell County, like the rest of the nation, will honor its veterans on Wednesday, November 11. The Haskell Elementary staff and students want to pay tribute

Haskell G-T students sought

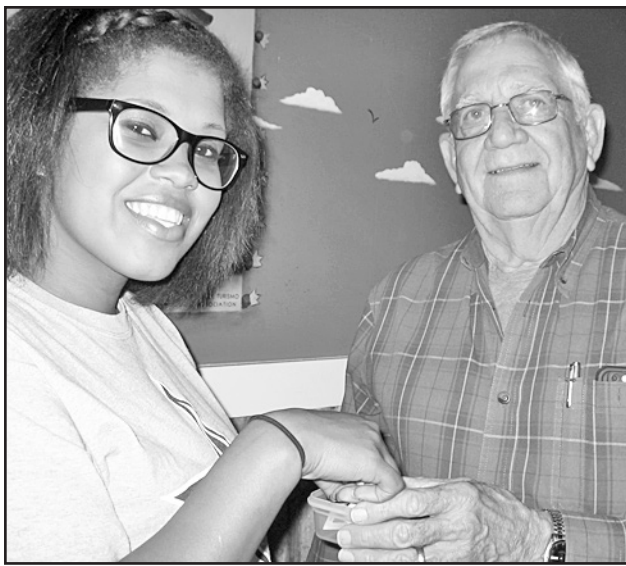

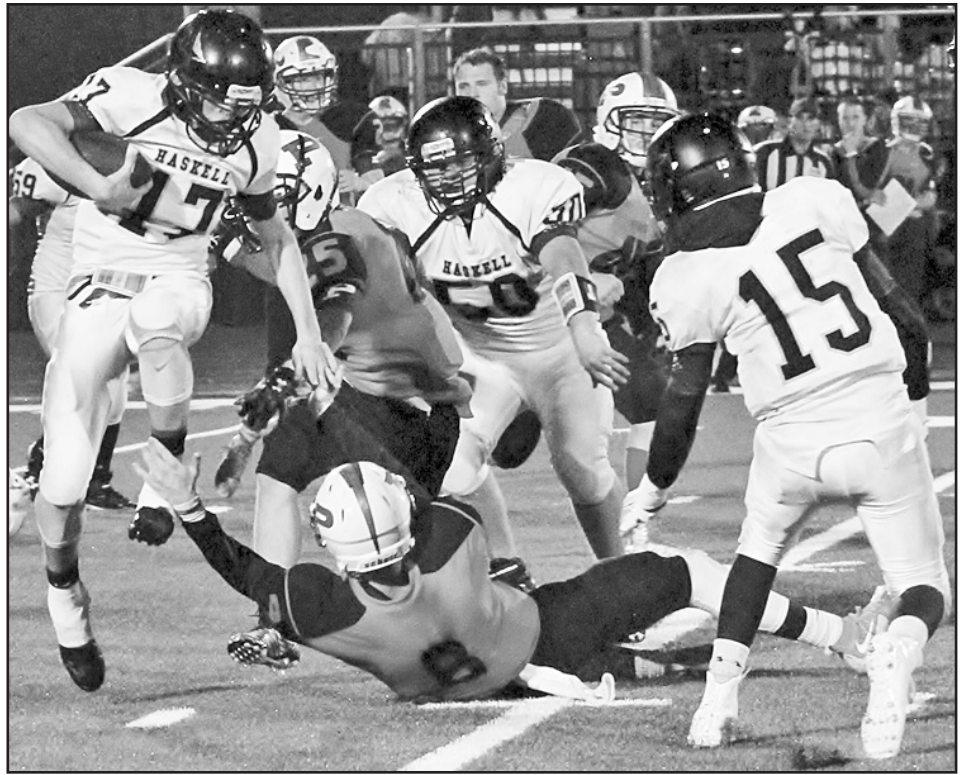

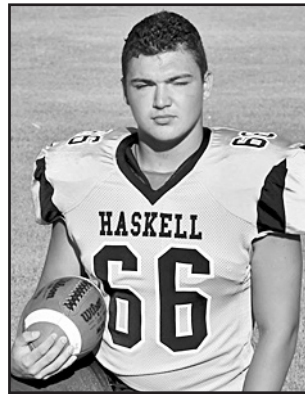


GAINS YARDAGE—Haskell Indian #17 Alec Roewe gains yards for the Indians on a failed attempt by the defense to trip him up.

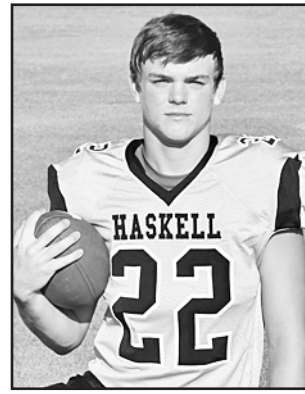


PIRATE DOWNED—Haskell Indian #22 Lane Burson wraps up the Petrolia ball carrier in the Indians 36-6 victory.

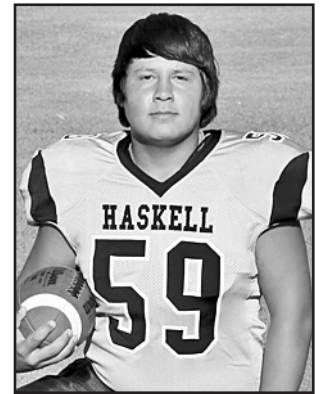

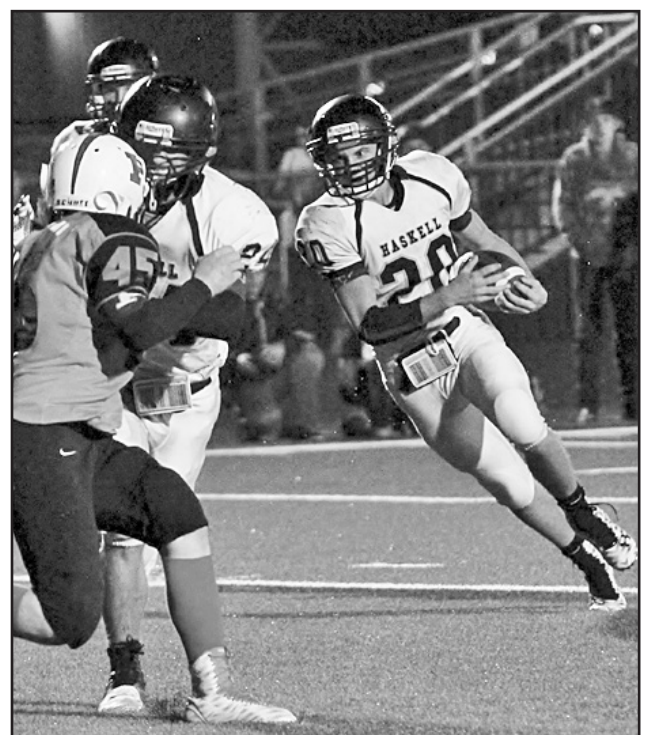

Diabetes workshop

Diabetes is a chronic disease resulting when the body does not make enough insulin, or the insulin it makes does not work properly. It is estimated that 1.8 million adults in Texas have been diagnosed with diabetes. Another one million adults are believed to have undiagnosed diabetes. Diabetes is the sixth-leading cause of death in Texas, and many experts feel this is underestimated because of the number of undiagnosed cases and the numerous diabetes-related complications that may be identified as the primary cause of death. Type 2 diabetes is by far the most common form of diabetes, accounting for around 95% of all cases.

The current obesity epidemic in the United States is contributing to the number of cases of type II Diabetes and we are seeing an alarming increase in those individuals under the age of eighteen being diagnosed with type 2 diabetes. This increase is being attributed to primarily two factors: genetics and sedentary lifestyles. We cannot change our genetics but we can make lifestyle changes.
