# **Diabetes** workshop

by Jane Rowan CEA/FCS, Taylor Co. Diabetes is a chronic disease resulting when the body does not make enough insulin, or the insulin it makes does not work properly. It is estimated that 1.8 million adults in Texas have been diagnosed with diabetes. Another one million adults are believed to have undiagnosed diabetes. Diabetes is the sixth-leading cause of death in Texas, and many experts feel this is underestimated because of the number of undiagnosed cases and the numerous diabetes-related complications that may be identified as the primary cause of death. Type 2 diabetes is by far the most common form of diabetes, accounting for around 95% of all cases.

The current obesity epidemic in the United States is contributing to the number of cases of type II Diabetes and we are seeing an alarming increase in those individuals under the age of eighteen being diagnosed with type 2 diabetes. This increase is being attributed to primarily two factors: genetics and sedentary lifestyles. We cannot change our genetics but we can make lifestyle changes.

Knowledge is the key to making lifestyle changes and controlling and managing diabetes.
