





Aerial Age Shrinks World

The effect of the air age upon global geography is illustrated by an advertisement of Con. solidated Aircraft, which points out that New York is closer to Moscow by plane than to Buenos Aires, in South America. The distance to Moscow is 4,525 miles but it is 5,310 miles to Buenos Aires.

The sea route from New York to Bombay is about 9,400 miles, involving a three weeks voyage. By air it is 7,790 miles and the flying time is thirty-nine hours.

The same advertisement contrasts approximate traveling time as we have known it in the past, with air-time. You can fly to Chungking, China, in thirty-eight hours instead of the thirty one days formerly required for a surface trip; to London in seventeen hours instead of five days; and to Fairbanks. Alaska, in fourteen hours, instead of eight

Certainly the development of the airplane, has speeded transportation thus producing a "smaller" world, Distances no longer protect nations from aggressors and oceans are crossed almost with

We cite these figures and facts in order to warn Americans that they must readjust their men. tal attitudes to the world in which they live.
