

### City Sales Tax Check Shows A Steady Increase

The City of Haskell has received a check from the State Comptroller for \$12,383.92 representing Haskell's portion of the Sales Tax. This total is \$593.29 more than the check received for the same period last year-Jan., Feb. and March.

According to City Secretary Desmond Dulaney, "This money goes into the general fund. It covers such expenses as upkeep on parks and streets, city administration, police, fire, city property and sanitation."

Haskell's check represents its share of the 1% sales tax and is part of about \$45 million collected by the State Comptroller each year. It is \$2,085.41 higher than the comparable period for 1971, which is indicative of a steady business growth in the city of Haskell.

### City Receives Revenue Sharing; Sales Tax Checks







This is the situation relative to an adequate supply of fuels. As has been opined in this space before, there are sources of fuels, if made available.

There is really no justification for shortages in gasoline and fuel oils, which now face many parts of the Country and which may become worse before it becomes better.

Those knowledgeable of the background of circumstances saw the shortage coming several years ago and warned of policies which have created the lack of supplies now apparent.

A few glaring examples illuscrate what is now happening. In the first place, tax incentives and tax policy have not encouraged new exploration for oil and gas. More immediate have been policies related to the environment. Everyone wants the environment protected and it can be protected with application of some common sense.

The environment kick we have been on the last few years has prevented the construction of new oil refineries. This is a bottleneck in finished products at this time.

Deep-sea unloading ports have not been developed; nuclear energy plants have been held up; pipelines have not been built three years.

### New Vet Rates Become Effective

Some veterans who are re ceiving Veterans Administration payments because of disease or injury incurred during military service may soon receive an increase in their monthly benefits. This announcement was made today by C. H. Herren, Veterans Service Officer for Haskell, Texas 79521 County.

For many years, the Congress has authorized the Veterans Administration to pay one rate of disability compensation for veterans whose diseases or in juries were incurred during periods of wartime, and another for veterans who were in military service during a period of peacetime. Under the laws, the peacetime veteran received 20 percent less compensation than the veteran who served during

Effective July 1, 1973, the monthly rates of disability compensation paid to peace time and war time veterans will be equalized at the regular wartime rate. This means that all veterans who are precently re ceiving Veterans Administration compensation at the peacetime rate will automatically receive a 20 percent increase, which will be reflected in the July checks. which will be received about August 1, 1973.

This adjustment in the dates of disability compensation for veterans will be automatic There will be no need for each individual veteran to annly for the increase. The local Service Officer does suggest, however, that each veteran who is rurrently being noid at the peace. time rate should be sure that the automatic increase is shown on his July check.
