Cottage Chats

The Homemaking girls are adapting their home practice work and menu planning to war-time food situations.

Mary Jo Keeling of the Homemaking II class has selected "Foods for Freedom" as the name of her home project. She contributes the following recipe for grand success when served to her family.

Frankfurter Salad—Prune Stuffing

1-2 c cooked prunes
 1-4 c butter or substitute
 2 c sliced celery
 1-2 c chopped onions
 2 t sage
 2 1-2 q; toasted bread cubes
 2 c soup stock
 1 to 1 1-2 doz. frankfurters, according to size.

Line casserole with frankfurters placing one on top of another, lengthwise around sides of casserole, cut opening if necessary to fit casserole. Press a layer of stuffing firmly against frankfurters to hold them in place. Fill center with remaining stuffing and smooth over top of frankfurters. Bake one hour in moderate oven, 350 degrees F. Remove from oven and cool slightly. Invert onto serving platter and lift dish on pan carefully to avoid disarranging frankfurter mold. Rasins may be used in place of prunes.

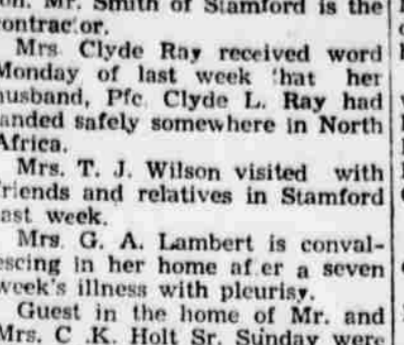
All Americans owning any foreign bonds, or \$10,000 or more in any foreign property are required to report such holdings on or before December 1 to their nearest Federal Reserve Bank. Practically every type of property must be reported — real estate holdings, cash assets, foreign currency, foreign securities, interests in foreign organizations, patent and trade mark agreements and contracts. Order can be restored more rapidly, as territories are recaptured, if military authorities have such information at hand, states the Treasury Department. All information will be confidential and will be available only to accredited representatives of the Treasury.

All "B" and "C" gasoline coupons issued after December 1 will be worth five gallons each, compared with the present value of two gallons for coupons of those types in the east and mid-west. This means "B" and "C" books will contain fewer coupons than in the past, but each coupon will be good for more gallons than before. No increase in the amount of gasoline allowed is involved.

Peanut shells, ground corn-cobs, and similar waste agricultural materials have been found useful for cleaning engines, bearings, valves, pumps, and many other machinery and metal parts, the Department of Agriculture has announced. The new use has been found by scientists at The Northern Regional Research Laboratory at Peoria, Ill. Several hundred tons of ground corn-cobs now are being used each month for burning metals and cleaning war machinery.

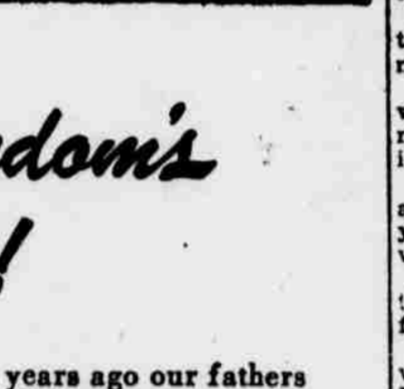

Property Owned in Foreign Countries Must Be Reported

Citizens of Haskell who own any property in foreign countries were notified by Postmaster J. M. Diggs today that they must file reports of their holdings with the Treasury Department before December 1. The notice was given by means of a poster placed on display in the post offices.
 Postmaster Diggs points out that it is necessary for the government to have as complete information as possible on the American stake abroad to assist the military authorities and the civilian governments on the fighting fronts and to bring about solutions of the post-war problems.
 Report forms, known as TFR-509, may be obtained through commercial banks, or from the nearest Federal Reserve Bank, the postmaster states. Penalties are provided for those who willfully fail to file reports.
