

# Our Flag — The Silent Sentinel

Mrs. Lloyd Setzkorn (left by W. O. Lewis) your flag. I was born in 1777. I represent the country in the world, the States of America. I am the silent sentinel of freedom. I would wave a welcome mat to all the people of the world, with weapons and with hands. I would walk on election day, and a little when I think of my more could vote, but I take the time. I sin to be patriotic any day. I have you forgotten what

I stand for? Have you forgotten the battle fields from Valley Forge to Vietnam, where men fought and died to keep this nation free? A million and more have died for freedom. Our country is their eternal monument.

Look at the memorial honor rolls. Look at the names of men who never came home—your friends, relatives and school mates. I walk with each of your honored dead to their final resting place. When you salute me you really are saluting them. I'll come down your street on June 14th. When you see me, stand straight. Place your hand

over your heart. I'll wave to you. I'll salute you and then I'll know why you pledge allegiance to the flag.

What do these words mean to you? In a survey taken by an Elementary School Administrator the question was asked, "Why do we recite the Pledge of Allegiance to the flag in our schools?" Some of the answers given by youngsters too young to spell allegiance, but old enough to give food for thought to adults, were, "It feels like loving something." "It makes you care about what the Pilgrims did." "It makes my heart jump up and down." One child

said, "I like to say it but can't get my boots off in time." Another one said, "It takes too much time, I'd rather color."

From an older group, one said, "The pledge should thrill the heart of every true American." Another one said, "Never let our enemies tear us down."

Many famous flag stories have endeared us to the heritage of our country and its flag. The first flags adopted by our colonial forefathers were symbolic of their struggle with the wilderness of a new land and their desire to preserve that heritage. Barbara Frietchie set the flag

in her window and defied the soldiers to shoot it down. General Jackson was so moved by her bravery he ordered his men to move on. Edward Hale wrote the novel, "The Man Without A Country." He was an officer being court martialed and forced to live fifty years on the sea. His dying words were, "I loved the old flag." There were 34 stars on the blue field at the time. In 1912 it was President Taft who ordered the arrangement of six rows of eight stars each. This flag with 48 stars waved proudly for 47 years. In 1959 a star for Alaska and in

1960 one was added for Hawaii. This symbolizes the unity of the fifty states today.

Many of our statesmen have taught us love for country, respect for the flag and courage to live for what it stands by their quotations.

Woodrow Wilson said, "Our flag has no other character than that which we give it." How many times have you heard these words quoted? "Think not what the country can do for you but what you can do for your country."

Abraham Lincoln said, "Let us have faith, that right makes

might." And in that faith let us, to the end dare to do our duty as we understand it."

While progress beckons us forward, history calls backward to examine our heritage. As our nation prepares to celebrate its bicentennial in 1976, let's re-examine our records. The challenge may be before us in a new form. The task remains ever the same to insure us that we do not lose by default what the blood and sacrifices of previous generations have gained.

"Old Glory" is my nickname. Proudly I wave on high.

# Rochester Man Hit-Run Victim

Sam S. Lyles, 79, retired farmer from Rochester, was struck and killed by an auto on Friday night as he crossed the street to his home. He died about 10:40 p. m. and was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Emmett Cross.

A dark late model automobile is being sought in connection with the hit-run incident.

No witnesses to the incident could be found, but Haskell County Deputy Sheriff Bill Holcomb, who apparently came up

on the scene immediately after Lyles was struck, said he chased a suspect vehicle for some distance before losing it in the darkness.

The sheriff's department said the vehicle being sought is a 1970 or 1971 Pontiac with a damaged right front fender, broken headlight, and missing right mirror. Anyone having information of such an automobile should report it immediately to the sheriff's office.

Lyle's body was thrown approximately 40 feet by the impact, investigating officers said.

Services were conducted at 2 p. m. Monday, July 1, in the Rochester First United Methodist Church with the Rev. Norman Patton, pastor, officiating. Burial was in the Rochester Cemetery.

Mr. Lyles was born July 3, 1893, in Kentucky and moved to Texas as a young boy with his parents. He married the form-

er Matti Edna Holmes at Rayland on November 19, 1912. Mr. and Mrs. Lyles moved to Rochester in 1941 from Childress,

and she died Aug. 20, 1972. Mr. Lyles was a member of the Methodist Church.

He is survived by three sons,

Roy of Weslaco, John of Chickasha, Okla., and Charles of Lovington, N. M.; a daughter, Mrs. Vada Parker of New Home; 16 grandchildren; 11 great-grandchildren; three brothers, Curtis, Roy and Robert, all of Vernon; and two sisters, Mrs. Charles Walker and Mrs. Emma Wood, also both of Vernon.

Pallbearers were Curtis Love, R. B. Townsend, Earl Aivis, Vaughn Brooks, O. T. Poe and Troy Brown.

Investigation into the incident that took the life of Mr. Lyles is continuing.

## Grants Awarded Area Schools

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Congressman Omar Burleson announced today grants totaling \$4,203.00 to Haskell County schools. The grants will be allocated as follows:

Haskell Independent School District, \$1,656.00; Paint Creek Rural High School District, \$165.00; Rochester Independent School District, \$678.00; Rule Independent School District, \$770.00; Carney Independent School District, \$641.00; Weinert Rural High School District \$293.00.

These funds will be used to provide programs and projects to meet the special education needs of educationally deprived children in pre-school programs, elementary schools, and certain selected secondary schools if the local educational agency determines there is a need.

The grants have been made available under Part C of Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act which provides special programs for educationally disadvantaged children.

## Susan Lewis, Kyle Wilfong Attend 4-H Congress In Dallas

When some 500 4-H members converge on Dallas July 23 for the opening of the Texas 4-H Congress, they'll have a serious purpose in mind—looking at careers.

Theme of the four-day conference, which will be at the Baker Hotel, will be "Careers in the World of Work."

Congress delegates will be 15 to 19 years of age and will represent all areas of Texas.

According to Miss Yvonne Garcia, 4-H and youth specialist for the Texas Agricultural

Extension Service, the objectives of the Congress are for the youth to recognize the need to plan for selecting a career and to use a rational process in planning for their choice of a career.

Featured speakers include Dr. Herman L. Glaeser of Concordia Teachers College, Seward, Neb., and John D. "Jack" Jackson, ground school instructor for American Airlines, Inc., Flight Academy, Fort Worth. These speakers will reflect on their personal career experiences as well as give their perspectives on selecting and planning for careers.

"A highlight of the conference will be the division of Congress participants into mini-groups to participate in discussions and tours of various businesses and services in the Dallas and Fort Worth areas," points out Miss Garcia.

Four groups will be related to manufacturing and processing, banking and finance, public service, recreation and leisure, merchandising and sales, and transportation.

The delegation will attend Granny's Dinner Theater the evening of July 24 for the production of "Never Too Late," with Bob Cummings. A special Congress Ball will be held the following evening.

New officers and members of the Texas 4-H Council for 1974-75 will be presented at the closing session of the Congress on the morning of July 26. The state Council consists of the chairman and vice chairman of each of the 13 Extension Service district 4-H councils plus four delegates-at-large.

Representing Haskell County at the Texas 4-H Congress will be Susan Lewis and Kyle Wilfong. Susan is a member of the Rule 4-H Club and is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Lewis of Rule. She was the 1974 Gold Star 4-H Girl. Kyle is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Andy Wilfong and was the 1973 Gold Star Boy for Haskell County.

WACO—(Sp1)—A number of county Farm Bureau leaders from over the state are expected to attend the first annual Adult Citizenship Seminar here July 16-17, sponsored by the Texas Farm Bureau, according to J. T. (Red) Woodson, TFB president.

The state farm organization has sponsored a citizenship seminar for high school students the past 11 years and is this year adding a session for adults, Woodson said. He explained that the Adult Citizenship Seminar is being planned because of widespread demand for such an affair patterned after the highly successful young peoples' seminar.

The adult seminar will be held at the Waco Plaza Hotel while the youth seminar is in session on the Baylor University campus. Speaker for the adult seminar will be W. Cleon Skousen of Salt Lake City, Utah, who is also scheduled to address the youth group. Skousen's presentation on the American political system is the equivalent to a four-hour college course in Political Science, according to Woodson.

Skousen will speak to the adults on the afternoon and evening of July 16. The following morning's session will be devoted to group discussions and analyses of Skousen's remarks along with consideration of related matters that the conferees wish to discuss.

Skousen, former FBI agent and chief of police for Salt Lake City, is a widely-traveled lecturer who averages more than 300 appearances a year. He is best known for his books which include "The Naked Communist" and "The Naked Capitalist."

## WCT Council Of Gov'ts. Gets Grant

AUSTIN—Gov. Dolph Briscoe has approved three grants totaling \$74,900 for improving law enforcement and justice in the area served by the West Central Texas Council of Governments, Abilene.

Largest of the grants, \$34,125, will provide fourth-year funding of the regional law enforcement teletype network. Through this network, 21 law enforcement agencies have rapid access to computerized data at the state and national levels.

Brown County will receive \$10,084 for second-year employment of a county juvenile probation officer who provides supervisory services for juveniles placed on probation by the courts.

West Central Texas Council of Governments also will receive a regional planning grant of \$30,790 to develop a comprehensive criminal justice plan. The plan will emphasize reduction of index crimes, juvenile delinquency and recidivism in the 19-county region.

The money comes from the Criminal Justice Division of the Governor's Office. CJD administers the state's block grant from the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration under the Crime Control Act of 1973.

The local grants were among 50 totaling \$7.2 million approved by the governor.

## WTC Course Will Include Trip To Baltimore

SNYDER — A three-hour college credit course which will include a week-long trip to Baltimore, Md., will be offered at Western Texas College next fall, Joe Reaves, instructor, has announced.

The course, Contemporary Social Problems, will require four evening classes during the semester in addition to the Baltimore trip. Two of the three-hour class sessions will meet before the trip to prepare for it, and two will meet afterward to discuss trip experiences. No tests or research papers are required for the seminar-type course.

The class members will be the guests of the city of Baltimore by special invitation of Mayor William D. Schafer who is scheduled to visit WTC in October prior to the class trip to his city. One day in nearby Washington D. C., is also planned.

Urban Problems will be the major focus of the course, Sociology 232, with emphasis placed upon urban poverty, pollution, education, crime law enforcement and city government.

"Visits to ghettos, factories, schools, and city government agencies should prove most enlightening," says Reaves. "There is simply no substitute for first hand experience in such studies."

The cost for the course is tentatively estimated at \$200 per student including tuition and round-trip air fare from Lubbock. Meals and lodging will be arranged later.

Only a limited number of students can be accepted, said Reaves. Persons interested may contact him or the office of the registrar at Western Texas College to make applications for the course.

Advertising is his forte, and he is noted for publishing special sections of the Tribune. He is well known in Texas for his promotional projects on both his newspaper and in his community.

Regarding his upcoming term as president of the Texas Press Assn., he said he "looks for a year in which we may lead the members of the press association toward greater promotional efforts in alerting their community as to the significant part they play in the business community, as well as the dissemination of news."

During the term, Sedam heads the association of 600 Texas pressmen, he also will serve as the Gulf Coast Assn. This marks the first time a TPA president of one of the regional organizations.

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**CONSERVATION  
VIEW POINTS**

1974 Fiscal Year has been a year of change. A lot has happened during the past 12 months and some good and some not so good.

Emergency Conservation Program (ECP) was started in Haskell County. The Soil and Water Conservation District Directors agree the purpose of the program is to accomplish what has not been accomplished in the past. The direct result of having ECP was that much of Haskell County farm lands were damaged. The point is that it will take time to regain the productivity that was lost.

Environmental Conservation Program (RECP) was started in 1974. This was a good thing, but not enough financial assistance was made available to county farmers and ranchers for their needs.

1974 Rural Environmental Conservation Program (REAP) was started. Again, this was a good thing, but not enough financial assistance was made available to carry out the program. As the year progressed, there was talk in conservation circles that Congress was not going to appropriate funds to continue the program.

Plains Conservation Program (PCP). This was bad. News came during the week that Congress has appropriated \$20 million for operation of this program during the 1975 Fiscal Year.

Year started out in July, with plenty of ground moisture in most places of the county. Always use this condition in West Texas. But as the year drew to a close, the lack of rainfall during the year has caused a drastic decrease in soil moisture and livestock water.

Cotton and grain sorghums are suffering to the point of dying in many places. Livestock farmers and ranchers are having to haul water for their cattle. The spring wheat crop suffered some for lack of winter and spring rains. And the picture doesn't look very hopeful for immediate relief from the drought. This is bad.

The news distribution media available to the Haskell Field Office of the Soil Conservation Service has been extra good to us this year. The Cen-Tex Cable TV Scanner system at Haskell has run our conservation cartoons continuously throughout the year. The Haskell Free Press has published 52 issues of this column and an additional 30 articles informing the general reading public of the various phases of conservation happenings during the year. Radio Station KDWT, Stamford, has given much time to conservation spot announcements. Our sincere thanks to these institutions for their contributions to the cause of conservation.

Let us look forward to a good year that lies ahead of us.

**SS Payments Increased**

The second part of a two-step increase in monthly social security benefits will be included in checks delivered in July, according to Glyn Hammons, social security district

manager in Abilene. The overall increase will amount to 11 percent for most people getting social security benefits. A 7 percent increase was included in checks starting in April.

"The increase will enhance the financial security of about 30 million people who get social security benefits," Hammons said. "People getting social security checks don't have to do anything to get the higher payments. The increase will be added automatically."

For 1974 the amount of yearly

earnings subject to social security deductions has been increased from the first \$10,800 to the first \$13,200, but there is no increase in the contribution rate. Employees and employers will continue to pay 5.8 percent each on covered earnings and the rate for self-employed people drops to 7.9 percent.
