
Spring's Pony Farm's covered wagon.

### **Green Thumb Tips**

Moonflower is a quick-growing climber, producing massive 6 inch flowers which open at night with such speed that you can actually observe the petals move. In mild areas it can be grown as a perennial, but is best treated as an annual grown fresh from seed each year.

If you want to grow those gigantic sunflowers — the kind people win contests with, the variety to look for in the seed displays and catalogs is Sun-flower, Mammoth. The black-and-white striped seeds should be planted directly into the garden after danger of frost in a sunny location and fertile soil, The huge yellow flowers appear on 6 ft. stalks, and the centers cllout as the seeds develop. Birds are especially fond of sunflower seeds, and so are children, since the meaty kernels have a nutty flavor.

Strawflowers are a recent addition to the flower garden. Discovered growing wild in the meadows of Western Australia, they are easy-to-grow. In addi-tion to creating a magnificent garden display during summer, they can be dried to last all winter in dried flower arrange-ments. Colors include crimson, yellow, orange, pink and white.

Parsley is one of the most useful herbs you can grow, and some gardeners even use it as edging to a flower border. The aced can be direct sown into the garden, and although seed is generally slow to germinate, it is quite reliable. As the plants is quite reliable. As the plants fill out you can snip sprigs to add flavor to so many dishes. Parsley is a biennial, and it will stay green in the garden even during winter, but the second season it will go to seed. An-other good idea with parsley is to pot up some plants in the fall to keep indoors on a kitchen window.

Many household items make excellent planters to start seeds in. Pie and produce trays from the supermarket are good, and empty egg cartons are even bet-ter. For growing larger plants that need plenty of root room such as tomatoes and peppers. try using empty milk cartons filled with planting soil.

"The gasoline shortage is caused by lack of refinery capacity and by the emission control systems on cars," said Granville Garside, special counsel to the Senate Committee on Interior and Insular Affairs.

"Diesel fuel will be short because our refineries are producing gasoline which has a higher profit return." Garside continued. He added that while diesel will be short it probably will be available at least until September, but farmers may have to search out supply sources.

Fuel shortages could continue for the next several years unless some leadership and proper planning emerges soon, the experts warned. They recommended the establishment of a National Energy Commission. incentives for industry to find new sources of oil and gas, and a more realistic approach to environmental problems.

GSPA has contacted authoriies about the energy crisis on the farm, encouraging them to make sure fuel is available now to produce food required by the American consumer at a realistic price.
