More Poultry Need to Relieve the Meat Shortage

Raise more poultry to help relieve the meat shortage is the plea being given both farm and urban families by the War Food Administration. A substantial increase in the number of chickens planned for today is the quickest and most effective method of increasing the civilian meat supply.

As an added incentive to growers, ceiling prices of broilers, fryers, and roosters will be raised by

a national average of about 1 1-4 cents per pound on July 1st.

Military demands for meat of all kinds is so high that "red" meats for civilians will be decreased by approximately 19 lbs. per capita in 1945. Unless the planned 1945 poultry supply is increased, there will be a 4 pound per capita decrease in chicken supplies.

Adding one or two extra broods of chicks, or increasing the size of the broods in prospect is the best way for Haskell county producers to participate in this program. Louise Newman, county Home Demonstration Agent, suggests immediate action on the part of the producers in order to have fryers and broilers ready to sell by mid or late July when the demand for meat is greatest.

Unequal Distribution Big Factor In Meat Shortage

The meat problem is largely one of unequal distribution. In brief, it boils down to this. Federally inspected meat is the only meat that can cross state lines. It is the only meat that can be purchased for use of the armed forces.

In order to get the meat it needs the government claims a certain percentage of the total slaughter of the federally inspected plants. At present this amounts to about a third of the federally inspected slaughter. Meat remaining at the federally inspected plants after the government needs have been met is the only meat available then, to ship across state lines to civilian markets outside the meat producing areas.

The meat "shortage" is not so much a shortage in the number of pounds of meat as it is an abundance of purchasing power. Animal population, and total slaughter are actually ahead of pre-war averages. But, here's the situation. With family income up generally throughout the country there is a ready local market for meat almost everywhere. At present, slaughter by non-federally inspected plants, where there is no army "take" is expanding. So is farm slaughter. As a result meat is plentiful in towns where livestock for local slaughter is close at hand. But it has been getting scarcer and scarcer in cities supplied largely by packers who ship across state lines.

Ration points help to even the distribution of meat, but ration points alone cannot do the whole job. Additional means of getting fair distribution have been recommended by the Office of Economic Stabilization. The object will be to (1) expand the intake and output of the federally inspected plants, and (2) check the expansion of non-federally inspected slaughter, so that some of the animals that might otherwise be slaughtered in plants without federal inspection, will be diverted to the federally inspected plants where meat from them will be available for army procurement or for interstate shipment.
