No Short Cut

William M. Jeffers rubber czar, recently struck hard at "loose and careless" talk about the rubber shortage; there will be tires for all only if the most stringent measures are applied and received with 100 per cent cooperation on the part of the public. That is the grim truth.

There is no easy short cut to rubber conservation, or to the production of more rubber "The facts are," Mr. Jeffers said, "that the Japanese cut off 90 per cent of our supplies and that as a result the United States is compressing into two years the building of a tremendous synthetic rubber industry which ordinarily would take a dozen years to build.

The greatest reserve supply of rubber we have in this country is the million tons of rubber in the tires of our passenger cars and trucks. We must stretch that million tons as far as it will possibly go-and maybe a little farther.

Don't Shoot, Please

A Washington committee, fearful of a danger. ous doctor shortage, has proposed arbitrary hearing of further enlistment by medical men in the armed services until a bureau has been created to "supervise and control the drafting and recruiting of doc. tors." Apparently, pending establishment of the bureau, our soldiers are supposed to keep out of the way of enemy bullets.

The military services are entitled to every doctor they need. And they are entitled to them without awaiting the leasure of a bureau in Washington. As the American Medical Journal observes "The least that the nation can do for those who offer their lives in combat is to provide them with the utmost that the medicine can offer for the alleviation of the wounded and the prevention of unnecessary death." The armed forces are getting the

doctors they need. They are getting them now; the

As far as civilian needs are concerned the American Medical Journal points out that a weekly survey by the Procurement and Assignment Service maintains a constant check on physicians in local communities. This service was created by the President of the United States. It works in close co. operation with the medical profession which does not propose to allow any lapse in the high and hard won health standards of America.

Painless Ruin

Government borrowing, according to a recent statement of the Secretary of the Treasury. will amount to between \$7,000,000,000 and \$10,-000.000,000 during December. He emphasized that as much as possible of this gigantic sum must come out of the "current income and savings of the

people," rather than from the banks.

The reason is plain, Borrowing heavily from the banks means more inflation, because it creates new credit. Borrowing directly from the people is an effective brake on inflation. Unfortunately, it is easier to borrow from the banks-which is nnly one step removed from printing greenbacks-than it is to go to the already burdened taxpayer. The oliticians have so far taken the easiest way with little objection from the people. However, the cost of total war is so great that a day of reckoning is close. We can "painlessly" stuff our banks with gov. ernment obligations until our money and our savings are destroyed and the war effort imperiled, or we can dig into our pockets and our standard of living with the realization that the war must be won the hard way.

The banking industry has steadily opposed unlimited government borrowing from the banks, The bankers have worked ceaselessly to sell War Bonds directly to the people. They have sold over 80 per cent of all such bonds in the hands of the public. Thanks to their efforts, the inflationary trend has been definitely slowed.

Fire Can Be Final

Millions of the people will soon have to walk to their offices and their grocery stores because the United States is desperately short of rubber, And yet in a single fire we allowed one-tenth of our total crude rubber supply to go up in smoke! We allowed carelessness to do the work of an enemy bomber. We allow the same carelessness to destroy hundreds of millions of dollars in property and thousands of lives every year. The taxes we pay to support fire departments, cannot protect us against our own carelessness. Nothing can protect us except a final realization that uncontrolled fire is a deadly menace. Once we realize that, the problem of fire can be solved.

The National Board of Fire Underwriters has published a book entitled "Fire Prevention Education." It is written expressly for the use of teachers, community leaders, fire chiefs, public officials, Scouts and civilian defense aides. It applies to home and factory alike. 


