

### **FSA Accepting Emergency Loan Applications**

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by drought are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency (FSA) office located in Anson, Marilyn S. Richer said.

Callahan County is one of 57 in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Dan Glickman eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the drought.

Marilyn Richer said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 3.75 percent.

"As a general rule a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FSA emergency loan, Ms. Richer said. Farmers participat-

ing in the Federal Crop Insurance program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until June 23, 1997 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Ms. Richer said.

FSA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognize farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority

The FSA office in Anson is open from 8:00 to 5;00 Monday through Friday.





AUSTIN - Gov. George W. Bush's call for property tax relief could negatively affect funding of public education in Texas, Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock and House Speaker Pete Laney said last week.

Bullock compared the present funding system, in which propertyrich school districts send money to property-poor districts, to a house of cards.

"You remove one card and the whole house may fall down," he said.

"Property taxes and (the schoolfunding formula) are joined at the brain. Any changes in one will unquestionably change the formula itself," Bullock told incoming legislators at an orientation meeting.

Lancy agreed with Bullock and said he is waiting for Bush to release a plan that can be studied and assessed.

The governor has made cutting the \$10 billion homeowners and businesses pay in school property taxes a priority for the 1997 legislative session, which will convene Jan. 14.

Sharp Calls for Cuts, Savings

State Comptroller John Sharp last week delivered his fourth Texas Performance Review report, calling for more than \$3.5 billion in taxpayer savings over the next five years.

"Once again," Sharp said, "we've scoured state government for outdated programs and new ways to save Texans money.'

The report, titled "Disturbing the Peace: The Challenge of Change in Texas Government,' presents 428 detailed proposals for saving taxpayers more than \$1.2 billion during the 1998-99 biennium and more than \$3.5 billion by the end of 2002.

Sharp proposed cutting 6,600 fully funded but unfilled state jobs, saving more than \$470 million during the next biennium.

He proposed cutting 1,720 current state jobs over the next twoyear period through an early retirement incontive plan and other mea-

And among other proposals, he called for:

 Abolishing the Texas Department of Commerce and shifting the agency's duties to a new non-profit public/private entity; and

. Issuing Texans lifetime driver's licenses, with free-of-charge updates required every 12 years.

About three-quarters of the savings recommended in Sharp's previous performance reviews have been adopted by the Texas Legislature.

Private Schools, Public Funds Lake Travis Independent School District board member Fred Walker, who sponsored a proposal to use taxpayer dollars to pay for private school tuition, is busy with plans to open a new private school that could benefit from the plan.

The Austin American-Statesman reported Walker is proposing the Parents as Partners Scholarship Program, a tuition reimbursement plan for the district of 2,900 students.

At the same time, he and his pastor at the Lakeway Ecumenical Church are working to build support for the construction of a Roman Catholic school adjacent to a 20-acre site where a new Catholic church is to be built next year in this community a few minutes West of Austin.

Supporters say vouchers would give parents more control over their children's education, but critics say a voucher system would take tax dollars away from public schools.

Annette Cootes, a spokeswoman for the Texas State Teachers Association, told the American-Statesman, "There will definitely be a lawsuit filed if (Texas Education Commissioner Mike Moses) allows it to proceed."

#### **Other Capital Highlights**

Texas Banking Commissioner Catherine Ghiglieri said 24 state banks in Texas will be examined less frequently beginning in 1997. She said the resulting reduction in regulatory costs will be passed along to the affected banks through a decrease in their assessments for examinations. The reduction in examinations for the 24 banks will be from once every 12 months to every 18 months for well-run banks with assets of \$100 million to \$500 million

 Texas Land Commissioner Read the Garry Mauro has suggested that Gov. Bush call out the National Guard or get prison inmates to help fight beach erosion in Southeast Texas. Unusually high tides have eaten away more than 50 feet of beach on the Gulf of Mexico in Galveston and Brazoria counties, Mauro wrote in a letter to the governor. Bush spokesman Ray Sullivan said the governor's office is reviewing Mauro's plan.

A Christmas tree is to go up this week at the south end of the Capitol's Great Walk, where a permanent underground tree stand and tree anchors were designed into the sidewalk. The 30-foot Eastern Red Cedar came from land adjacent to Bastrop State Park, southeast of Austin.

A state audit released last week said the Lone Star Card, which debuted about a year ago, is working well. More than a million Texas welfare recipients use the plastic cards, which resemble credit cards, to receive welfare benefits electronically.

Regulators at the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission are considering a crackdown on industrial polluters that have operated under a "grandfather" clause in the 1971 Texas clean air law. A report is expected in about a week.

### What Are Dreams?

Pondering on those famous words we usually hear at least once a day "I have a dream "How many Americans would even consider world peace as a possible reality. It took old fashioned courage for Christopher Columbus to get financing from the Queen to sail a world thought to be flat It was Bravery that spurred the penning of the United States Constitution Albert Einstein wrote "Imaginations more important than knowledge. "The wonderful part of dreams is they are unreasoned. I'm sure to some Columbus' plans even seemed unreasonable. Dreams do no have to make sense to anyone but you. Dreams are the impetus of expecting for things to happen. Dreams make us all curious of what we could be and they mobilize all of us to have hope in "obtaining" those dreams. "We can change the world by changing people, Charles Wells."No one ever says when they grow up that they want to be different, incapable, segregated, isolated or separate from being included as an integral part of society. Labels make us forget that person is an individual. When we label a person who has a disability, the label hides abilities and capabilities. Why not seek everyone's "unrecognized abilities." Labeling could be likened to why as a country we keep records. We keep records basically because we want to see how you as an individual size up. We separate by our language. Think about a word our youth uses "dis" or "dys" today. It means don't be saying that! Think on these few dis-regard, dis-respect, dis-card, dis-avow, dis-order, dis-trust, dis-eased, dys-f, mctional. Having a disability in our society means that most people will think of you differently. Negatively.Is different bad or just different? Our culture values being productive, skilled, attractive and affluent.For a number of reasons none of these attributes are connected to persons with disabilities. These perceptions are myths. Myths are powerful. "It's not hard to make decisions when you know what your values are, Roy Disney." In almost every case the label was used to degrade someone or to separate them from "us." Labels are used to devalue people and to JUSTIFY their exclusion.In President Clinton's first term, in four "words" he changed an entire (or at least a large majority) world view regarding homosexuality. What once was considered a perversity is now considered an alternate life stlye. Those words were "Don't ask, don't tell." He set a standard for the majority. The issue of appropriate education for ALL is NOT one of the issues as a country we are still deciding. Twenty-one years ago we set a standard for appropriate education. Since then we have continued to review and to define and to pay for an education services not being given. The facts are that 3.5 million Texans have disabilities. 800,000 Texans require assistance in everday living. Texans spend 2.75 billion on long term care. As a society we encourage institutionalization at the price of 181,000 per year per individual. But we will not assist the disabled more than 6,000.00per year if they CHOOSE to live on their own. A recent survey says that not even half of the educational services are received and of what is received is inappropriate. Society is not only paying once but twice and to high a price. So why do educational personnel continue to break the law? How? By not appropriating proper teaching and denying services. The teachers, principals, etc. are not to be considered professionals just because that is their profession. A professional chooses, seeks and purposes after excellence for ALL. Including changes to accommodate ALL. A professional does not collect their paycheck and just do enough to get by. Their attitude is not allowing some to just fall by the wayside if they can't keep up. Because someone can language justification does not make the act right or fair. What do you call people who murder children's dreams? Is it possible that we have a new day kind of Hitler? What can they dream with out a proper education? Society is paying their salaries. The constitution makes the way for a "FREE AND APPROPRIATE EDUCATION FOR ALL". It is all of our responsibility to as a society to remove all barriers that uphold exclusion. None of us have the authority to exclude someone/anyone else. It is a civic responsibility, not a favor. Who's responsible for people feeling "locked out" and "excluded" from the "American Dream."We begin by sharing the dream and end with a thought from Dan Wilkins: Imagine a world of diversity and interdependence where people are respected simply for who they are; where commonalities are recognized and differences are celebrated for what they truly are: opportunities to bring something unique and individual to our community. ### Larry Fitzgerald, Jr.

Abilene's first television news personality, Larry Fitzgerald, Jr., passed away Tuesday, December 10, 1996 after a long battle with cancer.

Funeral services were held at 11 a.m. Thursday, December 12, 1996 at the Elliott-Hamil Funeral Home, James Hallmark officiated. Burial was in the Elmwood Memorial Park.

Fitzgerald began his broadcasting career in Abilene with KRBC radio and when that station added Abilene's first television station in 1953, Fitzgerald, along with Dub Bowlus, signed on with the Big Country's first newscast.

In the mid 50's, Fitzgerald left KRBC to work at KMID-TV of Midland as assistant news director and news anchor. However, he returned to KRBC as news director and news anchor two years later. He held his job until moving to the same position at KTAB-TV of Abilene in October 1979. Fitzgerald retired from on-air work at KTAB in the late 80's but continued to work at the station in off-air management until his full retirement this year.


Fitzgerald was born in Louisville, KY, on July 29, \*1931, to Dr. and Mrs. Lawrence Fitzgerald, Sr. His father was a Baptist minister whose position led the family to move to El Paso where Fitzgerald attended public schools. Then, the family moved to Pennsylvania where Fitzgerald graduated from high school.

After high school, Fitzgerald came to Abilene to attend Hardin-Simmons University. White at HSU, Fitzgerald worked for KHSU (campus radio station) and then did part-time work at KRBC radio. Upon graduation with a degree in English, Fitzgerald continued work toward a master's degree and went to work at KRBC on a full time basis.

Fitzgerald's 6 p.m. and 10 p.m. news casts always rated number one in Abilene despite growing competition over the years. In fact, when he changed to KTAB, he took a loyal viewership with him and brought number one ratings to that station. His newscasts and his news crews constantly won awards for excellence in broadcast journalism on a yearly basis and he is a member of Who's Who in Television.

Fitzgerald married the former Shirley Royall on July 15, 1953. They had two sons: Dr. Larry Fitzgerald, III of Cisco and Gary Lee Fitzgerald. Gary died in 1990. Fitzgerald is also survived by one brother, Jim Fitzgerald of Cincinnati. Another brother, Frank Fitzgerald, died in the '50's.

much needed room for


the local road maintenance crew. They will have to build and pave the yard around the shop and office. All trucks and other equipment will have to also be moved by the maintenance crew to the new yard.
