A SURE TEST

Of one thing we can be certain, in spite of the accusations flying back and forth between government officials and food producers—the producers, being in the last analysis mostly independent farmers, will produce as long as there is a shadow of a possible profit. When profits cease to exist, they must cease to operate because they do not have the capital to produce merely out of patriotism. Thus, as time goes on and specific items disappear from the market, you may be pretty certain that costs prohibit production. Once the immediate pressure of government purchases is relieved, this will be a sure test.

WHAT KIND OF FREEDOM?

The president of the American Federation of Labor, in objecting to the Russian proposal that German labor be forced to rebuild damaged cities in war-torn Europe, says: "Hitler and those responsible for the war must be punished, but the people throughout the world, including labor everywhere, must be made free and must be guaranteed the right to enjoy the blessings and the benefits of freedom, liberty and democracy." Without arguing the merits or demerits of the Russian proposal, the remarks about guaranteeing the freedom of labor will be taken with several grains of salt. In the United States, a man cannot work at the basic trades without first joining specified labor organizations, whether or not he wishes to, and paying initiation fees and assessments. Just try to work without "joining" if you

doubt this. Is this the kind of labor "freedom, liberty and democracy" the world is to have? Why kid ourselves about freedom in the United States when an individual must pay for the right to work, even on a government war job!

8,400,000 BIBLES GIVEN

In prewar days, one who had occasion to travel had considerable satisfaction in finding a Bible on the desk or bureau of his hotel room. It was placed there, not by the hotel, but by the Gideons International, the Christian Commercial Men's Association of America, though, of course, with the consent of the hotel management. Figures covering this organization's work since the war began, reveal that it has distributed 8,400,000 copies of the New Testament to servicemen and women. In addition, 75,000 complete Bibles have been given to chaplains.

Testaments for the Army are bound in brown; those for the Navy in blue, while the 150,000 Testaments that went to the nurses had a binding of robin's egg blue. Many of the men in the front line battle have lost their testaments and these have been replaced, in some cases as many as three times.

The Testaments are distributed at the rate of 200,000 per month and the cost of the Bibles and distribution is borne by voluntary contributions.

THE HEBREW MONARCHY AT ITS HEIGHT

LESSON TEXT—1 Kings 9:1-7, 26; 10:26-28; 11:4, 11. GOLDEN TEXT—Blessed is the nation whose God is the Lord.—Psalm 33:12.

Keeping up with the neighbors is not always a desirable thing, but both men and nations do it. When the last judge, Samuel, had become old, Israel began to demand a king like the nations round about them.

Although the rejection of His direct rule over them through His chosen men was a sad development, God permitted them to choose a king. Saul, their first king, was evidently selected for his appearance and his physical superiority. He began well, in dependence upon God,

he took custody of a man indicted by the Haskell county Grand Jury.

David, who followed Saul, had his failings, but was essentially a man after God's own heart. He wanted to build a temple for God, but because he was a man of war, God decreed that his son, Solomon, who succeeded him, was to build it. With the reign of Solomon, and especially with the building of the temple, the monarchy in Israel reached its highest development—only, to go down to disaster. Our lesson opens after the remarkably fine prayer with which Solomon dedicated the temple. I. Dedication Accepted (9:1-3). God was pleased with Solomon's intelligent and spiritual prayer and the act of dedication, and He allowed the house of the Lord by putting His name on it and assuring them of His continual presence. It is a delightful thing that God is willing to accept at the hands of a man the dedication of either himself or his possessions for God's glory. The Lord is Maker of heaven and earth and surely has no need of what we have. And yet He does have need of it, and is ready to use it as we present it to Him. Our act of dedication results in His act of acceptance and consecration of our talents, our time, our money, or our goods for His glorious service. But God expects His people to continue in devotion to Him if they are to have His continued presence and blessing. II. Consecration Expected (9:4-7). The throne of David was to remain in the lineage of Solomon as long as he and the people of Israel walked uprightly before God. He expects obedience to His commandments, and apart from it He cannot give His blessing. Note the faithfulness of God. No man would ever have introduced such a note of solemn portent and of warning into an occasion which seemed all gladness and light. Prosperity was at its height. The king was in favor with both God and man. Into that picture of success and grandeur God paints with bold strokes a great and striking "IF." It is presumption to think that we can coast along on past attainments or former piety. If we are to be used and blessed of God tomorrow and the day after, we must look to our consecration to Him and our obedience to His will. III. Possessions Glorified (9:26; 10:26-28). We read in 10:23 that "King Solomon exceeded all kings of the earth in riches and wisdom." He had reached the pinnacle. The Chinese have a proverb, "The man who stands on the pinnacle has nowhere to step but off."

It need not have been a snare for Solomon to be rich if he had maintained his simple faith in God, but the temptations brought in by heath-

en wives whom he foolishly married, coupled with the deceitfulness of riches (Matt. 13:22), soon led him into the downward path. The almost unbelievable riches of Solomon could have been used for the glory of God, but instead they were an end in themselves. When money takes the ruling hand in a man's life, he loses out spiritually. His life becomes an empty farce; his soul can be satisfied with only more and more gold. Solomon was soon led into the folly of turning to the worship of heathen gods. Little wonder that we find: IV. Judgment Decreed (11:4, 11). It would seem that a man who knows the Lord should grow in grace and become even more intimate with God as he grows old. One might expect that the passing of years should mellow and sweeten life. But sad to say, it is often not the case. "When Solomon was old," he went after false gods. How tragic! Little wonder that one of the saintliest men this writer ever knew prayed constantly as he went on into his eighties, "Lord, keep me from ever becoming a wicked old man." Other old men and women (yes, and all of us) could well pray the same prayer. So it became necessary for God to wrest the kingdom out of the hands of the great Solomon, and Israel goes on to its history of a people divided, of disobedience to God, and of ultimate judgment. Of that we shall see more in the weeks just ahead.

Advises Checking of Pressure Cookers

Pressure cookers, one of the most important tools for the home frontiers, should be kept in good working order, Miss Louise Newman, county Home Demonstration Agent, cautioned this week.
All government agencies interested in food preservation and the Sub-Committee of Food Preservation Committee of the Texas State Nurition Council recommend that gauges on the pressure cookers be tested once each year, and should be re-tested if the cooker has been dropped or receives a heavy blow. It is wise to test them well in advance of the canning season so that the repairs and adjustments may be made before time to use them.
From a dollars-and-cents standpoint, only a few jars of food lost because of a faulty gauge would exceed the cost of the new one.
A limited number of new pressure cookers are available through regular commercial channels. These are not rationed at the present time.
Persons wanting their cookers checked should contact the county Home Demonstration Agent before May 12 to arrange for use of the testing equipment.
