## NOTES ON AGRICULTURE



### More Grain, Less Cotton

There are more acres of grain sorghums in Haskell County this year than cotton, according to Bob Crocker, AAA secretary. Crocker attributes this to three reasons: increased cost of cotton production, labor shortage and excellent returns of grain sorghums last year.

He said there were 90,000 acres of harvest grain sorghums in the county, 90,000 acres of cotton, and that there was a large acreage of grain sorghums for bundle feeds.

### Pretty Good Crops

Bill Berry, Sagerton, says "crops are pretty good" in his community.

Berry has picked eight bales of cotton from a field of 45 acres and expects to get seven more, or a third of a bale to the acre. He has 170 white Leghorn hens and pullets and says the hens are laying pretty good.

### Wild Turkeys

Residents of Throckmorton and Shackelford counties report having seen several bunches of wild turkeys on the ranch ranges of the two counties.

Dink Ball, highway foreman in Shackelford, said he saw 39 turkeys feeding in a group early one morning. One Seymourite said he had seen several bunches in Throckmorton County.

### Deep Breaking Sandy Soil

George Pool, Rochester, went to Austin Thursday where he met with the State AAA committeemen in an effort to have included in the 1945 program the practice of deep breaking of sandy soil.

The committee took no action on Pool's request but will consider it later and if adopted the program would be applicable in the northwest part of the county. Pool has been advocating the program for the last three years. Tests have shown that the practice helps to prevent blowing of the soil and increases production.

## Certificates Must Be Obtained For Protein Meal

In order to assure equitable distribution of protein meal supplies, buyers must obtain certificates of need from their county AAA committee before purchasing protein meal from any processor in Oklahoma, Texas or New Mexico.

Under an order issued by the War Food Administration processors are required to secure certificates of need from each person, including feeders, who buys more than 500 pounds of protein meal within any 30-day period.

"This order assures that our supplies of protein meal will be equitably distributed," John W. Brock, Chairman of the county AAA committee, said.

Proclamation

Whereas, it is contemplated by and is the opinion of the City Council of the City of Haskell, that the Allied Military forces are approaching triumph over the brutal and wicked forces under Hitler and our declared enemy, the German Reich; and believing such triumph will be achieved through the able leadership and our illustrious armies guided by an all powerful and just God; the members of the City Council of Haskell believe that when such victory be achieved the people of Haskell should, with a proper and reverend spirit, recognize and celebrate the same.

Therefore, immediately upon receipt of news of such a victory the City fire alarm will be sounded, whether in the daytime or at night, and the City Council recommends a complete cessation of all business during a period of twenty-four hours following the signal. Should such signal occur between the hours of 7:00 p. m. and 10:00 a. m. we recommend the closing of all business establishments for the current day and should such signal be given after 10:00 a. m. and prior to 7:00 p. m., we recommend that business cease throughout the following day. We further recommend that the citizenship generally assemble to some central location or to their respective churches for appropriate thanksgiving services at some time during such period.

In Pursuance of the above and to conform thereto and in obedience to the vote of the City Council of the City of Haskell, I, John A. Couch, Mayor of the City of Haskell, do hereby proclaim a general holiday for the period of time and upon such date as above and herein indicated and for the purposes set forth in the foregoing statement

by they suffered air attacks and saw robot bombs which were turned loose at night, visible because of lights from which pilots of German planes guided them. The bombs were directed against the Normandy beachheads.

Very Lucky Watson said none of his crew were hit during all of these actions and that they were "very lucky." He modestly admitted that "I saw quite a bit of the invasion, enough that I don't want to go back to another."

Invest In Your Schools . . .

At a mass meeting held in Haskell High School building a few weeks ago, and to which all citizens were invited, a committee was appointed to present to all interested people certain facts pertaining to Haskell Public Schools. The committee has chosen this means of bringing the matter under consideration to your attention.

In 1936 fire completely destroyed the Haskell High School building. Some insurance was collected and Federal Aid was secured to construct a new building. When it was completed there was an unpaid portion of a few thousand dollars. In 1940 the new building was burned. Insurance, Federal Aid, and a \$15,000 bond issue which was voted at that time were sufficient to construct the same type building. However, many citizens insisted that the School Board make the new structure fireproof. This was done at an additional cost of approximately \$15,000.

Opportunity also arose to secure a large amount of Federal help in erecting the Home-making building, the Activity building and the Vocational Farm Shop building, at a cost to the District of about \$15,000. After advising with numerous citizens in the community the Board decided to erect these buildings.

The Board planned to pay this indebtedness at a rate of approximately \$5,000 per year. By 1942 the debt had been reduced to \$20,000. In 1942-43, because of a change made in Rural Aid laws by the legislature, the Haskell Schools failed to receive from the State Rural Aid funds more than \$5,000 which was anticipated in connection with rural schools contracted to Haskell. The same situation prevailed for the year 1943-44. Because of the unexpected failure to collect these funds the debt has not been reduced during the

past two years.

The public meeting of citizens mentioned above discussed the matter very thoroughly. The rural schools which formerly were contracted now have been annexed to the Haskell Independent School District and taxes on property in those districts have been increased to correspond with those in the original district. The increase in size of the district makes it possible for the Haskell Schools to participate in Rural Aid and to increase teachers' salaries which the Board found necessary to secure enough teachers for the school.

In participating in Rural Aid the district must first apply one half of all local taxes assessed to the current maintenance budget and the State pays the balance. Under these conditions, if the district should attempt to pay the indebtedness by increasing taxable values and collecting additional taxes, one half of the increased assessment would first be applied to the current budget and thus reduce the State's portion by an equal amount. That means that of every two dollars thus assessed only one could be used to reduce the debt while the other would replace one which otherwise could be received from the State. For this reason, the group of citizens decided the logical thing to do is to collect the \$20,000 by subscription.

Each citizen of the district will be solicited by a committee. In order to lessen the work of the committees each person is requested to leave a check at the banks in Haskell. No check will be cashed until at least \$15,000 has been collected. The committee requests all to be as liberal as possible so no special burden will be placed on any one person or small group of people. You are urged to make your contribution as soon as possible.

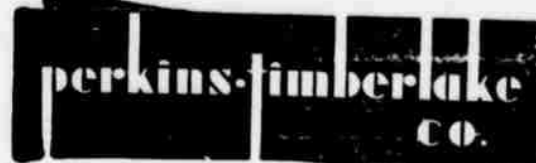

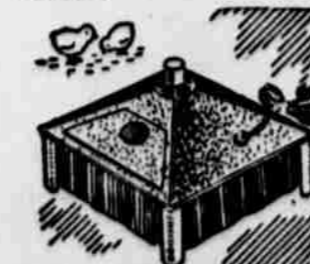
