Our Hospital Board is made up of six men, appointed by the County Commissioner's Court, with the County Judge a vote in case of a tie vote, so five of our county

It has come to a pretty pass when people want to go to the hospital, sick people, who really need hospitalization, but who refuse, saying, "I don't want to go down there in all the fussing." That has happened three times since last Saturday, Aug. 7, according to Doctor's statements. We have people going to Abilene for Diethermy treatment. have people going to Abilene for Diathermy treatments, when we have had a new Diatherm machine over in the Courthouse since February, and none at the Hospital because the old machine was "outlawed."

We always thought Hospitals were for sick people, and that Boards were appointed to do the will of the people. This Hospital is not for sick people as it is operated now, and the Hospital Board is not doing the will of the majority of

If the Board cannot forget their personal likes and dislikes and do what the majority of the taxpayers want, we think it is time to change Boards, and if the Commissioners can't find Board members to do what they are pledged to do, then get some new Commissioners. It's gone as far as it can go this way.

I have nothing personal against any official or Board member, but I do have a good "gripe" about the "mess" that has developed in our Hospital, built and 'supposedly" operated by you and me, the taxpayers.

"Nothing to Sneeze At"


This year our town decided to do something about its hay-fever sufferers. Hap Thomas is our health officer, so he was made ragweed "inspector."

FARM PRICES AND THE COST OF FOOD

The Committee on Agriculture has produced an impressive report showing that the severe decline in farm prices has not benefited the consumer.

As an example, in 1948 the price of wheat reached a peak of \$2.81 a bushel, and the average price of a one-pound loaf of bread was 13.8 cents. Today the farm price of wheat has dropped to about \$1.91 per bushel, yet the average price of this same loaf of bread has increased to 17 cents. Thus, while the price of wheat declined 32%, the price of bread has advanced 23%. The farm value of the wheat in a onepound loaf of bread is 2.7 cents.

A cotton shirt costing \$3.95 contains about 30 cents' worth of cotton. Cutting back the price of cotton would hospital, last week. mean very little in the price of a shirt

A 5-cent peanut candy bar contains about 1/2 cents' worth of peanuts and if the confectioners got their peanuts free this would not change the price of a 5-cent candy bar.

These are only examples. Out of each dollar spent by the American housewife for food produced in this country, 56 cents now goes for processing, marketing, and transportation charges. The farmer receives 44 cents. Of this 44 cents, approximately 30 cents goes to purchase tractors, trucks, plows, gasoline and other supplies required for modern farming. Thus, the farmer and his family have about 14 cents out of each consumer dollar for domestically produced food for their cost and investment.

The farmer's share of the consumer dollar has dropped in recent years and months, as farm prices have declined while retail food prices have remained at 1952 peak levels.

It is not the fault of the retail grocer. He has to meet the high charges of processing, marketing, and transportation, and until a way is found to reduce this cost, the consumer will have little relief.

DOING SOMETHING ABOUT WATER CONSERVATION

Last week on August 3rd, I introduced HR 10151 entitled, "A Bill to authorize purchase of a portion of the bonds issued by the Brazos River Authority, an agency of the State of Texas, to the early development by it of the water resources of the Brazos River Basin, Texas."

In a statement to the Congress I pointed out that it was not expected that the legislation could be considered in this Session. The purpose of presenting it at this time was to allow the various Departments and Agencles of the Government; and others interested, to study the proposition before the Congress convenes again in January.

This Bill is in behalf of the Brazos River Authority, which does not ask the Government for a hand-out. What it does is to offer the Government 50 million dollars' worth of bonds bearing 21/2% interest out of a total of 140 million dollars for the development of five dams below Possum Kingdom on the Brazos River, and for the improvement of the Possum Kingdom Dam

In my statement I pointed out that this was unique in that an agency of the State of Texasthe Brazos River Authority-proposed to pay interest on money borrowed from the Federal Government and were not asking for one nickel as a gift. The agency even proposes to pay the Army Engineers for their surveys.

This is an instance of local people doing something for themselves and is in line with the policy earlier proposed by President Eisenhower.



THE FALSE ... AND THE TRUE

ON CIO-PAC

THE FALSE: Yarborough claims that he is not the captive candidate of the CIO or the extreme left wing Political Action Committee.

THE TRUE: Yet all of their headquarters display Yarborough posters and literature. Their organizers are working for him day and night. They voted solidly for him. What has he promised them?




