The improved section will start from a junction of the proposed new bypass north of Abilene.

Right now is a good time to get after those grasshoppers that will soon be after your gardens and lawns. The recent warm wet weather has been ideal for grasshoppers to hatch out and the best time to kill them is before they leave the hatching grounds.

Fence rows, road sides and any weedy areas where grasshoppers are found should be thoroughly sprayed with toxaphene, chlor- pital. dane, aldrin or dieldrin. Bait mixtures can also be used but are more expensive than the spray method.

These awards are made each year by the Lions Clubs of Texas in cooperation with the Fort Worth Press in its "SAVE THE SOIL AND SAVE TEXAS" conservation award program. Approximately 100 Lions Clubs made such awards throughout the State in 1954. Present records indicate that more awards will be made in 1955 than were made in 1954.



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Hundreds of "wild offers" go into the TIMES-GAZETTE wastebasket every month, in our effort to protect our readers and our community from the ravages of "legal" racka-

Here is one, changed to erase identity of those who would like to spend \$2 to \$10 for an advertising schedule and take out \$600 to \$1200 from some "sucker" who reads the ad and believes what the advertiser would like to have our reader believe:

"If \$100 weekly income interests you and you can devote 10 hours weekly to service route with future possibilities and can immediately invest \$600 to \$1200 for equip-. General Delivery,

giving name, address, age, occupation, present working hours and phone for personal

Maybe we're crazy. Maybe we should accept good money for running such ads, and forget everything else. Maybe the several hundred dollars refused every year due to our policy of not accepting ads which seem to pro-

mise \$10 per hour (but promise nothing) would help meet the huge increased costs of publishing a small-town news-Maybe we should accept ads which require an invest-

ment of \$600 to \$1200 for "equipment", which usually means pinball machines or vending machines for candies or peanuts. To do so would help reduce some of our notes in the banks. But we don't.

We accept any reasonable advertising, whether we agree with the policy of the advertiser, or whether we don't. We reject all advertising suggesting (not offering) huge profits for little or no work . . . along with "inventory" or




