James Mickler Wins NIRA Title in Bareback Bronc Riding—24 2 James Mickler of Haskell became the national champion bareback bronc rider of the National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association when he performed at the recent NIRA championship rodeo held in the Cow Palace in San Francisco.

Mickler, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Mickler, won out over almost 50 cowboys who were participating in the rodeo. Mickler was rated third in the nation in bareback riding before the rodeo was held and finished a strong second at the San Francisco show to become national NIRA champ.

He won a saddle, engraved silver belt buckle, hat, shirt, levis, and levi jacket, and cash awards. A Junior at the university, Mickler has been a member of the H-SU Rodeo Team since entering Hardin-Simmons and has participated in intercollegiate rodeos all over the southwest and west. This year Mickler was elected president of the H-SU Rodeo Association and has been the kingpin in planning the Fourth Annual Hardin-Simmons University Intercollegiate Rodeo to be held in the newly constructed Carl Myers Memorial Arena on April 27, 28 and 29.

Mickler will participate in the rodeo as a bareback rider, bull rider, bulldogger, and ribbon rider.

Use shallow cultivation for the rove garden. The young feeder roots that are near the surface of the ground may be destroyed if deep cultivation is practiced. It is dangerous economy to build steep stairways to save space, especially if they are used frequently. Every stairway should have the protection of a guard rail—low enough for children.

Small Septic Tank and Disposal Field Recommended for Average Farm Home

A septic tank and disposal field is usually recommended as the best waste disposal system for the farm home. The septic tank, says W. S. Allen, extension agricultural engineer—buildings of Texas A. & M. College, is not a mysterious object. It is merely a holding tank for the household wastes where decomposition disposes of these wastes quickly, easily and in a sanitary manner.

He says sanitation authorities agree that a septic tank should be made large enough to hold the maximum amount of sewage discharged into it in any given 24 hour period. The minimum sized tank should hold no less than 500 gallons. Tanks that are too small soon become overloaded with sludge and raw sewage and this will pass into the disposal field and clog up the system.

He says a grease trap is not considered necessary for the ordinary household if the tank has a capacity of 500 gallons or more. The location of the tank, however, is of primary importance. It is cheaper, he says, to build the tank close to the source of the sewage because less water tight line will be needed. It is not, however, a good practice to locate a septic tank too close to a building for this makes cleaning difficult. All septic tanks

will need cleaning during their life of usefulness so locate it where it can be reached easily for the cleaning job. The tank itself, he says, should never be a part of any foundation wall.

The disposal field should consist of two or more tile lines. If a single line is used, there is a greater chance that the field will become water logged and thus cause trouble. He says unless you live in an area where the soil is very porous, it is advisable to provide a porous bed of gravel or crushed stone for the disposal field. Sewage, it should be remembered, is not necessarily ren-

dered harmless in the disposal field; therefore, the field should be located a safe distance away from wells and water supply lines. He says the minimum distance should be 100 feet.

Allen says you can obtain plans for constructing the right kind of a septic tank and disposal field from your local county health unit, the State Health Department or from your local county extension agent. He says they will be glad to advise you on the amount of disposal tile needed for the soil type in your area and also on the construction of the system. He concludes with this word of advice: Get a good plan and then follow it in constructing your septic tank and laying out your disposal field.

Locate the septic tank where it can be reached easily for cleaning—but not too close to a building.

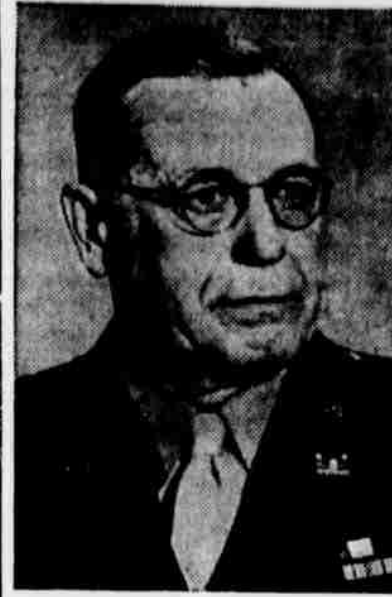

new method of control has been developed that gives better results; is easier to apply and is cheap.

The new method, he says, consists of fumigating the cut ant colony with methyl bromide. The methyl bromide is packaged in one pound cans and comes in a liquid form. A special can-opener type applicator must be used to get the gas into the colony...

In addition to killing all of the ants in the colony, the gas destroys the fungus on which the young ants feed, he says, and ants that hatch later are starved.

Deer says the methyl bromide and special applicator may not be available in every county but that it can be ordered. If you desire more information on this new method for cut ant control, write the extension entomologist at Texas A. & M. College.

County H. D. Agent Gives Tips for Home Washing Corduroy

Corduroy gets soiled just the same as does any other clothing material and it should be washed or cleaned regularly if it is to look and wear well.

She says garments made from corduroy need a gentle washing and points out that lukewarm water and mild soapsuds should be used. The suds should be squeezed through the garments and twisting and rubbing should be avoided.

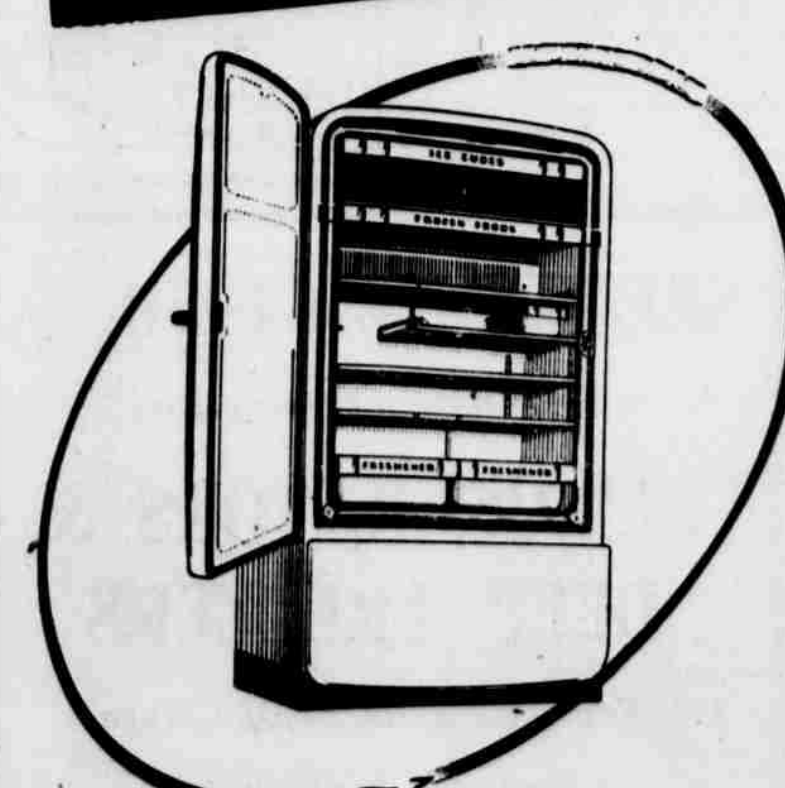
She doesn't recommend wringing but instead says the garment should be lifted from the tub and folded in a bath towel to remove the excess water, then hung on a wooden hanger to dry in shape.

Corduroy garments should be dried rapidly and out-of-doors in a stiff breeze is best.

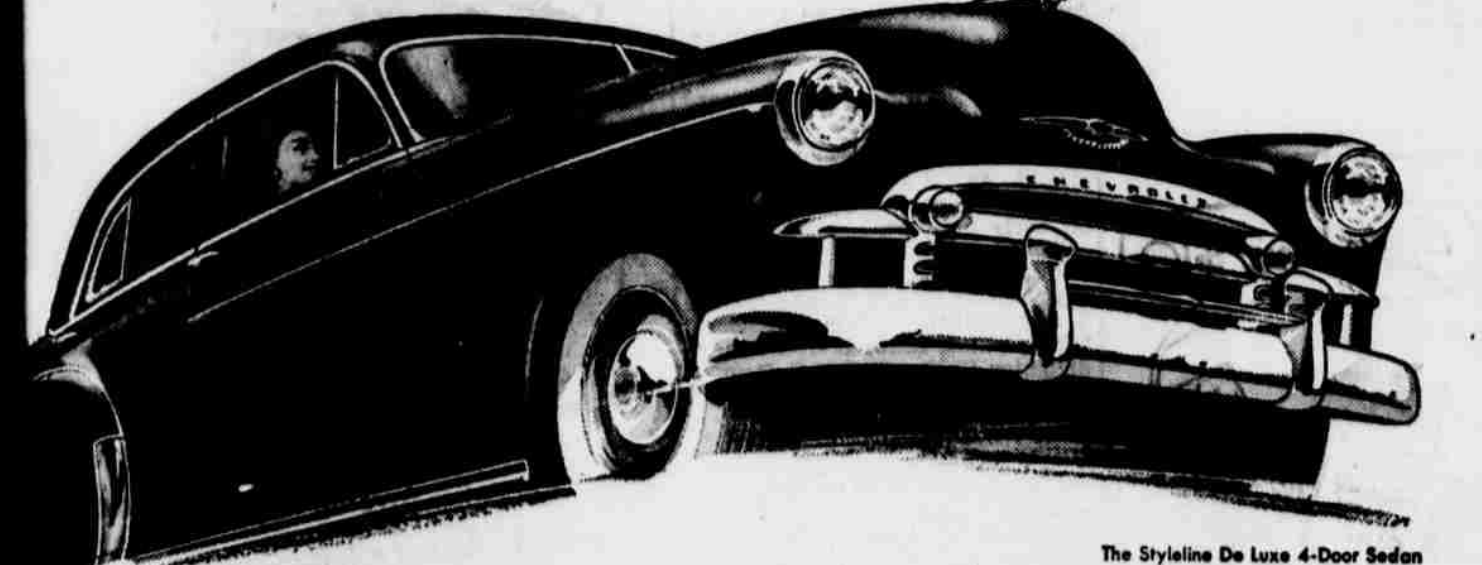
