## Wichita Falls Man Is County's 10th Traffic Victim of Year

County's 1950 traffic deaths climbed to six Friday when Arthur R. Gray, 66, of Wichita Falls, was fatally injured before reaching a two-mile point on Highway 277 about 10 miles south of Haskell.

Gray, who received super-charge on the face and other injuries, was taken to the hospital where he died.

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## Thousands Throng Streets to Greet Santa Claus

## Mexican Charged In Crash Injuring Farm Woman

As the result of an automobile-truck mishap on the Weinert-Rochester highway at 5:40 p. m. Tuesday, a young Munday farm couple were injured, and a charge of aggravated assault with a motor vehicle was filed against a Mexican farm laborer of Youngstown, Texas.

Involved in the crash was a Ford sedan occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth G. Brown of Munday, and a Studebaker truck driven by Eugenio Trevino, about 20. According to Deputy Sheriff Ray Donohoo and State Highway Patrolman Ray Craft, who investigated the mishap, both vehicles were traveling west a few miles from Weinert. The truck swerved in front of the automobile, and side-swiped the lighter vehicle which crashed off the highway.

Passing motorists carried Mr. and Mrs. Brown to the Knox City Hospital, where examination revealed that Mrs. Brown had suffered a fractured leg and possible fracture of the pelvis. Her husband received bruises and cuts. Charge against Trevino was filed in County Court by Patrolman Craft and the Mexican was fined \$50 and costs for a total of \$72.20 after he entered a plea of guilty before Judge O. E. Patterson.

## Haskell Men Attend Meeting of Water Group in Austin

Mayor Courtney Hunt and C. C. manager, Ralph E. Duran were in Austin this week where they attended a two-day session of the Texas Water Code Commission. The meeting was in the mission. The public hearing on the proposed revision of Texas Water Laws which will be presented to the incoming Legislature in January. Some of the proposed revisions would affect water rights of West Texas cities, and the West Texas Chamber of Commerce is waging an active fight to retain the existing priority rights of cities and towns to waters of West Texas streams and rivers for municipal and domestic use.

## 'Use Atom Bomb,' Weinert Soldier In Korea Says

A sobering reminder of what American soldiers are up against in their fight against overwhelming hordes of Chinese Communists in North Korea was contained in a letter received by G. B. Therwanger of Weinert from his son, Sgt. Billy Therwanger who is with the 15th FA Battalion in the U. S. 2nd Division. "I wish some of those people back there could see what has happened here in the past seven days," he wrote. "We were in the rear guard while the rest pulled out. We lost all of our guns," he told. The Weinert soldier has come through safely, he wrote, and had just received a welcome package from home. "If the Chinese want war, we should use the atom bomb without delay," Sgt. Therwanger concludes.

## Group of Thirteen Sent for Induction in Armed Forces

In the first draft call for December, Local Board No. 77 which serves Haskell, Jones and Shackelford counties, sent a group of 13 men to Abilene Wednesday, Dec. 13 for induction into the armed forces. The Board, which has headquarters at Anson, has received another induction call for 14 men to be sent January 4, 1951. A physical examination call for 41 men on January 17, 1951, has also been received by the draft board. In filling the calls, approximately one-third of the men needed are taken from Haskell county and a like number from the other two counties.

Master Sergeant Era H. Brown, about 29, son of Mrs. Virgie A. Brown of Rochester, has been reported missing in action with the U. S. Army forces in Korea. The sergeant's wife, a 3-year-old son, and month-old daughter whom he has never seen—are living in Fort Worth. Sergeant Brown is a veteran of World War II. He saw action in both the Pacific and European theaters during that conflict. He was a lieutenant when he was discharged. He re-enlisted as a master sergeant. He was rearred in Rochester.

Mother of Mrs. Pauline Redding Dies at Cumby  
Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon, Dec. 3, at the Palestine community church near Cumby, Texas, for Mrs. Mattie Ann Gaines, mother of Mrs. Paul Redding of Haskell. Mrs. Gaines, 65, who had been a resident of Cumby, in Hopkins county, her entire lifetime, died Friday night, Dec. 1. Survivors in addition to Mrs. Redding include another daughter, Mrs. Gladys Bowen of Campbell, Texas; seven sons, four sisters; 12 grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

Warrens Return As Managers of Drive In Establishment  
Warren's Drive Inn, popular suburban eating establishment, is again under the management of Mr. and Mrs. Claude Warren, owners, who opened and operated the drive-in for a number of years until leasing the establishment a short time ago. They assumed management of the cafe Tuesday of this week, and will operate the business under the same policy which gained widespread popularity for the establishment.

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Municipal garbage collection will be inaugurated in Haskell early in January, action taken by City Council at their regular meeting Tuesday night indicated. Also a more efficient system of street cleaning will be instituted as soon as new equipment can be secured, city officials announced following the meeting. Aldermen authorized the purchase of a new motor street sweeper, and a modern garbage collection truck at Tuesday's meeting, and the new equipment will be placed in operation as soon as it can be secured. Both street cleaning and garbage collection will be operated as municipal projects, it was explained. A notice to bidders covering purchase of the motor street sweeper is being published this week, with the proposals to be opened Friday, Dec. 29, 1950. The equipment to be purchased contemplates a motor-driven sweeper with not less than 42-inch pickup broom, with the machine to be equipped with pressure pump, water tank and spray system, and pick-up hoppers. Purchase of the street cleaning equipment was made necessary in order to provide efficient machinery for the keeping the city's system of paved streets clean in both the business and residential sections, city officials explained. A proposal for providing municipal garbage collection service has been under study by the City Council for some time, in response to numerous requests for this service, and also for improving sanitary conditions of the city. A new truck, specially equipped for collection of garbage, will be purchased and placed in operation by the City within the next few weeks. Both wet and dry garbage and trash will be picked up by the City equipment on a regular schedule covering the entire city, both business and residence sections. Schedule of fees to be charged for the garbage collection has not been worked out, but will be announced at an early date, city officials said. Charges will be billed on a monthly basis, under the same system followed by the municipally owned water and sewer departments.

Stinebaugh, Baptist minister of Ft. Worth, and the Rev. Bill Lewis, Methodist minister of that city and Rev. W. T. Priddy, pastor of the East Side Baptist Church officiated. Burial was in Willow Cemetery under the direction of Holden Funeral Home. Mrs. Buchanan died at 4 a. m. Sunday in Fort Worth, after an illness of about one month. She was born March 20, 1917, at Cross Plains, Texas. She married Evelyn Buchanan of Deming, N. M., on Dec. 16, 1934, and they made their home there before moving to Fort Worth several years ago. Mrs. Buchanan was a member of the Baptist Church. Immediate survivors include her husband and their two sons, Leeland and Don Buchanan, all of Fort Worth; the parents, Mr. and Mrs. T. A. Pvt. Ernest Wilfong With 25th Division in Korea  
A Haskell soldier, Pvt. Ernest Wilfong, who was recalled to active duty in mid-October, has already reached the combat zone in Korea, a letter received by friends here this week indicated. Pvt. Wilfong received his overseas assignment shortly after being called back into service, and arrived at Yokohama, Japan, on Dec. 1st. He was immediately flown to Korea, where he was assigned to a unit of the 25th Division, which according to recent press dispatches, has been in some of the most severe fighting in the withdrawal of Army forces being forced back by the Chinese Communists. Wilfong is the son of M. C. Wilfong of this city, and before entering the Army was associated with his father in business here.

Atkinson Food Store Observing 25th Anniversary  
The 25th anniversary of the opening of Atkinson's Food Store in Haskell is being observed this week, with the store's annual Holiday Food Sale scheduled to begin Friday, Dec. 15 and continue through Saturday, Dec. 23. 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### Adult Leaders Now Working With Six Of County's Seven 4-H Girls Clubs

Six of the seven girls 4-H clubs, Haskell county now have adult leaders. This is a real accomplishment for the clubs, because the adult leaders help the girls to develop one of the fine organizations for the young women of our nation, here in Haskell county.

This group of leaders form a 4-H leaders committee in the Haskell County Home Demonstration Council. They meet once a month and make plans for the demonstration which they will give the girls the next month. Miss Thelma Wirges, county home demonstration agent, gives this demonstration to the leaders so they will have the information for the girls.

Mrs. Grady Newsom and Mrs. Howard Sloan are leaders for the Rochester club, which is the largest in the county. It has a large group of young girls which will develop good demonstrations by the time they are the older group.

The demonstrations being given to the girls this year are on bread and other cereal products and clothing. Mrs. Rex Murry, leader for the Rule club, uses the homemaking department in the Rule High School for their demonstrations, which surely does give a nice environment for such meetings.

Mrs. R. B. Clark is a new leader for the Sagerton club. They are planning to have some extra demonstrations Whole Grain Muffins and Use of the Master Mix, which were planned for the two months they did not have a leader.

The Paint Creek club has Mrs. H. Russell for their leader. She has been a leader for the past two years. There are seven girls starting cereal demonstrations and two starting clothing. These girls will be able to receive help from their leader.

The Wernert 4-H club has been an active club for a number of years. Delores Dunnam is the cereal demonstrator this year and Carol Robertson is the clothing demonstrator. Mrs. Clyde Walker, their leader, will help these girls develop their demonstrations.

Mrs. T. E. Beason is the leader of the O'Brien club. The 1950 Gold Star Girl came from this club. Mrs. Beason and the girls have started plans for the team demonstration that girls from this club will give the O'Brien home demonstration club in March.

The Mattson club is the only one in the county without a leader. These girls need a leader because they are unable to develop a good club like they could with the help of an adult leader.

All the clubs have two planned meetings each month. At the first meeting Miss Wirges gives their demonstration; and the leaders give the demonstration at the second meeting.

The leaders will meet Thursday, Dec. 14, to make plans for the January meetings and to start a new year. These leaders deserve praise for doing a fine job with a fine group of young people—the Haskell County 4-H Club Girls.

### Polio Is Challenge To Texas, Abilene Woman Declares

Texans, noted for their traditional ability to make their own way, get a new challenge along with their Thanksgiving greetings.

A Texas woman brought home word from an Eastern meeting stating in effect, that hope for finding means of avoiding polio and for curing victims hinges on public support of current research.

The woman, Mrs. R. O. Pearson of Abilene, also relayed the cheering news from a March of Dimes organization meeting in New York City, that better diagnosis and treatment of polio has cut down distortions so that "terrible wrecks of children" rarely are seen today.

Mrs. Pearson, who is State Advisor on Women's Activities for the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, said the most promising development in polio research is the possibility of a preventive vaccine.

"Such vaccine has been used successfully on experimental animals," said Mrs. Pearson, "but it remains to be discovered just how many types of polio virus there are and which persons are not already immune and need to be immunized."

The Texas woman predicted the answer would be found "in the long run," but emphasized the outcome depends in part on the willingness of Texans to face their research financing obligations. Texas, one of the hard hit states from a polio viewpoint, has had to depend greatly on National Foundation funds and equipment because of a poor state financial showing.

The great need for support of patient care and research projects will be explained first hand to Texans December 11 when Basil O'Connor of New York City, president of the National Foundation of Infantile Paralysis, addresses a state conference in Austin. The rally will emphasize the 1951 March of Dimes January 15 to 31.

The annual Dairymen's Short Course will be held at Texas A. & M. College on Dec. 7-8.

"Health examinations won't prevent old age, but many tens of thousands of persons, whose records of these examinations have been studied, have not only been helped to live longer, but also be sturdier and healthier, and enjoy comfort and happiness by following the advice of the physicians who have made such examinations," declared Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

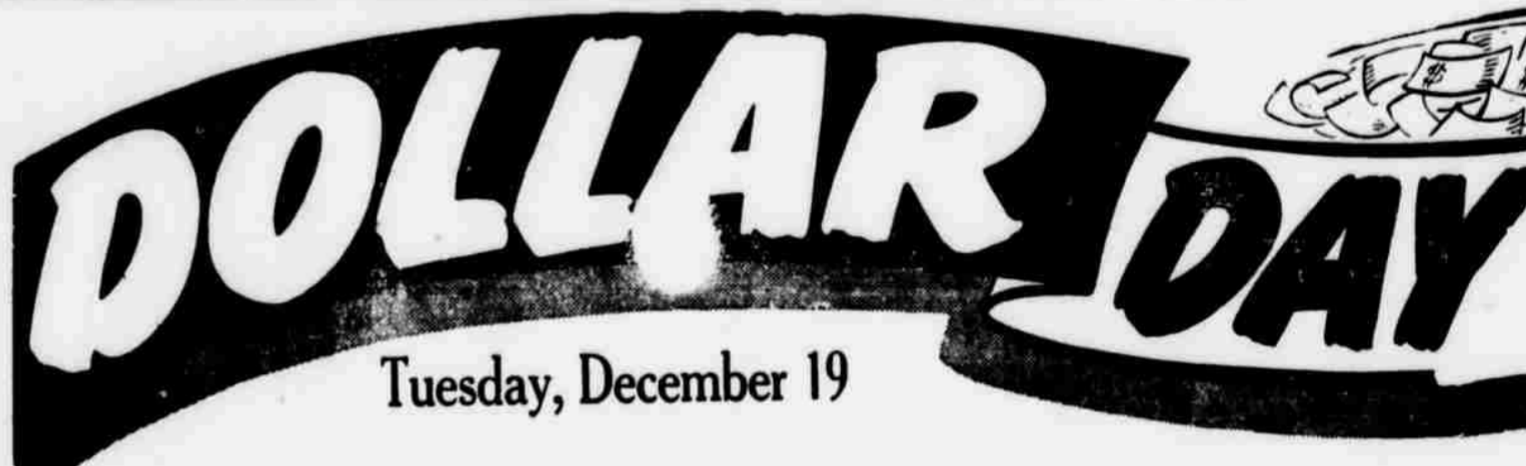

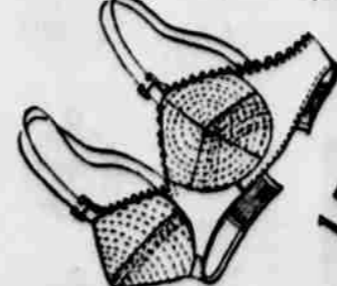

### Livestock Lice More Prevalent During Winter

Texas livestock and dairy producers should be on the alert at this time of the year for damages caused to livestock by infestation of animal lice. Any one of four or more species of lice may be found on Texas cattle during the winter months, says J. A. Deer, assistant extension entomologist of Texas A&M College, and since cattle are often kept in close confinement at this time of the year, louse populations increase rapidly.

Deer points out that lice cause damage in several ways. Lousy cattle do not put on weight as rapidly as those that are free from lice and they present an unthrifty looking coat of hair for the irritations caused by the lice cause them to scratch or rub their bodies against trees, fence posts or other structures. Dairy cattle, heavily infested with lice, fall off in production even when they are fed well, says Deer.

He says that the degree of cattle louse infestation is also closely correlated with the amount of anemia present in cattle. Animals that have anemia do not do well because of a shortage of blood.

Deer recommends two methods of control. Beef cattle, he says, may be dipped or sprayed with a mixture of 5-10 per cent DDT plus three - hundredths per cent gamma BHC. If lindane is available, Deer says a mixture of 8 pounds of 50 per cent wettable DDT and 1 pound of 25 per cent lindane per 100 gallons of water may be used. A spray containing 5-10 per cent toxaphene is also recommended for controlling lice on beef cattle.

Since sprays or dips containing DDT are not recommended for use on dairy cattle, Deer says that a mixture containing eight pounds of 50 per cent heptoxychlor and one pound of 25 per cent lindane in 100 gallons of water may be used. This mixture should be applied as a spray.

Deer says Texas livestock producers are losing millions of dollars annually because they are not controlling the lice that infest their animals. At the present time, only about 30 per cent of the

### Christmas Fires Cause Injury to Many Children

Some American children may spend this Christmas in hospitals, suffering from painful and disfiguring burns.

That is the warning of the National Board of Fire Underwriters which points out that the Christmas season is one of the most dangerous in the year from the standpoint of fires.

Use of flammable decorations, careless smoking by adults near Christmas trees, and selection of toys which can cause injury are among the special hazards in the home at Christmas time, the National Board states.

The organization offered this check list for parents, to reduce the hazard to children during the Christmas holidays:

1. Do not dress children in flimsy, flammable costumes.
2. Do not use lighted candles at Christmas. Use electric lights instead.
3. When choosing new Christmas lights, look for marking which indicates listing by Underwriters' Laboratories, Inc.
4. Do not use cotton or paper decorations on your tree unless they are flame-proofed.
5. Look for the marking which indicates listing by Underwriters' Laboratories, Inc., on electrical toys, and supervise the children when they play with such toys.
6. Do not buy toys using gasoline, kerosene, or other flammable fluids. Be careful in selecting toy chemical sets.
7. Remove all wrappings from the house soon after presents are opened.

Experts Tell How Portable Heaters May Be Used Safely

"A portable heater is a portable fire," the National Board of Fire Underwriters points out in urging extra care with these devices, which have caused many disastrous blazes.

Many heaters are manufactured with safety factors in mind, the organization says. In selecting new heaters, buyers should insist on evidence that the heater is listed by Underwriters' Laboratories, Inc. which means the device has been tested for safety.

Users should follow the manufacturer's directions carefully, and use only those fuels for which the heater was designed.

The heater should be placed on a level floor, to reduce the danger of tipping, and should not be located near curtains, furniture, or other combustibles.

It is dangerous to carry the heater when it is lighted, and it should never be filled when lighted. It should never be refilled indoors.

Fumes from the heater can be deadly, if it is left burning in a tightly closed room. A window should be left open or a door ajar whenever the heater is in use.

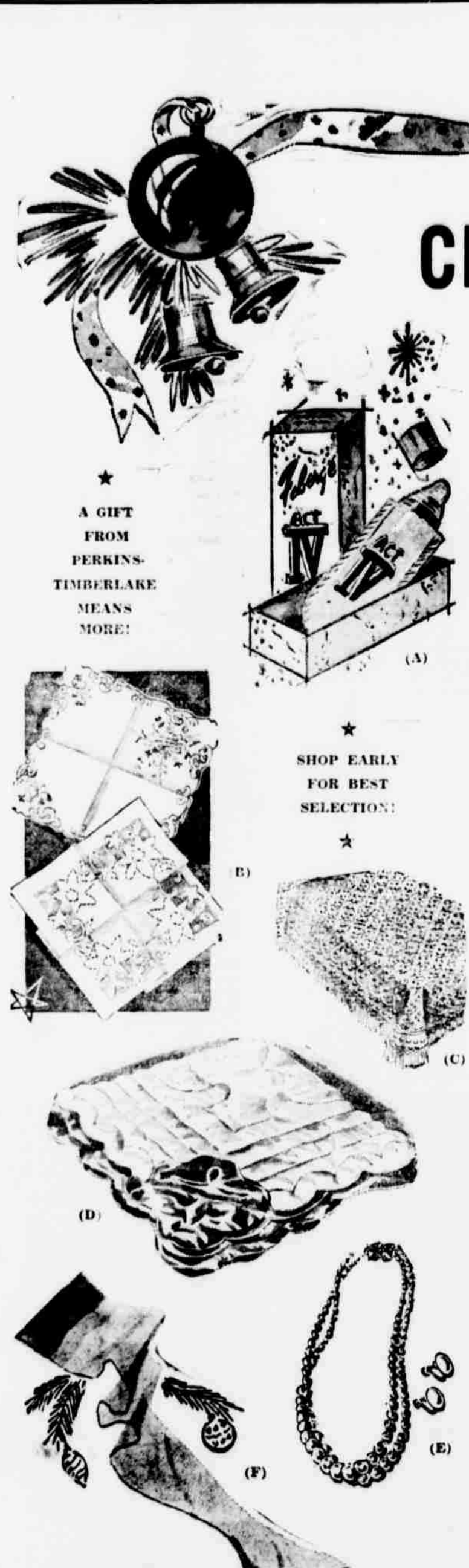

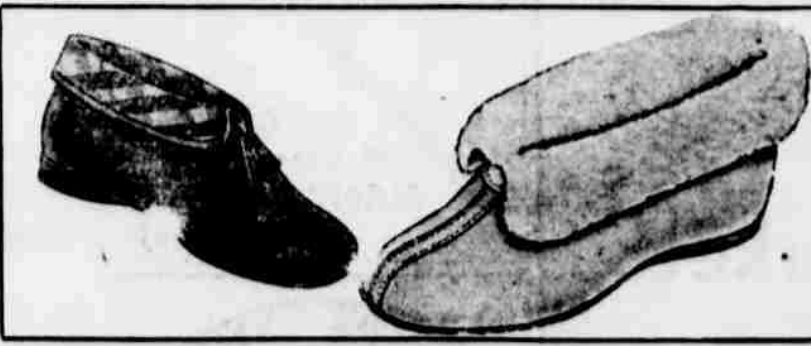

## Cotton Fertilizer Value Shown In Recent Tests

When properly used, fertilizer under cotton doesn't cost; it pays. This fact is shown by the results of 1950 cotton fertilizer demonstrations.

To emphasize the point, M. K. Thornton, agricultural chemist for the Texas A&M College Extension Service, cites as an example demonstrations conducted last year in Guadalupe county under the supervision of county agent, B. N. Rector. Rector reports that Munroe Schubert of Kingsbury made over one and one-half bales of cotton per acre on part of his fertilizer demonstration.

On a plot that was not fertilized, Schubert obtained a yield of 610 pounds of lint cotton per acre. He obtained a yield of 785 pounds from a plot which was fertilized with 200 pounds of 16-20-0 at planting time and side dressed with 100 pounds of the same fertilizer when the cotton was about knee high. Other plots in the demonstration which received different amounts of fertilizer gave yields that ranged between the high above and the low received when no fertilizer was applied.

Figuring that 16-20-0 fertilizer costs not more than \$4 per hundred, the cost of the three sacks of fertilizer applied was \$12. The increase of 175 pounds of lint obtained by fertilizing was worth about \$70, figuring the price of cotton at 40 cents a pound. Therefore, Schubert's increased income over the cost of fertilizer was about \$58.

The lowest increase obtained was 30 pounds of lint from applying 100 pounds of 5-20-0 at planting time. Thornton points out, however, that this gave a return of about \$21 on an investment of \$2.50 for fertilizer.

## Overloaded Trucks Destroying Texas Highways, County Officials are Told

John S. Simmang, Lee County Judge, in his keynote speech before the annual convention of the Texas County Judges and Commissioners, in Austin, late in November, warned that the State and County roads in Texas are being destroyed faster than they can be rebuilt.

D. C. Greer, Texas State Highway Engineer, told the county officials that beginning in 1951, no expansion of the present highway system would be possible. "We must use all available funds to rebuild and preserve what we now have before we can plan new highways," he said.

Judge Simmang, a former president of the County Judges' and Commissioners' Association of Texas, told the group it was mandatory that the Texas systems of roads be protected from wanton destruction by only one per cent of the highway users.

"It should make the blood of every true and honest Texan boil," Judge Simmang said, "when you realize the damage caused by overloaded trucks is costing the tax payers of Texas millions of dollars each year."

In the closing business session of the convention, a strongly worded resolution condemning the practice of overloading trucks on State and county roads was adopted. The convention went on record as opposing any increase in the present weight and size laws of vehicles using the highways. They urged the Legislature to require overloaded vehicles to reduce the excessive weight to the legal limit on the spot where apprehended and that a sufficient number of men be provided to

protect the Texas road system and to safeguard the lives and property of the motoring public.

## Mother of M. E. Helber Dies in Pueblo, Colo.

Mrs. A. E. Helber, long-time resident of Lubbock and the mother of M. E. Helber of Haskell, died Monday, Dec. 11, at the home of a daughter, Mrs. R. C. Reeves in Pueblo, Colo., where she had been visiting. Mrs. Helber, who was in her late 70's, had been in feeble health for some time.

Body of Mrs. Helber was returned to Lubbock, where funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon and burial was in a Lubbock cemetery. Only surviving children are Mrs. Reeves and Mr. Helber.

Two grandchildren also survive, a grand-daughter who lives in California, and a grandson, Reucit Scotty Helber who is stationed at Aberdeen Proving Grounds, Maryland, and who came by plane to Lubbock for the funeral. Another grandson, a Navy pilot, was killed during World War II.

## White Shirts Make Merry White Xmas

While radio crooners are dreaming of a white Christmas, more practical men are more likely thinking in terms of a new white shirt for Christmas.

It's a prove fact, girls. When in doubt as to what to select for the men on your gift list, stick with white cotton dress shirts. You can hardly go wrong there.

Last year government market researchers surveyed a representative group of masculine consumers across the nation. On the subject of dress or business shirts, two-thirds of the men interviewed agreed that they preferred cotton dress shirts, and more than half named only white when asked the colors they liked best.

Though white is by far the favorite in pleasing the masculine taste in shirts, the blues are another good bet. Men consumers interviewed in the survey mentioned solid blue more frequently than any other color except white.

When selecting men's shirts, pay special attention to style and construction details. Especially important is shape and style of collar. Before buying shirts for gifts, find out whether the receiver likes the soft, spread collar button-down styles or the longer points. Many men consider collar style the major factors in selecting cotton dress shirts, so it is wise to find out his individual taste before gift shopping.

Correct fit is another point to watch in shirt shopping. Be sure to get exact size in both collar and sleeve length.

## Social Security Representative To Be Here Dec. 21

Ralph T. Fisher, Manager of Abilene Social security office, will be at the Chamber of Commerce in Haskell at 11:00 a.m. on Thursday, December 21. He will assist with claims of retired workers, dependents and survivors; take applications for social security cards; and distribute informational leaflets explaining phases of the amended Social Security Act.

Mr. Fisher calls attention to the provisions in the new Social Security law under which every regularly employed domestic worker will be covered by the Social Security Act effective Jan. 1, 1951. Every housewife who regularly employs one or more domestic worker should get a copy of booklet No. OASI-21 from her local post office. This booklet tells her just how to report her Social Security taxes on household workers.

## Anti-Serum Provides Protection Against Whooping Cough

"Your child can be protected from whooping cough by the use of anti-serum available for the immunization of youngsters," according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, as he advised parents not to take this communicable disease lightly.

"Since whooping cough is particularly dangerous for babies the need for early protection against it is undisputed. Research has shown that preventive treatment may safely and effectively be given at the age of two months or earlier. Older children who have been previously immunized should receive booster doses of the vaccine."

Pointing out that Texas has had over 10,700 cases of whooping cough so far this year, Dr. Cox reminded parents that whooping cough is sometimes fatal to young children. It may also leave the lungs and other parts permanently damaged.

"In an effort to control whooping cough emphasis is placed on the great importance of calling the family physician at any time when a child is not in normal health. If the first signs of a cold do not disappear after a few days of good home care, including rest in bed and isolation from other children, the physician will prescribe proper treatment and report any cases of communicable disease to the public health officer."

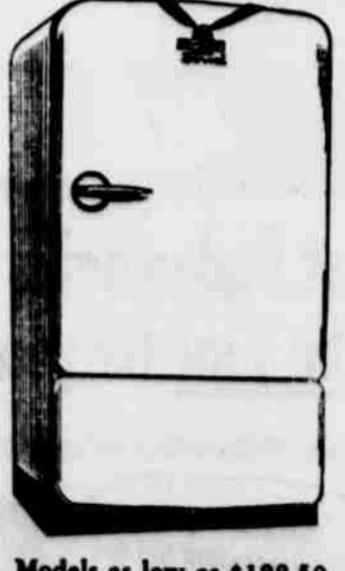

### Tests Show New Slow-Death Rat Poison Highly Effective in Control of Rodents

Warfarin, a new rat killer released by the University of Wisconsin Research Foundation, appears to be one of the most effective poisons available for the control of rats and mice.

The active ingredient of the poison is coumatrin, a compound found in sweetclover which affects the clotting of blood, says J. E. Poore, assistant district leader for the Rodent Control Service. Rats that have eaten warfarin baits for several days become less active, develop internal hemorrhages and slowly bleed to death.

Poore says that one advantage of warfarin over many of the other rat poisons is that it is odorless and tasteless. Rats will continue to eat the bait until they die without detecting the presence of the poison. Another advantage lies in the safety with which it can be used on the farm. Warfarin is poisonous to all warm-blooded animals, but the amount recommended for controlling rats and mice is so small that there is little danger of farm animals or people being poisoned accidentally.

Even though warfarin is considered an extremely safe rodent poison, Poore warns that the usual precautions should be taken to prevent poisoning of these farm pets.

For the poison to be effective it is necessary for rats to eat warfarin baits over a period of five or more successive days. Grain or cereal type baits, which are not readily eaten by cats and dogs may be mixed with the poison, thus reducing the possible danger of poisoning these farm pets.

Warfarin is now on the market under the trade names of various chemical companies. Poore cautions that the warfarin baits should be mixed according to the manufacturer's instructions.

According to Poore, mixed bait can be secured in 100 pound lots from the Rodent Control Service at San Antonio. Rodent control service fieldmen and county agricultural agents and representatives of other public service organizations can order the new poison.

### Domestic Workers To Be Covered By Social Security

Do you have a maid whose wages will be covered by social security beginning January 1951? A booklet now available at all post offices and at offices of the Social Security Administration and Internal Revenue Bureau gives you the answer.

The work of those regularly employed for wages in private homes will be credited to social security, and the employer will be responsible for reporting the wages and the social security tax to the Collector of Internal Revenue. Not only maids, but such other workers as cooks, laundresses, practical nurses, and gardeners, will come under this new law. The free booklet, "Do You Have a Maid?", explains a simple test for determining whether a domestic worker will get protection of social security and whether the housewife should start making reports next year. If so, there is a postage-paid postal card in the booklet which the housewife should mail in for instructions.

Ralph Fisher, Manager of the Social Security office in Abilene has announced that a copy of the booklet will be mailed immediately upon receipt of a request for it in his office.

### Pruning Orchards Should Be Done In December

Next year's fruit crop may depend on the care you give your orchard during the next few weeks. High on the list of jobs that should be done now, says John E. Hutchinson, associate extension horticulturist of Texas A&M College, is pruning. This job should be completed during this month, he says, because bad weather may make outside work impossible later this winter.

Each tree in the orchard should be checked for San Jose scale, he says. This ashy-gray scale, if it is present, can be found on the trunk and limbs of the tree. Limbs that are severely infested and burned. A three per cent oil emulsion spray, says Hutchinson, will control the insect provided the tree is completely covered with the solution.

All "dried-up" peaches whether on the tree or on the ground should be gathered up and destroyed. This mummified fruit contains the spores of brown rot and if they are destroyed, will become a source of infestation for brown rot disease next spring. This sanitation practice will not eliminate the need for spraying, says Hutchinson, but will lessen the degree of brown rot infestation.

In most sections of the state, dry weather has prevented the planting of a cover crop in the orchard, but Hutchinson strongly urges that orchard owners plant such a crop in sections where there is still time if rains come soon. He suggests that you get from your local county extension agent a copy of B-3, Orchard Management, and check it for other practices that should be carried out in the orchard at this time.

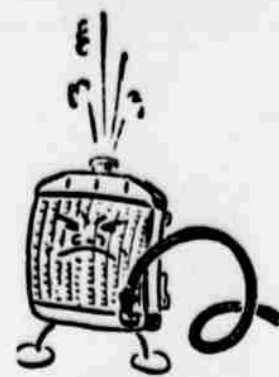
