

The initial car was shipped Wednesday of last week.

All of the wheat shipped from Haskell has been billed to Fort for h grain concerns, Mr. Sadler eported. Shippers were Clifton Grain Company, 6 cars; Kimbell Elector Co., 2 cars; Market Poul-try & Egg Co., 1 car to date.

Five cars were being loaded out for shipment today, Mr. Sadler reported, and he expects the peak of the harvest to be reached by the middle of next week if favorable weather prevails.

In his pre-harvest estimate, Mr. Sadler figured that about 60 cars would be shipped from this point, but the yield is turning out above expectations of grain farmers and buyers, he said. Rail shipments of grain from Haskell may run between 80 and 90 car-loads this season, he believes.

Harvesting of grain was resumed in some scattered parts of the county Tuesday afternoon, and by Wednesday combines were humming in fields in all areas around Haskell, grain buyers reported. Fields are maturing rapidly, and quality of the grain is considerably above pre-harvest forecasts.

Sprouts should be removed before they have made a firm union with the wood of the tree. For older, bearing trees, which have sufficient leaves to keep them healthy the sucket growth or water sprouts which growth or water sprouts which appear on the lower third of the main scaffold limbs may be thinned cut and the remaining m of the festival.

They say a time saving method for removing the sprouts is to use a short length of garden hose attached to a stick or wooden handle. Just knock the sprouts off. Every effort should be made to force foliation. To do this they recommend an application of some nitrogenous fertilizer such as ammonium nitrate. For old trees, this rate may be increased to three in 1929-30.

On trees that have sufficient foliage to mature the fruit already set, the regular spray program should be carried out. Dead limbs and twigs should be pruned back to live tissues. This will eliminate the possibility of shot-hole borers getting into the trees, They point out that close obser-vations should be made for a possible build-up of scale, borers and other conditions that might further weaken the trees.

Vaccination Advised Against Whooping Cough

Take whooping cough, for example. Isn't it ridiculous for children to have to suffer with it when it may be prevented by simple vaccination?

whooping cough goes by the scientific name of pertussis. Regardless of what you call it, it still means violent, painful wracking coughing that takes the breath and tears at the chest and throat walks.

Pertussis is prevalent among children everywhere. About 15 out of every 100 cases are in children under two. North Americal ca, from time to time, seems to have more than its fair share of

cases.
Sometimes it's fatal especially to very small children. About 85 out of every 100 whooping cough deaths are among two-year olds and less. And, strangely enough, most deaths are among girls. In 1949 Texas had 46 whooping cough deaths. So far in 1950 and average of 323 cases have been reported every week.

Thooping cough is spread through droplet infection—that is, by breathing air contaminated by a sneeze or cough of an infect-ed person. You can get it from using the personal things of an infected person, too. It is com-municable from about 7 days after exposure until three weeks

Protection of Farm Buildings Against Lightning Advised

Early summer weather in Tex-as is often characterized by vio-lent electrical storms. These storms emphasize the necessity for lightning protection, says W. S. Allen, extension agricultural engineer-buildings of Texas A. & M. College.

He says that farm property losses from lightning average about \$10 million per year to say nothing of the estimated 400 lives lost and the 800 to 1000 rural people who are injured each year by fightning. Something can be done to prevent these losses.

Allen points out that lightning rods, when properly installed and maintained, will give practically complete protection to buildings against damage from lightning. He reccomends that the installation of rods be done in accordance with the National Code for Protection against Lightning.

He says it is very important that all metal bodies inside build-ings be grounded and bonded together to prevent electricity from jumping from one body to another. The metal tracks for feed carriers, feed or hay elevators and the heavy hardware on barn doors should always be grounded and tied into the lightning rod protection system on the barn.

A metal roof, electrically bond-ed, properly grounded, and pro-vided with air terminals to protect chimneys or other non-me-tallic projections, usually gives satisfactory protection. He says the metal roof will give little or no protection unless it is ground-ed and bonded and here again he says do the job according to



Cotton ranks third among the ommodities shipped under the Marshall Plan, accounting for approximately 11 per cent of the total dollars approved by ECA. In dollar value, ECA cotton is valued aat 964 million dollars. Four countries - France, Germany, Italy, and the United Kingdom-have received 90 per cent of the ECA-financed cotton, Approximately 5.7 million bales of cotton have been purchased through ECA.

The specialists suggest that potatoes be cooked in their jackets, whether they are to be recovered.

whether they are to be creamed, mashed or hash browned, in order to retain the vitamins and miner-als. If peeled, peel very thinly and go easy on the water in the pot. The more water used, the more nutriments lost. And don't soak potatoes before cooking.

"Look in your favorite cock-book and you are sure to find interesting and unusual ways of preparing both sweet, and Irich potatoes," the specialists point out "Remember that milk and potetcombination are ideal for every and body building and health protection, and include these dishes in your menus too. 


