## Budget of \$31,923 - Adopted By First **Baptist Church**

First Baptist Church of this city has adopted a \$31,923 budget for 1952, covering anticipated church expenses for the 12-month

Among the largest items listed are building and repair and equipment, \$1,500 literature, \$1,500; Sunday School and Training Union, \$1,560; utilities, \$700, church office supplies \$600; convention expenses \$400; brotherhood \$200. A new church feature recently added is the Weekly bulletin, with \$416 being set out for this purpose in the budget. Sums alloted for various other church activities make up the remainder of the total.

#### Rat Eradication Program Vital To Public Health

Because of the economic losses they cause to industry and commerce and the annoyance they create in homes, rats have been considered a serious menance to mankind since long before their roles as vectors of disease was understood. Today at least six di-seases which are transmitted to man from the rat are known to medical science, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. These diseases include the dread plague, typhus trichinosis, a form of jaundice, tapeworm, and food poisoning. The whole history of the rcle rats play in the trans-mission of disease remains as yet



One is that all Texans over 16 years of age, planning to hunt waterfowl, must have the \$2 Fedderal duck stamp regardless of whether they hunt in their home


