George G. Flournoy, Veteran Stamford Officer, Dies

George G. Flournoy, 75, veteran Stamford police officer, died at 11 a. m. Saturday in the Stamford Sanitarium.

Flournoy, for 52 years connected with Jones County law enforcement work, had been a patient in the hospital since Wednesday night, when he suffered a heart attack. He had suffered with a heart ailment since 1941.

Funeral for the widely-known officer was held Sunday at 3 p. m. in the First Baptist Church at Stamford, and burial was in Highland Cemetery in that city.

Mr. Flournoy was born Dec. 16, 1875, in Columbus, Colorado county, Texas. While a boy his family moved to Clay county, Ala. where his father, the late J. A. Flournoy once served as sheriff.

He moved back to Texas, and while still a boy worked on a ranch at Columbus, Texas. He then moved to Coryell County, thence to Haskell.

In 1898 he became a Jones County deputy sheriff, serving under former Sheriff W. S. Swan, and was sent to Stamford.

In 1900 he became Stamford's city marshal, which title was later changed to chief of police. With the exception of a few months, which he spent as a law enforcement officer at Ranger during the oil boom, he had for 50 continuous years headed Stamford's police department. He resigned a month ago as chief on account of his health. However, he was named inspector of police at the same salary he received as chief.

He married Lillie Asburn on Dec. 26, 1904 in Stamford.

Flournoy's work as a police official was known over the state. He was a charter member of the Texas Police Association, had been made a life member of that organization, and the oldest police officer living in the Texas Association.

Survivors besides his wife include a daughter, Mrs. Sarah Duncan of Washington, D. C., a son, George Flournoy, Jr., now living in Lake Charles, La. and three grandchildren.
