The most desirable time for planting vetch is September 15 to October 15. This gets the seed in the ground in time to take advantage of September and Octo-ber rains and to give vetch a good start before cold weather sets in.

Vetch has been grown successfully on both sandy and tight soils. Sandy land plantings have usually been most successful when seeded at the rate of 10 pounds of vetch to 20 pounds of rye. Either sowing or planting with a drill has been found to be more successful than in rows. On tight land planting vetch by itself in rows at the rate of 10-15 lbs. per acre has given the best results. Be sure to innoculate vetch seed with a suitable innoculant to give the best results.

Vetch is fibrous rooted legume that is widely used for soil improvement, protection, grazing, hay and seed production. Year before last in California Creek Soil Conservation District, vetch turned under green two months before cotton planting time and increased cotton yieds by 1-3.

If you are unable to secure vetch at your local feed store contact your local county agent, PMA repres atative, vocational agriculture teacher or soil conservation technician and secure the addresses of suitable seed sources.





### **Recent Changes In OPS** Regulations Are Explained

A Fort Worth OPS representative who conducted a price clinic here August 9 for local merchants has announced two recent developments in the price stabilization program.

Price Specialist Herman Golden said the OPS had cancelled the livestock quota provisions of the meat control program, but that licenses were still required for slaughtering. "The new Defense Production

Act leaves untouched provisions requiring slaughterers to register to engage in business, to stamp animal carcasses with their registration number, and to keep records of their operations," said Golden.

Golden also stated that the OPS had issued a ceiling price regula-tion setting dollar and cent ceiling prices for scrap tires, tire parts, and scrap tubes. The new regulation now in effect CPR 59, applies to wholesale scrap rubber dealers, to consumers, and to export and import sales, he said. The OPS representative said
