Fire Losses Rise During Winter Months

Winter is fire's favorite season, the National Board of Fire Underwriters warns.

Fire losses usually rise when the temperature falls, the organization points out, in urging home owners to take special care with their heating systems in preparation for the cold months ahead.

Where possible, thorough inspection and cleaning of the entire heating system is advisable during the early fall, before it is placed in full daily operation. Frequently defects which developed during the Spring and Summer can be remedied easily, but if neglected might lead to a serious blaze.

"Forcing" a furnace or heater which is giving insufficient heat is a dangerous habit, the engineers of the National Board observe. Often a check-up by a competent repairman will reveal that some repair is needed to make the device give better service and attempts to "force" it may cause a fire.

The engineers also offered these four safety tips: 1. Keep a metal screen in front of your fireplace. 2. Never use gasoline or kerosene to "quicken" a fire.

3. Remove newspapers, magazines, and other combustible rubbish from your home. Often these are responsible for a blaze. 4. Use a metal container with a cover for hot ashes - never a wooden or cardboard container.

Governor Urges All Texans To Join In Observance of "Fires of Freedom"

Governor Allan Shivers today urged all Texans to join with the 777 American Legion Posts in Texas to dramatize Democracy's strength in the lighting of hundreds of "Fires of Freedom" on December 7, proclaimed by him as "Operation Democracy" Day.

State Legion Commander Bill Elkins of Killeen had previously announced that Governor Shivers will set off the first fire at seven o'clock on the night of December 7, on the State Capitol grounds as the signal for a chain of more than 600 other freedom fires to spring up across the state.

In the Governor's Official Memorandum setting December 7 aside as "Operation Democracy" Day, he described the freedom fires as "symbols of hope to penetrate the darkness behind the iron curtain." He praised the Legion-sponsored campaign for an alert and aggressive citizenry "to make Democracy truly live."

"Every citizen recognizes and values America's priceless treasures of freedom," Governor Shivers wrote. "But to make Democracy live, each citizen must actively participate in local, state and national affairs to protect those treasures accumulated through the years, and in ever adding to Democracy's strength to resist those who seek to rob us of our rich heritage."

Record Year Reported By Texas Cancer Group at Annual Meeting

Cancer Control in Texas received its greatest boost during 1950, reports of county units of the American Cancer Society in Texas showed this week, as Cancer Society delegates met in San Antonio for their fifth annual state meeting.

If the amount of literature, exhibits, club programs and the like is any indication, more than one million Texans received the American Cancer Society's message of cancer control during the past year. Mrs. Joseph M. Perkins of Eastland, State Commander of the American Cancer Society, Texas Division, reported that 1,252 club programs and movie showings on cancer were held by county volunteer workers. A total of 431,089 pieces of educational literature were distributed through club meetings, county fair exhibits, and a mailing arrangement whereby anyone can

just address a request to "Cancer, Care of Postmaster." This was in addition to more than one million pamphlets circulated during the annual Texas Cancer Crusade in April.

In discussing achievements at the formal business session Wednesday, Frank C. Smith of Houston, President of the Texas Division, reminded that when the Texas Division was established in 1946 there were only five clinics in Texas prepared to properly diagnose cancer. Today there are 28.

"Today there are 12 full-time information centers in the state, established and maintained by county units of the American Cancer Society," he added.

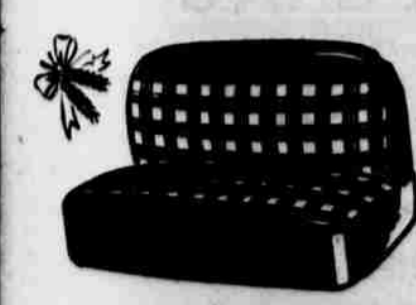
