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

> If a heavy infestation of greenbugs should occur, parathion and metacide are the best insecticides available, says Dr. Hanna, These poisons proved to be the most reliable ones in 10 experiments conducted during 1950 in the High Plains area.



either is very attractive. The screened porch on the back has an outside dcor and gives easy access to the living room; yet it is away from the entrance drive and barns Hence the greatest possible amount of

He points out that about two thirds of all hunting accidents result from three causes: humans in line of fire, mistaking humans for game and hunting with the safety catch off on the gun or rifle.

According to Callender, good sportsmanship is just using good manners while on the hunt. It includes using the right gun for the right game; hunting only in season and not taking more game than can be used even though the bag limit may permit the hunter to take more. Wise hunters, he adds, will use a trained dog to retrieve crippled birds. The careful and wise hunter never throws down a lighted eigaret nor leaves a camp fire burning for either may star; a destructive grass or forest fire. He breaks matches after they are struck and before they are dropped to the ground and leaves the area where he has hunted in good condition. In other words, Callender says he is a good housekeeper in the woods.

Here is Callender's code of safety for the hunter. Treat every gun as if it were loaded; it is usually the empty gun— they thought was empty—that takes the most lives. Loaded guns should never be carried in an automobile. The gun barrel and action should always be checked to make sure there is no ob-struction in either. The gun should be carried so that the hunter always has control of the direction of the muzzle, even if he should stumble. The good hunter never pulls the trigger until he is sure of his target and never points a gun at anything he doesn't intend to shoot.

The specialist says loaded guns should never be left unattended and that the hunter should unload his gun befre climbing a tree or over a fence. Builets fired at flat, hard surfaces, or at may ricochet and hit objects not thought to be in line of fire. Last but mighty important, he says gunpowder and alcohol should never be mixed for the results can be disastrous.

The intelligent hunter will be thinking how he can aid in con-serving the wildlife of the land so that he and others will have areas where they can continue to enjoy one of America's greatest sports in the future. Wasteful and careless hunting habits on the other hand, says Callender, can destroy the protection, vegetation and even the wildlife itself.
