### Social Security Benefits In County \$31,000 This Year

Haskeil county residents will receive more than \$31,000 in reicement and death payments under the Old Age and Survivor insurance system during 1951. This estimate was made today by Ralph I. Fisher, manager of the Abi-Aministration.

During the month of February the monthly checks for 93 persons is the county totaled \$2,509. At that rate the total for the year would be \$30,108. Additional persons are becoming eligible each month, however, so the actual 1951 payments will be considerably above this figure.

For the 16 county area served by the Abilene office payments in February went to 3,5-7 persons and totaled \$104,312. Total for the year figured at this 11 te would be just one and one-quarter mitlion dollars. Fisher estimates, however, that the annual total for the Abilene area will be one an . one-half million dollars when the regular increases and the lum sum payments are considered.

### Senate Passes Bill To Increase Old Age Pensions

WASHINGTON. — The Senate has passed a bill which, if the States take full advantage of it, will increase old age pensions \$3 a month beginning October 1. The bill is in the form of an amendment to the Social Security

Act sponsored by Senator Ernest W. McFarland of Arizona, Senators Tom Connally and Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas, and 20 other Senators. It must still be approved by the House. The \$3 monthly increase would

These small increases are over due and more than justified by the rising cost of living," Senator Connally declared. "When the bill was before the Finance Committee, I urged and voted for increases of \$5 a month for the aged and blind and of \$3 a month for dependent children. Average old age assistance payments in Texas in May were only \$32.74, which is obviously not enough to live

The bill as passed by the Senate included a provision requiring the States to maintain their present payments so that the full amount of the increased federal contributions would be passed along to

the recipients. In the case of Texas, this should mean a \$3 a month increase for 90 per cent of the 222,155 cld persons receiving pensions; if the fare makes appropriate adjust-ments in its standards of judging needs. Ten per cent of the pensioners are already receiving the State's maximum of \$50 a month and would get the increase only by \$1 a month. This would bring six years. the average payment up from a little less than \$12 a month to about \$16 a month. Under the present law, the State puts up \$3 and the federal government \$9. Under the Senate bill if the State puts up \$4 the federal government would put up \$12.

### **OPS Plans Survey** To Establish New Food Price Base

FORT WORTH, July 23.—In another week the office of Price Stabilization will begin a nationwide survey of food prices to lay the base for a program of posted dollar - and - cents "community prices" in grocery stores, it is an-nounced by the Fort Worth OPS

The first step will be to survey prices of standard grocery items in 1,000 wholesale establishments Phis will be followed by similar daits to over 2,000 retail grocery cores in the 84 district OPS oftices Information from inditional sellers will be held in strictest confidence, said Ellis H. Boyd, di-

rector of the district office.

A chief purpose of the survey will be to find out if there is enough stability in prices of a number of grocer, items to make a community pricing program practicable. Community pricing is system familiar in World War II under which the country is diaded into relatively small market areas and grocery price ceil-ings set for each area on the basis of local traosportation and other costs. These ceilings would be the same for all stores of each size class, and would be printed on charts for posting in retail stores where all customers can see them,

the district director said, OPS is fully aware of the imopen is fully aware of the important part that a community pricing program can play in the stabilization program of the neressity of having published ceilings for customers and of the great help such a program can be to individual grocers in simplifying their pricing problems," he sad.

He explained that the community pricing program during the

He explained that the community pricing program during the last war had a lot to do with holding the line on wholesale and retail food prices from the time it was started in May 1943 to the end of that control program. "Up to now," Boyd pointed out, "OPS is prohibited by law from controlling below-parity farm prices and has not sufficient assurance that prices have been stable enough to make the printing and posting of ceiling charts practicable."

"Although the fund campaign of the Red Cross' for this year is over, funds required for relief operations in this catastrophe will exceed the available Red Cross resources for disaster relief," J. H. Banks, Haskell County Red Cross chapter chairman said.

It is impossible for the Red Cross to plan its 1951 financial rampaign in advance to care for a disaster of this magnitude, the chairman continued.

When hard times came here the Red Cross did not hesitate. Last year \$3,601.11 was granted by the National Headquarters for disaster relief in Rochester, O'-Brien, and Weinert. The chapter budget for the year was \$2,888 But that effort did not relieve the Red Cross of its responsibility to other disaster victims. And neither are we relieved of ours," Banks said.

It is not yet known how great will be the operation of the Red Cross in the flood states. There are at the present time 68 Red Cross chapters in 64 counties in the four affected states meeting emergency needs for food, clothing, shelter, and medical attention. Eighty-two shelters in which 21,920 persons are being sheltered are now in operation. A total of 43,286 persons are being fed daily and 75,000 meals have been served since the emergency be-


