
## **Estimate of Texas** Cotton Crop Is Lowered Again.

The government estimate of the Texas cotton crop for this year went down again last week to 4,300,000 bales—500,000 bales less than the estimate of a month ago. The major portion of the de-crease in Texas occurred in the nor hen and northwestern areas of the state, the agriculture department said in its monthly forecast issued Nov. 8th.

The department estimated the crop for the nation at 15,771,000 bales—1,160,000 bales less than

the October forecast.

The Texas cotton crop of 1950 was approximately 2,900,000 bales. Estimate of this year's yield of approximately 16 million bales in the nation compares with last year's very small crop of 10,012,average (1940-1950) of 12,030,000.

# Home Freezer Is Homemaker

Homemakers the country over are face to face with the problem of preparing Thanksgiving dinner and at the same time being able to visit with family and friends during the day. Thelma Wirges County Home Demonstra-Wirges, County Home Demonstration Agent, says advanced planning and preparation plus the use of the home freezer can just about take the homemaker out of the kitchen.

For Thanksgiving dinner Miss meal: roast turkey with stuffing; giblet gravy and cranberry sauce mashed potatoes; creame l onions with toasted peanu's; string beans, celery, peach pickles, hot rolls, butter, pumpkin pie, whipped cream and coffee.

Freshmen are inviting the au-stuffed four or five days ahead the home freezer. The pumpkin pies and yeast rolls can be baked and stored in the freezer. The fresh vegetables can be washed and held in the refrigerator. The cranberry sauce can be prepared and stored ahead of time. This

advanced preparation will lessen the hustle and bustle of prepar-ing the meal, says Miss Wirges. Other members of the family can help prepare and arrange the table decorations. They may also assist by helping do the grocery shopping. For after all points out Miss Wirges the Thanksgiving dinner should be a family affair.

The turkey may be roasted with or without a stuffing. The skin should be greased to hold the moisture in and the grease can be applied with a folded cloth that has been dipped in melted fat. Miss Wirges says the bird should be placed breast down on a rack and in a shallow open pan for roasting. The turkey should be covered with the cloth that was moistened with fat. No basting is necessary while the

turkey is being roasted. An eight or ten pound turkey should be cooked for about three and one half hours in an oven at not more than 325 degrees. Larger birds require longer cooking time, and 30 minutes per lb. is the generally recommended cooking time for the larger birds. If low heat is used, there is less shrinkage and the drippings are not burned, says Miss Wirges. The drippings are needed for making the giblet gravy.

### Handle Firearms With Caution, **Hunters Warned**

As the hunting season gets underway Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, urges caution in handling firearms. More than 160 Texans were killed in 1950 as a result of carelessness in handling guns. At a time like this it is more than ever important that we should conserve human life whenever possible.

"It is not enough to deplore the waste of human lives caused by waste of human lives caused by careless handling of firearms," asserts Dr. Cox, "we should learn from the deaths of these victims the lessons of safety which will prevent the needless and shocking waste. With the price of meat at the present high level there is a possibility of more hunters going into the field than ever before."

The State Department of Health gives the following safety sug-gestions in handling guns: While hunting to be sure that the loaded gun is on safety until

ready to fire. Nevr shoot without seeing your target clearly. Never crawl through a fence

stay close to him. If hunting with a companion stay clos to him. Do not strike the ground or a wounded animal with the butt of

a loaded gun. Never scuffle while holding a loaded gun or point it at a per-son "for fun."

Always unload a gun before at-tempting to clean it.

Always unload guns before

taking them into camp or houses. All guns should be carefully put away in the home out of reach of small children.



To help stem the tide of Texas' rapidly depleting highway and road funds, more than 21,000 truck operators paid over one million dollars into the state road

coffers last year.

The payments were not voluntary contributions, but represented \$1,071,387 paid in fines and additional truck license and registrational truck lic tration fees as a result of the arrest of 21,577 truck drivers caught
violating the highway laws.

These startling figures came to
light in the annual report released last week by Kent Odom, Chief

of the License and Weight Divis-ion of the Department of Public

Safety.
The report covers the fiscal year ending August 31st this year. This arm of the Public Sayear. This arm of the Public Safety Department was composed of
only 33 men, who are charged
with protecting the more than
39,000 miles in the state highway
system from being pounded to
pieces by overloaded trucks.

Truck violations on Texas highways are on the increase. The
report shows 3,747 more truckers
were found suilly and naid fines

were found guilty and paid fines than in the previous year.

The fines and fees collected from these highway haulers, the list of which reads like "Who's Who" of the trucking industry in Texas, is paid into the County Road and Bridge and State High-

way funds.



of Pardons and Paroles to Governor for the granting clemency. After clemency has been granted, a parolee is under the supervision of Parole Board members until


