At the regular meeting of the City Council plans for considerable improvements for the park grounds were approved, and Commissioner Walling said that work on the project had started this week.







#### **Results** of Cotton Variety Tests Announced

Announced Hi-Bred and Deltapine (TPSA) produced the highest average yields in the cotton variety tests conducted at the Big Spring Ex-periment Station for the last three years, announced F. E. Keating, Big Spring station superintendent. "Average per acre yields of 214 and 211 pounds of lint were ob-tained from Hi-Bred and Delta-pine (TPSA)," said Keating. Other high yielding varieties were Stormproof 1; Paymaster 54; Stoneville (TPSA); CA 89A Stormproof; Texacals, Rogers; and Northern Star. These varie-ties varied in average acre yields from 206 and 191 pounds, in the order named, Keating reported. In the 195 Otest Stoneville (TP SA) produced the highest yield, with 354 pounds of lint per acre. Deltapine (TPSA), Stormproof 1, Paymaster 54 and Hi-Bred were the four next highest yielding va-rieties for the single year. All produced more than 300 pounds of lint cotton per acre. Keating reported these results in Texas Agricultural Experiment Station Progress Report 1372. This report, which is available from the Publications Office, College Station, Texas, also gives the per-centage of lint, staple length and number of bolls per pound for each of the varieties tested. To understand it better, the National Safety Council offers these facts:

Lightning is chiefly a rural problem as far as individual protection is concerned. Nine-tenths of the fatalities and injuries occur in rural areas or in outlying disand relatively small.

High places are the most dancave or the base of a cliff. Second best is a grove of trees, if care is taken not to stand under the tallest one. Avoid hilltops, isolat-

er trees and lone buildings. An ordinary house in a settled district is relatively safe, since there usually are higher structures nearby and the network of plumbing and wiring in a house provides some protection. It is a good iea, however, to stay away from arge metal objects in a house, specially if they are connected be outside by wires. But don't think that lightning

never strikes the same place twice. Wherever lightning strikes, there is a possibility that it may strike again because certain conditions at that spot may offer a special attraction.


