Funeral Rites For Mrs. Gilbert Sowell Held Here Sunday

Funeral services for Mrs. E. E. Gilbert Sowell, a former long-time resident of Haskell and active church worker during her long residence here, who died in Los Angeles, Calif., Wednesday, April 11, were held at the First Methodist Church Sunday at 2:30 p. m.

The Rev. T. G. Craft, pastor of the local church officiated for the service, and burial was in Willow Cemetery under the direction of the Rev. T. G. Craft.

Mrs. Sowell, 64, had been ill for the past year and a half. She had been living in Los Angeles for several years.

She was born March 30, 1887, in Tennessee, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. G. W. Morris. She married Dr. E. E. Gilbert of Cooper, Texas, and they came to Haskell to make their home in the early 1900's. Dr. Gilbert died in 1913. She later married W. J. Sowell of this city, who preceded her in death several years ago.

A member of the Methodist Church since girlhood, Mrs. Sowell taught a beginners class Sunday school class in the church for more than 40 years, and was active in all other phases of church work.

In addition to her five children, Mrs. Sowell reared two grandchildren from childhood, Mrs. Beverly Myers of Burbank, Calif., and Mrs. Elizabeth Gilstrap of Haskell.

Immediate survivors include three sons, Morris Gilbert of Seymour, Carl Gilbert of San Diego, Calif., Yandell Gilbert of Los Angeles, Calif.; two daughters, Mrs. Everett Buchanan and Mrs. Virginia Hovestadt of Los Angeles; two sisters, Mrs. Jeff Dillard of Los Angeles and Mrs. Bertie Oliver of El Paso; sixteen grandchildren and 29 great-grandchildren.

Driver Painfully Burned When Truck Cab Catches Fire

The driver of a butane transport truck received extensive and painful burns, and quick work of firemen in extinguishing the blazing cab of the truck was credited with preventing more extensive property damage Saturday afternoon around 2:30 o'clock.

G. H. Muegge about 30, driver of the transport truck for Walling Butane & Appliance Company of this city, suffered first and second degree burns on his face, hands and arms and shoulders, but physicians and attendants at the Haskell Hospital where he was carried immediately after the accident, said the burns were serious but not termed critical.

Muegge was returning from Caddo in the transport truck. As he crossed the Wichita Valley railroad east of the square, he heard the safety valve of the truck's fuel tank open. Fearing an explosion, he cut off the ignition and pulled to the side of the highway just across the street from Gilmore Implement Co. Flames flashed through the truck cab, igniting Muegge's clothes before he could escape from the truck.

Persons at the implement house witnessed the mishap, and rushed Muegge to the hospital and summoned the fire department. Firemen extinguished the blaze inside the cab, and played streams of water on the fuel tank and rain transport tank to prevent danger of an explosion. They also extinguished a minor grass fire which caught from the truck.

Grand Jury Returns Felony Bills For Check Frauds; Hog Theft

Four men were named as principals in three indictments reported Monday afternoon by the Grand Jury impaneled Monday morning for the April term of 30th District Court at the close of the initial day's session of the investigating body. Sixteen witnesses appeared before the Grand Jury during the day. Jurors recessed Monday evening to resume their session at a later date during the current court term.

Two of the indictments returned Monday were for "defrauding with worthless check," and names of the principals were not made public pending serving of indictments.

Both defrauding bills involved the passing of worthless checks in the total amount of approximately \$2,000, court officials said. Deputy Sheriff Harry Donohoo was to go to Colorado City today to take custody of a man named in one of the fraud bills. Principal named in the other indictment has not been apprehended.

The third felony bill returned by the Grand Jury was a joint indictment for hog theft in which two Stamford men, Roy McGee and M. W. Teeter were named as principals. One of the men is being held in the county jail, Sheriff Bob Cousins said, and the second man is at liberty under bond. McGee and Teeter are alleged in the indictment to have taken a hog on or about Feb. 18, this year, from H. A. Kilpatrick, Stamford city police officer. The alleged theft occurred in Haskell county, the indictment sets out.

CofC Membership Drive Will Be Launched Monday

Approval of a budget commensurate with the ambitious 7-point work program adopted by the Chamber of Commerce for the current year was given by directors of the organization at their regular meeting Tuesday morning in the Texas Cafe club room.

Also, plans were adopted for an intensive membership campaign to be launched Monday April 23, with the goal of doubling the membership in the organization, to include all business and professional men and civic leaders in the community.

Appreciative of the fact that the local organization has operated on the lowest budget of any similar organization in this area in past years, the 1951 budget was set at \$10,500. In arriving at this figure, Hallie E. Chapman, chamber president pointed out that the program of work for 1951 had been set first and the financial requirement to carry out the program then apportioned and placed in the budget.

In determining the \$10,500 budget for 1951, the organization proposes to eliminate additional requests for financing any project included in the program.

Meeting of the 1951 finance budget will also require additional manpower for carrying out the objectives during the year, and the program as planned will require a minimum of 150 committee workers, Chapman explained.

A brochure outlining the 1951 program of work was mailed this week to all members of the organization, and this brochure will be placed in the hands of each prospective member contacted during the coming week.

He was a veteran of World War I and a member of the American Legion post. He was a former member of the Rotan city council, and was active in numerous civic organizations, and was a member of the Fisher county draft board. He served as Red Cross home service chairman at Rotan and was active in the Methodist Church.

New Oil Pay; Conglomerate Discovery, And New Wildcat Highlight Oil Activity

Discovery of a new pay zone in the upper Strawn sand in the Sojourner Field west of Haskell by Eastland Oil Co., et al, the completion of a Conglomerate discovery four miles southwest of Rochester, and the moving in of equipment for a deep wildcat test on the Scott ranch southeast of Haskell highlighted oil activity of the week in this area.

New Strawn discovery was made at the No. 1 J. M. Miller, Section 41, Block 1, H&TC Survey, a one location north offset to a recent one mile extension to the Sojourner Field.

On a drillstem test from 4750-60 feet, tool was open 40 minutes. Recovery was 20 feet of free oil and 120 feet of heavily oil and gas cut mud. Shutin pressure in 15 minutes was 2,000 pounds.

Continental Oil Co. No. 1 Maggie Martin, Section 38, Wise Bend Conglomerate discovery four miles southwest of Rochester, CSL, has been completed with a potential of 129 barrels of oil in six hours.

D. E. Hughes and others have moved in rig for their No. 1 S. W. Scott ranch, a 5100 foot rotary test and wildcat 2310 feet from the north and east line of section 28, W. Thornton survey, 10 miles southeast of Haskell.

W. A. Tanner Home East of Weinert Burns Thursday

The modern five-room farm home of Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Tanner several miles east of Weinert, was completely destroyed by fire, together with all contents, last Thursday afternoon around 3:30 o'clock.

Mr. and Mrs. Tanner were away from home at the time. G. A. Rueffer, a neighbor living two miles southeast of the Tanner place was the first to discover the fire. When he arrived it was too late to save anything from the house.

In addition to furniture and all other household effects destroyed, Mr. Tanner, whose hobby is fishing, lost \$300 worth of fishing tackle and gear. He also had enough paint stored under the house to give the structure a new coat of paint. A new roof had been placed on the house only about two months ago. Total loss from the fire was estimated at between \$3,000 and \$10,000, partially covered by insurance.

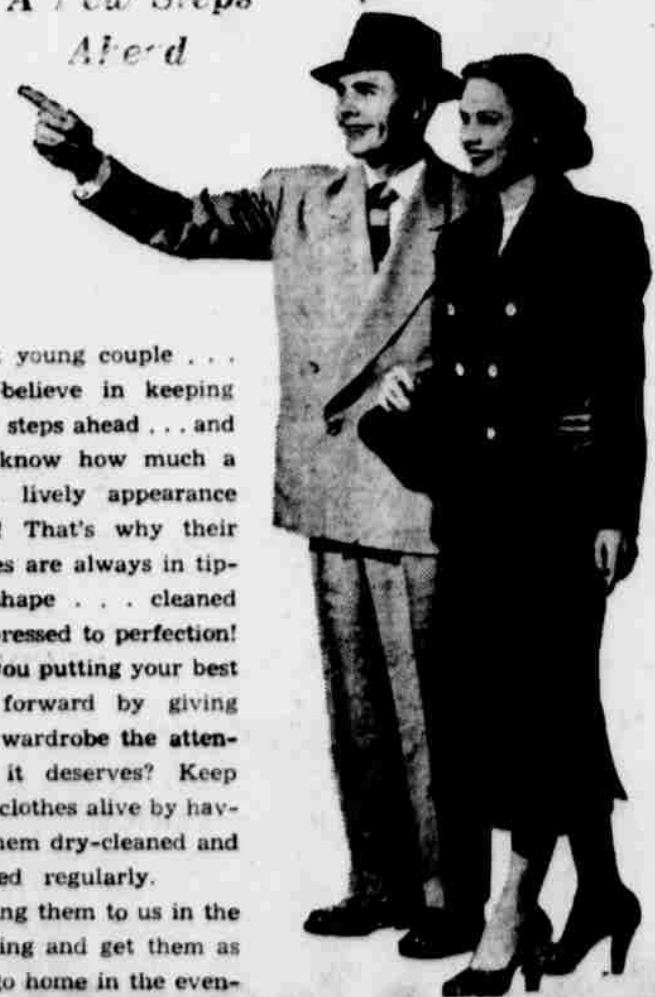

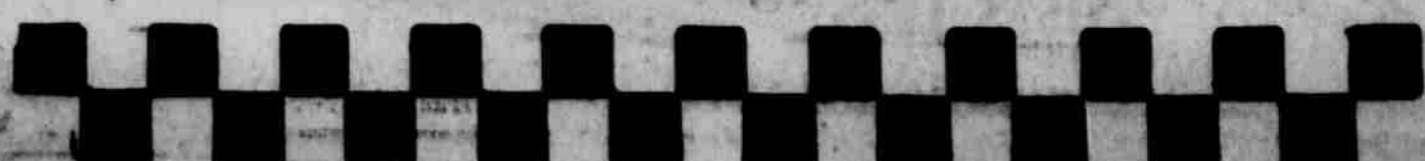

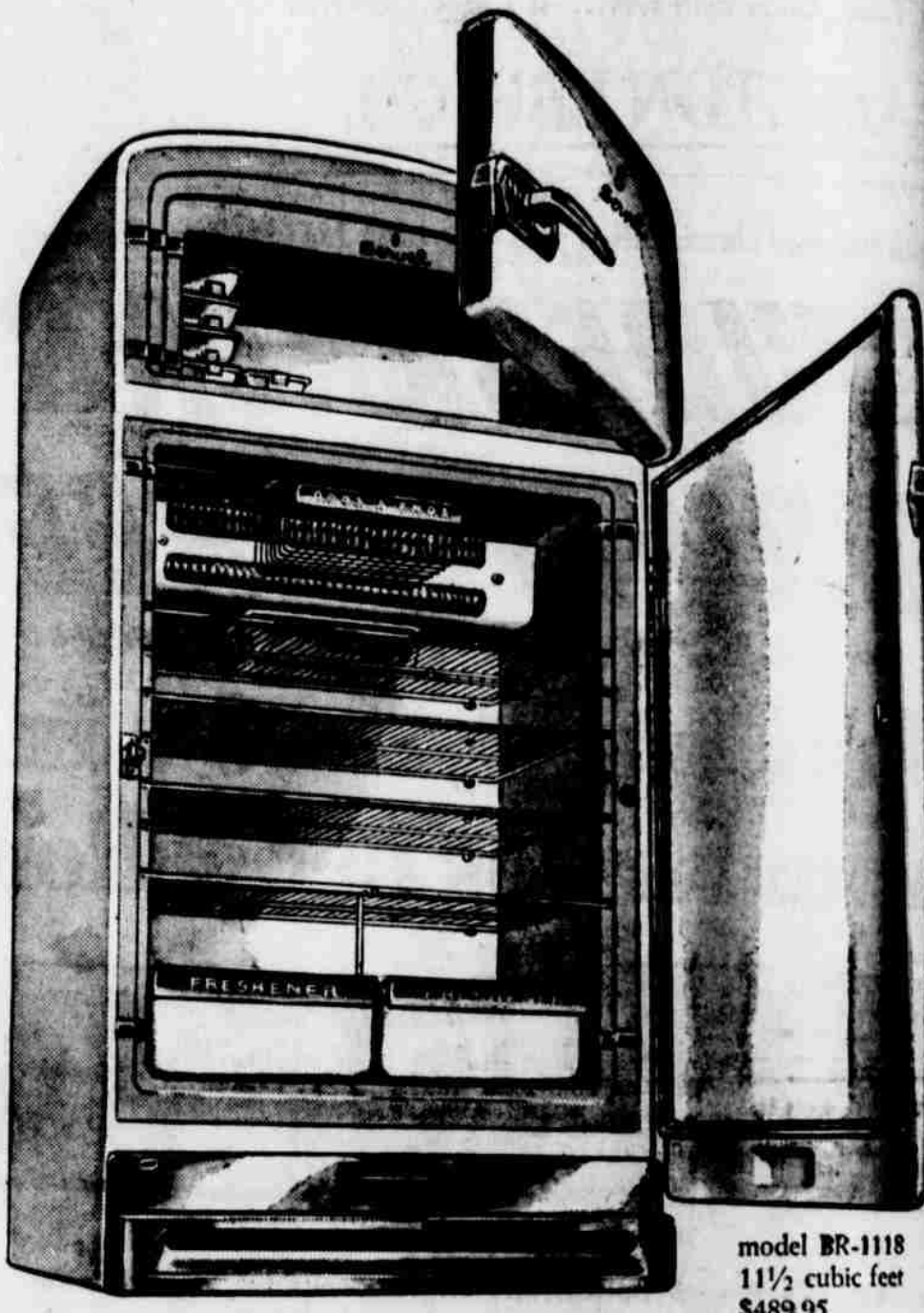
