# Support Program On Grain Sorghum Urged by Mahon

Congressman George Mahon reported to The Free Press this week that his mail for the district indicated concern over the failure of the Commodity Credit Corporation to announce a loan support for the 1950 grain sorghum crop. Over a period of months Mahor has urged such support, indicating his belief that a support program would be announced.

In his report this week, which was also sent to the office of the Count Agent and the County PMA office, Mahon stated that no one

could guarantee that a support program for grain sorghum would be provided but that every indication pointed in that direction. The support program on grain sorghum last year was announced on March 14. In conferring with officials in Washinton, Mahon has insisted that it is most important that a support program be announced as soon as possible and at a level not below last year. 

## Treat Early For Hornfly Control. **Advises Martin**

A tiny fly, grayish to black in color and about % of an inch long about this time of the year or a little later begins to rob the live-stock producer of pounds of beef and dollors that could be profits: This small bloodsucker, according to F. W. Martin, County Agent, is the hornfly

It is seen principally on the head, neck and shoulders of cattle aften in great numbers if permitted to multiply, they may cover 50 percent of an animal's body. The hornfly has a very short life

tion in the first generation. The first spraying is very important and may reduce the total number of sprayings needed during the summer. Animals should be given the first treatment when the fly population reaches an average of about 25 flies per animal.

There are two insecticides which will give very effective control against the hornfly. DDT has been successfully used for several years and a .5 percent spray or dip will give excellent results. Texaphene is the other recommended materia and it is also used at a .5 percent strength. It is recommended only for use as a spray. Toxaphene has given equal or superior results when compared to DDT for horn-
