Social Security Man Will Visit Haskell On Sept. 20th

Ralph T. Fisher, manager of the Abilene office of the social Secur-ity Administration will be at the Chamber of Commerce in Haskell at 11 a. m. on Thursday, Sept. 20. Persons wishing assistance with retirement claims or death claims under the Social Security Act, or needing information about their social security accounts, should call at that time for necessary help and information.

Many self-employed persons do not know that the 1950 Amendments to the Social Security Act extend coverage to them, according to Fisher. This change became effective on January 1, 1951, Selfemployed persons now have the same rights to benefit on behalf of themselves and their families

as employees. Self-employment includes individual store owners, partners pulpwood operators, owners of shoe shine stands and numerous other business activities. There are 14 specific exceptions for professional people, among them doctors and lawyers.

Self-employment coverage not voluntary. The individual is either covered or not covered. The self-employe person's income is not reported until the end of the year and will be reported with his annual income tax return. The first report is due before March 15, 1952. The tax rate is 11-4% of the first \$3,600 of net busi-

ness profit. Self-employed persons who want further information can get a leaflet from the Social Security Administration, 308 Post Office Bldg., Abilene Texas, explaining self-employment income.

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
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
